Editorial comment

I hope that by the time you are reading this you have your copy of the Church Page. I must apologise for the fact that it is a separate page and not included in the full issue of the *Haydon News*. The change is due to the fact that, whilst I received its contents by e-mail as usual from Vincent Ashwin, my computer developed a glitch preventing me from 'opening the file' in time to include it in the full printing process. I am still having problems. It will be fixed but doesn't it go to show how we seem to be becoming more reliant on computer technology these days, and lost without it! Still, I don't think I would like to go back to the days of the Typewriter and all that that technology gave us.

We at the 'Friends of Haydon Bridge' who put together the *Haydon News* each month do so by collating the 8100 or so pages by hand then stapling each bunch of 7, 8 or 9 sheets. This takes us about 3 hours on the last Sunday morning of the month. You get your issue via a member of our hardworking distribution group. My continued thanks to them.

We are thinking of letting technology relieve some of the tedium of hand collating by acquiring a machine to do the job for us — we will still have to staple each issue however. The printing machine which we use to produce the copies is working fantastically well, so much so that practically no paper is wasted even though it can print up to 130 sheets each minute. Because of this, having a collator makes sense.

I currently have the printer (and its accessories) in one of my bedrooms but if we can acquire a collator both it and the printer will be transferred to a room in the Community Centre. This means that not only can we produce the *Haydon News* more efficiently but both printer and collator could be made available for any legitimate Group or Organisation in the Parish.

I know that there are at least two largish groups who would welcome this technology and I am sure that the more groups who use it, the more it will come to be used. On behalf of the 'Friends' I would really appreciate your views on this and indeed welcome approaches being made by you, should you be interested. After all, the *Haydon News* is for the community so why shouldn't the community benefit from the technology available, including the Computers, in the Community Centre?

Of course funds have to be available for all this to happen. The *Haydon News* is heavily dependent on Advertising revenue and membership subscriptions so can I ask you to look into your heart and ask yourself the question, "*Have I paid my yearly dues?*" If not then do please let us have your contributions (£1.20 minimum for membership, £6 for a posted issue) and a minimum of £12 for business advertisers. The sooner the better please.

Notes from the Parish Council Meeting held at the Village Hall (Langley) Thursday 25th April 2002 at 7.30pm.

Present were: 9 Councillors (apologies from 2), County Councillor, Parish Clerk and 2 members of the Public.

The meeting began with David Wood being introduced. He proceeded to give a presentation of how the Audit Report on Church Street Project had been arrived at.

The authorities apparently were satisfied with the work done, even though it was shoddy, because otherwise full funding might not have been approved. He acknowledged that the time frame had been a significant factor.

The Chair raised the issue of the funding. He understood that it was to be for three (3) years yet it would appear that because of the late start to the work a whole year's funding had been lost. Was that the case? Yes. Serious questions have to be asked whereby the scheme was proposed in January 1999 yet work only began in February 2001.

A number of Councillors queried aspects of the report but Cllr Mitchell suggested that Mr Wood go through the conclusions to the report highlighting recommendations such that they would be unlikely to appear in future works undertaken by TDC.

Briefly, these were: All meetings should be fully Minuted, accurate accounts of all spending be kept, better communications between the different departments agreeing on

dates for different aspects of the work and that value for money should be a higher priority.

Cllr Parkin wondered how the delays had occurred? Not a straightforward answer to this.

Clir Philip wondered if architects had been tendered for, or had one been nominated?

County Clir Horncastle spoke strongly about who should be in overall charge of the project. He felt that there should have been a Clerk of Works appointed and not a Conservation Officer as had been the case with Haydon Bridge. Normal tendering processes <u>must</u> take place. He cited the case of the lamps in Church Street. No-one seems to be in overall charge of both the placing and the actual work being done. He also indicated that the plan for Church Street did not include trees so that perhaps explains why two of the lamps have their heads amongst the leaves!

Quite a difficult meeting for Mr Wood but he did say that lessons had been learnt from the project and that others might not suffer as we had done.

The Chair thanked him for his presence upon which Mr Wood left.

The Chair then read out a letter he had put together outlining a number of bulleted points regarding the HER scheme. It seemed to meet with approval from those present.

Cllr Mitchell feels that more funding is coming our way to complete work around the Church.

Public Matters: There were none.

Minutes of the previous meeting were agreed.

Matters arising: 1. Following on from the last meeting when Brian Bell gave his presentation re: Spa Well, the Clerk had written to Highways but had not received a reply as yet. Cllr Smith, however, has had a number of calls from the Press asking about the state of the road/landslip. He has reiterated that the slip is moving closer to the A69 and that only the tarmac above the slip seems to be holding and that the ground beneath is much less stable. What with the number of heavy vehicles using the A69 vibration must be having an effect on the stability of this area.

- 2. Clir Horncastle has tried umpteen times to arrange a meeting with Roadlink in connection with the problems encountered by David McVay. To date even though David has supplied details of his work-shift times nothing has happened!
- 3. Jackie (The Railway) has had her lighting problems resolved.
- 4. Dog Bins. A reply to the Clerk's letter by e-mail has been received wanting to know whether the bin should be located inside the estate (Showfield) or on the road. Cllr Charlton felt that it would be better on the road.
- 5. Clir Fletcher has queried the Arriva Travel Passes. These are not transferable but there are 'freebees' to be had. Keep in touch.
- 6. Pelican crossing. Cllr Charlton highlighted the problem of vehicles obstructing it whilst waiting at the road works. It is against the law to 'park' on the crossing and Roadlink should be told to sort it out. Quickly!
- 7. Mr Holmes had again contacted Cllr Smith regarding the works going on at the toilet. Contractors are starting before the nominated times, lorries causing disruption and he remains very unhappy. Cllr Mitchell suggested that the Officer in charge of the work at TDC be the first point of contact.
- 8. Code of Conduct. Parish Councillors must sign up to this before May. There is nothing sinister in this but any gifts beyond a value of £20 must be accounted for. One or two cllrs, felt that the whole thing was silly! An advertisement should appear in the Hexham Courant for the week beginning 6th May indicating that the Code had been complied with.

Highways/Bypass: Pelican crossing already mentioned Esp Hill road is badly pitted. Also Brokenheugh. Heugh House Lane has now got lines marked indicating repairs? The road on the bends towards Langley also slipped.

Cllr Horncastle felt that the Area Manager (Colin Charl-

ton) should be contacted if anyone has a problem with water lying on roads because ditching work needs to be looked at. He is keen to keep ditches open. Clir Mitchell cited cases where the opposite had been true!

Lighting: Cllr Mitchell has met with a group looking at the problems created by their siting. Some have been moved whilst alternative suggestions have been put forward where it is inappropriate to move the lamp, e.g. outside the entrance to the factory. Young trees were the problem.

Planning: Construction of a conservatory at 2 Chesterwood Barns. No comment given. Standalone development. An appeal has been lodged against the 35% ruling.

Any Other Business: Litter bins are not being emptied because the facilities on the 'new' Wheelie Bin wagon can't cope! There has got to be a remedy to this.

Clir Chariton requested that Dog Fouling leaflets be acquired for distribution throughout the Parish

Stone at the end of the bridge still not replaced!

Annual Spring Clean (Riverside) Cllr Charlton said that TDC is not in control of this scheme but, the SKIP will be arriving on Friday 17th May with the actual cleanup taking place on Saturday 18th May. <u>ALL HANDS TO THE PUMPS!!</u>

There is £15,000 going spare for the village for community based schemes, so Clir Horncastle informed the meeting. Anyone with a legitimate scheme should let him know within the next two weeks. Capital schemes only will be permitted.

HISTORICAL NOTES OF HAYDON BRIDGE - Dennis Telford

The second week in April proved to be an exciting one for me, if a little daunting.

Alright, Newcastle United played their poorest game of the season in a 1-1 draw with Fulham, but after that things picked up considerably.

On Tuesday 9th, a thirty minute interview with Jon Harle on Radio Newcastle, Cleveland & Cumbria's "Northern Nights" including two of my songs, "Me Dad" and "The Black Bottle". I couldn't help but smile when, after hearing my stories the interviewer said incredulously, "Are these REAL people?" "Do things like this REALLY happen in Haydon Bridge?" Yes, Jon, they do, and much more besides that I wouldn't dare mention! Well, not at the moment anyway!!!

The BBC Radio interview was a precursor to my appearance, on 10th April, at the 'Bridge Hotel Composers' Club' in Newcastle and a great thrill to perform twelve of my songs/poems about Haydon Bridge, with musical accompaniment by the "High Level Ranters" - Johnny Handle, Colin Ross and Jim Hall, ably supported by Benny Graham and Tynedale's own Henry Robson.

My initial nerves were soon dispelled, with so many familiar faces in the audience and the way in which my stories about our village were received by the regulars at the **Bridge Hotel**.

Thank you all and it is thanks also to our village people, our heritage and wonderful landscapes. They provide more than enough material for any amount of story-tellers, song-writers and poets.

Thursday 11th April was the eighth birthday of my eldest grandchild, Jack. How time flies!

As those busy years went by worson and dowter grew. The River Tyne, Spa Well and Plankey Mill's their play ground too,

And when they larn't the facts of life,

Then they had bairns thorsel' Lang may they live for to en joy the scene from Haydon Fell.

And finally? Saturday 13th April. Derby County 2 – Newcastle United 3. YESIIIIIIIIIIIIII

It is time to catch up with a few responses to my 'Historical Notes' of recent months.

Harry Veitch is a regular correspondent by telephone and letter. You may recall that Harry lived in our village from 1920 until 1935. One of the things I enjoy most about Harry's contact is that he provides such a varied selection of memories. My 'notes' in the November 2001 issue about the 1926 Haydon Bridge football team and the Haydon Bridge Show had Harry reaching for his pen.

Dear Dennis

...... there may not be many who can recall the middle 1920's and the names of the football team. As they had to pass our door (29 John Martin Street) on match days, except for the Halliday lads who lived at the top of Whittis Hill, remember them I do!

Maurice's Dad, Joe Armstrong, played in goal I'm fairly sure. Peter Spooner (Senior) was part and parcel of the Club — young Peter was 2 to 3 years older than me. Although I don't recall T. Cowing, presumably he was the older brother of Charlie, a classmate.

To us in those far-off days, the Flower Show ranks alongside the Annual Sunday School trip to Whitley Bay Show Day – by train then – gave us so much. Why do the Shuggy Boats always come to mind?

There was so much on 'show'. Pupils' handwriting as an example and there were some fine athletes in the Track and Field events. The Horticultural side was tremendous but it wasn't until evening that the real atmosphere descended overall.

The fairground Steam Organ provided the magic with its vivid colours and ornate figures.

To conclude my little peep into the 1920's, the dearest ride (2d – two pence) was on the 'Chairplanes'

Very sincerely Harry Veitch.

And so to someone who still lives in the village and is able to pass on folklore as handed down by his ancestors.

David Brown remembers his father,

Fred, recalling his three years as a Bell Toller at the Mortuary Chapel in the cemetery above the California Gardens. Fred's instructions from the Vicar were to 'wait until he saw the first signs of the horse-drawn hearse entering the gate at the southwest corner of the cemetery and then to toll the bell until the coffin arrived at the Mortuary Chapel where the burial service took place'.

Fred Brown was also Gravedigger at the Old Church at Haydon and David tells a story which has been passed down to him about his father digging on what was assumed to be a clear piece of land when suddenly, his spade disappeared through the bottom of the newly dug grave. Fred's sister, Hannah, took his sandwiches up to the Old Church at bait time and found Fred sitting on the Old Church steps, 'as white as a sheet'. Her brother related the story to her.

Whether Fred ever recovered his spade from the grave, which presumably had been there for many years directly below the new grave he was digging, isn't known but it is unlikely given his state of shock at the time.

John Bowman is another who still lives in Haydon Bridge. My mention of the Town Hall in the 1950's was to bring back traumatic memories for John.

On Saturday 11th December 1943 John was an eighteen year old Assistant Operator working with sixteen year old Sid Thompson in the projection room at the Town Hall Cinema. The main projectionist, Walter Spark, wasn't working that weekend.

There were two performances on a Saturday in those days, at 6.15pm and 8.15pm. During the first performance an 'unauthorised person' was also in the projection room and regrettable he was smoking. When he 'nipped out' the lighted end of the cigarette it fell onto some highly inflammable Nitrate film lying on the floor and the result was a substantial fire in the projection room which led to the immediate evacuation of the Town Hall.

There was single access and exit to the projection room in 1943. This was up a metal ladder through an internal doorway above the Ticket Office in the foyer. Both John and Sid had to escape through the fumes and flames of the fire which spread into the entrance area on the ground floor. John tells me that it was fortunate that Katie Waugh, who sold the tickets, wasn't locked into her small office at the time otherwise the consequences could have been much worse.

As it was, both John and Sid ended up with a month's stay in Hexham Hospital suffering from burns sustained in the fire. This was not until Dr. Hall had administered his own First Aid – a large glass of Whisky!!

On 1st February 1944 at Hexham Police Court, Matilda and George Stoddart of Chopwell expressed their regret at what had happened, but as owners and licencees of the cinema, they were held responsible for breaches of the regulations and pleaded guilty. Stoddarts had a number of Picture Halls and had been licence holders of the Haydon Bridge premises since 1937. Following the fire, it was discovered that parts of the electrical installation were not covered with fire resisting material and a number of other structural defects were discovered.

The cinema was closed for a week while the necessary repairs were carried out and the owners had plans approved to bring the Operating Box more up to date, including external access via step irons which can still be seen. Today it is a stairway to nowhere, built into the west wall of the Haydonian Social Club.

I had hoped that the film that Saturday night was something akin to "Towering Inferno" as it would have made the story so much more interesting. It wasn't to be. The movie showing when those of you who were there that night left in a rush through the Fire Exits was "Flight Lieutenant" starring Glen Ford.

Fortunately, John and Sid fully recovered from their experience and injuries, although John still has the burn marks as a reminder. Jock King's son, Jimmy, was never again allowed into the Projection Room when he was

smoking and the Town Hall cinema continued as a place of great enjoyment for us all.

In February (2002) I received a complimentary letter from Jill Lawson. Haydonians will remember Jill (née Rogan) living at 'Cleveland' on John Martin Street with her father and mother. John and Connie.

It is satisfying when I hear that my 'notes' evoke fond memories of a childhood in the village. Jill also writes, "I was ... fascinated to read of the work Johnny Handle is doing compiling his collection of "Geordie" songs and poems — my husband and I used to know Johnny when he was singing and playing in a room above a shop opposite Newcastle Bus Station, probably 45 years ago"

As a Haydon Bridge exile, Jill passes on her good wishes to those who remember her and she has made a financial contribution "to the Spa Well Restoration Fund or any other worthy local cause" Thank you Jill.

Jill now lives in Essex and I hope that in the future she will provide us with memories of her time in Haydon Bridge, for the *Haydon News*. In the meantime my own research has unearthed a story which Jill will probably remember well, with mixed emotions.

In the 1950's, swimming in the River Tyne below the Spa Well was a regular pursuit. Villagers would walk, cycle or take the bus there in the early evening, at weekends and during the holidays. We spent many happy hours diving off the rocky shelf into the deep pool – wonderful memories!

Not quite so 'wonderful' for Mr & Mrs Rogan and twenty year old Jill on 19th July 1955 however.

Father and daughter were getting dressed after swimming in the pool, when two Hexham boys got into difficulty as they floated down-stream in the current. Mrs Rogan is quoted as saying, "my husband dashed past me and the last I remember seeing of him was his socks as he dived into the water. My daughter followed and each of them went to the aid of a youth"

Jill brought one of the boys to the side of the river and when her mother shouted that her father seemed to be in difficulties with the other boy, she swam to him and helped them both through ten yards of deep water, until other people on the bank were able to hold out a branch for Jill to grab on to.

"If Jill had not been there I am sure my husband and the two boys would have been drowned" said Mrs Rogan.

The mention of swimming reminds me of another incident many years ago, which provided much more pleasant memories for two employees of the Haydon Bridge Co-op.

Both young men enjoyed a spot of fishing and after work would follow the South Bank of the river up to Limestone to cast their lines.

On one warm sunny evening as they sat quietly on the river bank, a pretty young girl came into view on the limestone shelf opposite. The girl undressed, adjusted her swimming costume and slid gracefully into the limestone pool. As she swam effortlessly back and forth she was startled when she saw the two young men watching her from the opposite bank. Flushed of face she immediately offered her apology for churning up the water and spoiling their fishing expedition.

Maurice tells me that Ozzie replied with a wide grin on his face, "Don't worry lass! We lost all interest in fishing about twenty minutes ago!!!!"

NATURAL REMEDIES FOR A HEALTHY BODY HOLIDAY CARE

A very common concern during long haul flights is the risk of *D.V.T* (deep vein thrombosis). Nutrients that support circulation are vitamin *E* and omega 3 Essential Fatty Acids found in fish oils. These work by reducing the risk of blood clotting by lowering blood fat levels. The herbal supplement *Pycnogenolalso* possess this anti clotting action.

Some people use *vitamins* C and a B complex to protect against the stress of travelling, and the herbs Echinacea and Goldenseal to protect against viruses. Ginseng is a popular choice for people hoping to maintain energy levels when the jet lag hits.

Ginger capsules have always been popular among travel sickness sufferers. Sometimes just sucking on pieces of Crystallised Ginger gives relief. Vitamin B6, (best taken with a B complex) is another popular choice for the relief of nausea.

Many of our customers use Acidophilus capsules to treat stomach upsets and diarrhoea caused by a change in diet.

For over indulgence in the local beverages *Artichoke* and *Milk Thistle* are herbs that support the liver in the breakdown of fats and toxins such as alcohol.

Small amounts of sunshine are good for us - our bodies use it to produce *vitamin D*.

However it is essential to use a high factor sun protection Cream. To protect the skin from the inside, some of our customers use vitamin C which builds collagen, (because sun exposure destroys collagen). Beta Carotene - which the body converts to vitamin A may offer protection against the damaging effects of Ultra-violet light. Ideally this is taken one month before travelling and for the duration of the holiday. People have reported this combination helpful in the prevention of prickly heat too.

However if you over do it Aloe Vera Gel is cooling and soothing for sun exposed skin. Soaking in a warm or tepid bath with a few drops of Lavender pure essential oil may ease soreness and speed up skin repair. In severe cases medical attention should always be sought.

Finally if, like me, you're probably going nowhere more exotic than the Costa del Tyne Bank, taking vitamin B1 'Thiamin' to repel the dreaded midges was a useful tip I was given by some campers at Kielder.

Once taken the vitamin is excreted through the skin – insects hate the smell - although it is odourless to humans!



Where's the cross?

People worshipping at St Cuthbert's on Easter Day asked why the cross was not in its usual place behind the altar.

As part of the celebration of Easter, the church was full of flowers; there was an Easter Garden in the porch, with a model of the empty tomb, complete with white cloths inside; colourful posters of the risen Lord were attached to the screen; and the brass cross was placed on a window-sill, so that the congregation could see the complete five-part painting on the 'reredos'. The centre-piece, which is usually hidden by the cross, shows Jesus teaching the people.

This was in contrast to Good Friday, when all the ornaments, candle-sticks, etc, were taken out, and a nine-foot high rough wooden cross was the centre-piece of the church.

DOCTOR'S PAGE

MORE MAD MEDICAL MAUNDERINGS WOT? NO CAR?

Did you know that in Finland nobody is allowed to drive after their seventieth birthday? Neither did I until the other day. Whilst this may seem to us to be rather a draconian measure perhaps we go to the other extreme of having no effective checks on fitness to drive until much later. How certain are YOU that you are in all respects as fit to drive as you used to be? With your hand on your heart, can you guarantee that you are as safe a driver today as you were twenty years ago? Honestly?

Doing the annual accounts the other day I was scandalised to discover just how much motoring costs. By the time fuel, tax, insurance, servicing and repairs are all accounted for the numbers are really huge. For that much money you could afford a huge number of taxi, bus and train fares and be free of all the hassle of keeping a car.

Giving up driving may seem a big and rather intimidating step but it might be the right thing to do and you can be sure then, that you won't have to risk losing your self esteem, dignity, no claims bonus and perhaps your life in what might otherwise have been a blameless driving career.

LAMBING AND PREGNANCY

Women who are, might be or are hoping to be pregnant should not have any contact with sheep or goats during the lambing season because of the risk of *chlamydiosis*, *listeriosis and toxoplasmosis*.

In particular, do not help with the lambing or milking, do not have contact with aborted animals, newborn animals or afterbirths, do not have contact with anything (machinery, boots, clothing, bedding) that has been in contact with the above, seek advice if you have a flu-like illness after living or working in an agricultural environment.

LIMITS TO MEDICINE

In 1976 Ivan Illich published a book, with the above title, that struck a chord with many at the time and has influenced opinion ever since. A key theme was that whilst death, pain and sickness are part of being human and all cultures have developed mechanisms for ameliorating their impact, the effect of modern 'industrialised' medicine, in trying to defeat these inevitabilities, has been to destroy the ability of individuals and cultures to cope for themselves.

Or put another way – people have been invited to be passively taught, moved, guided and treated rather than to actively learn, to heal and develop personal solutions to problems.

Amartya Sen's research shows that the more a society spends on health care, the more likely are its inhabitants to regard themselves as sick.

Now, more than at any time in human history, individuals can act to regain control of their own destinies. Sentiment has moved against the old certainties. Doctor does not always know best. Patients are now positively encouraged to take an active part in and responsibility for their own treatment in association with their practitioners. There is not a pill for every ill any more—actually there never was.

What Illich advocated was not the wholesale rubbishing of the medical structures but rather 'sanitation, inoculation, vector control, well distributed health education, healthy architecture and safe machinery, general competence in first aid, equally distributed, access to dental and primary medical services as well as judiciously selected complex services'. 'A truly modern culture that fostered self-care and autonomy.'

Few will experience a wholly disease or injury free life and none will escape death. It is a rather facile but nonetheless widely regarded truism in medicine that one heeds with special attention the words of a patient with thin notes. Some of the oldest patients in the practice have the thinnest notes and some of the youngest patients have been transferred to box files. Have we forgotten the value and skills of self reliance and stoicism? Do we inhabit a culture in which dependence on others is the norm? If so, is it the right way to run things?

EITHER THIS WALLPAPER GOES OR I DO!*

The following have been suggested as elements of a 'good death' in modern Western culture; Freedom from pain. Open acknowledgement of the imminence of death. Death at home, with family and friends at hand. An aware death – personal conflicts and business being resolved. Death as 'personal growth' (I think I know what is meant but I dislike the term). Death according to personal preference, in a manner that resonates with the person's individuality.

Have you considered what you want? Do your family and friends know? Can you act now to resolve personal conflicts and 'close' issues that are important to you? Have you made a will? Do you want to talk about your death? — you are very welcome to do so. What about spiritual issues — would discussion with a priest be helpful? *Oscar Wilde I think.

Ageing Work Boredom Bags under the eyes Ignorance Baldness Freckles Big ears Grey or white hair Ugliness Childbirth Allergy to the 21st century Unhappiness Cellulite Jet lag Hangover Anxiety about penis size Pregnancy Road rage Loneliness

There were 180 others to choose from. The whole exercise induced incandescent rage in one correspondent who viewed it as arrogant beyond belief.
