PARISH COUNCIL NOTES from the meeting in June 2012

Public Participation

In answer to a query, the meeting was informed that at present the village handyman is working on tidying up the heather bed at the east end of John Martin Street.

The new seat for the east end of the village should be in place by the end of the month. It is to be sited at the top of the rise at the junction of the Hexham road and the lane to the water treatment plant.

In answer to concerns expressed about NCC's Local Development Plan and what it means for Haydon Bridge, a small group of councillors are to meet with a member of the Development Trust to consider the Council's response.

NCC Report

Cllr Sharp told the meeting that the new hospital at Haltwhistle has been given the go ahead. Building work will start later this year and should be completed by the end of 2013.

Following representations from residents of Victoria Terrace about proposed changes to the Taits Yard Housing Development, Cllr Sharp explained that the changes proposed, extending the development up to the back of the Terrace, would constitute a material change to the existing plan and require a full planning application to be submitted by the developer. The original plans include a vehicular access road and parking areas to the rear of Victoria Terrace.

Cllr Sharp has received the Parish Council's list of road repairs needed in the Parish and is to discuss these with officers from the Highways Dept.

Highways

The new directional sign for the Church Street junction is to be part funded by the Development Trust on a 50-50 basis with the Parish Council. The new sign will include the information on the current signs at the junction, and also include symbols for the railway station and Tourist Information Point, as well as incorporating a brown sign for Hadrian's Wall.

Several complaints were made about the plethora of advertising signs hanging on the railings at the junction of Church Street and Ratcliffe Road. The NCC Enforcement Officer is to be contacted to get them removed.

The blocked drains and gullies on Church Street and Ratcliffe Road have not been cleaned/cleared out, although they have been reported to NCC Highways several times this year. The overgrown state of the road verges is to be reported to NCC and Road Link. There is poor visibility for motorists at several road junctions in the Parish.

The quality of the new road surface being laid on the A69 east of Bush Farm is very uneven. Road Link is to be informed.

The finger post for the footpath to Lees Farm requires replacement.

In response to concerns expressed about the safety of the junction of the A69 and A686, particularly the Alston turning, a representative from Road Link said that 'the number of accidents on a particular stretch of road does not necessarily imply a problem with it [the road]. Accidents are usually attributed to driver error or mechanical failure. Only accidents reported to Road Link by the police are included in their statistics. This precludes most minor bumps and accidents not reported to the police.

Notice was received about the resurfacing of Hordley Acres/Strother Close as the roads will be closed during the work, 9th -11th July. Residents are to be asked to make alternative arrangements for parking their cars.

Planning Application

The following applications were received;

Renovation of existing dwelling, change of use and conversion of adjoining cart shed into residential use. West Land Ends Cottage. Advertisement consent for one illuminated fascia sign and one projecting sign, 9-11 Church Street. Advertisement consent for new signs at the Co-op Store, Ratcliffe Road. No objections were made to these applications.

Correspondence

An Isos Housing Officer apologised for the late start to the grass cutting schedule and subsequent poor quality of work by the newly appointed contractors. The contractors have worked hard and taken on extra staff to get back on schedule. As this has now been achieved the quality of the grass cutting should be much better in the future. Showfield boundary hedge. Head of regeneration at Bellway wrote to say that meetings have taken place with Riverside Housing to develop plans for tree planting on the embankment north of the site. Permission has been received from the landowner to do the work, so they expect to be able to submit a planting scheme to the Council very soon.

Dog fouling on Shaftoe School Playing Field.

The Animal Welfare Officer is to maintain a watch on the public right of way across the field to try and prevent further dog fouling.

Cemetery

The cemetery maintenance worker has reported that some plots have sunk after the recent prolonged periods of heavy rain. He has re-filled at these points.

The church wall by the riverside picnic area is to be repaired.

Parish Projects

The Bridge Library is running very successfully and, with recently granted European funding, is financially secure for many years.

The final stages of the John Martin Heritage Project are well underway with work progressing on the martin Heritage Centre. It will open in the Community Centre at the end of September.

The site chosen for the information panel about the Old Bridge proved **continued on page 4**

unsuitable. A request has been made to English Heritage to fix the panel to the bridge.

Permission has been obtained from the owner of 1A, Ratcliffe Road, to fix a blue plaque to the wall of the house, to commemorate Philip Larkin's visits to the village.

The GITS raised £185 at the Jubilee Street Party and wish to use the money to commemorate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Celebrations. A tree or planters have been suggested for a site on Church Street. A seat with a commemorative plaque was also suggested. The Council congratulated the GITS on their organisation of a very successful celebratory Jubilee Street Party.

AoB

A complaint is to be made to NCC about the neglect of the Ratcliffe Road Rose Garden this year. It has in the past always been well tended by the County and District Councils.

The Council appreciate the changes being made in the running of the Post Office but some councillors expressed concern at the loss of the Trans-cash facility. MP

Parish Council Notes from the meeting held on July 26th.

Public participation.

Claire Marshall asked for the waste bins in front of her shop to be removed. One of the bins caught fire recently after a cigarette end was put in the bin while still alight. This has happened before and Claire is concerned about possible fire damage to cars parked nearby and to her shop. Now that dog waste is being left in these bins there is also a problem of foul smells during warm weather and of fly infestation. The Council is to consider purchasing a new enclosed bin to replace the bins in question, which are old and damaged.

Several complaints have been made about the grass cutting in and around the Strother Close - Langley Gardens area where maintenance of the grass verges and open spaces is the responsibility of ISOS. Since the new five year contract was awarded to Vale in April this year the standard of maintenance has been poor. Complaints are to be forwarded to ISOS.

The village handyman has now fixed the new seat into place at the east end of the village. It is however, difficult to see it due to the length of the grass verges in

this area, the responsibility this time of NCC Highways.

Council meeting

4 councillors and the NCC councillor, Alan Sharp were present. Cllr E Charlton was in the Chair.

NCC Report

The first phase of the road surfacing in Hordley Acres and Langley Gardens has been completed. Strother Close will be resurfaced later in the year. The planings from this work have been used to fill the holes in the back lane to the north side of Ratcliffe Road. Planings are also to be used to improve the surface of the lane along Alexandra Terrace.

50 - 60 tyres have been dumped in Langley Woods to the south of Langley Castle. NCC are to collect and dispose of them The Friends of Haydon Bridge Association has received £1000 from the NCC Community Chest, to help towards the purchase of a new printer for the Haydon News. Three new street lights are to be provided on the North Bank. Most of the street drains on the North Bank have been cleaned recently. However, the drains along Church Street have not been cleaned due to cars being parked over the drain covers when the workmen called. Residents have requested to be told when such work is to be carried out so they can ensure, as far as possible, that vehicles are not parked along the Street when the drains are due to be cleaned. Cllr Sharp is to ask for such notice to be given in future. The road name sign for Crook Hill, part of the Showfield development, is to be erected in the next few weeks. The Football Club have apologised for the disruption caused to riverside walkers by the development work at Low Hall Park.

Highways

A councillor asked whether the road bridge across the South Tyne at Haydon Bridge had been adopted by NCC. Following the opening of the bypass the de-trunked A69 through the village, including the bridge, was to be repaired before being handed over to the County Council for future maintenance. As repairs were not carried out it is unclear who is responsible for much needed maintenance work to the road surface and pavements on the bridge. Following a meeting between a small group of councillors and a representative from Network Rail, the Council was informed of the proposed changes to the footpath from Greenwich Gardens to Peelwell. This would involve the removal of the board walk and the provision of a foot bridge to carry the path across the railway line. The path would be diverted from Greenwich Gardens to cross the line near the lay by at Langlev Gardens. Some concerns were expressed about the possibility of children playing on the bridge and also some people continuing to use the present route and climbing over fences to cross the line.

The 30mph signs at the Peelwell junction on the North Bank have not been moved back from their present position at the junction. This was agreed some time ago when the signs in Station Road were repositioned. The Clerk is to contact NCC Highways on this matter.

Lighting

The tree branches covering the street lights in Church Street are to be cut back.

Planning

A new plan was presented for the housing development at Taits Yard. The layout of the development is very similar to the current one, which was granted planning permission some years ago. However, the new plan does involve provision of more garages and the loss of vehicular access to the rear of their properties for Victoria Terrace residents. One councillor declared an interest when the plan was presented. As only 4 councillors were present the withdrawal of a councillor meant that the meeting was no longer quorate, so no vote could be taken on the plan at the meeting.

Correspondence

NCC is to provide new dog fouling notices to display on waste bins, lamp-posts etc.

No plan has been produced yet for tree planting/hedge planting at the Showfield.

The Council are still waiting to receive the invoice for the new directional sign at the Church St/ Ratcliffe Rd junction. Only when the invoice is paid will the sign be produced and fitted.

Officers from the Community Police were in the village on 21st July dealing with anti social behaviour.

HISTORICAL NOTES OF HAYDON BRIDGE - Dennis Telford

THE HAYDON BRIDGE FLORAL AND HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

Part 7 1950 In July's issue of the Haydon News, I recalled the preparations for the 'Centenary Show' in 1950

The first exhibition of the Annual Haydon Bridge Floral and Horticultural Society was held in 1841. Due to the years interrupted by two World Wars, the centenary exhibition of the Society was not held until Saturday, September 2nd 1950.

The committee of the **1950** Haydon Bridge Floral and Horticultural Society must have been delighted that their hard work preparing for the **one hundredth** Haydon Bridge Show was justified, when over one thousand stands were benched in the marquees and more than four thousand visitors paid £300 for admission to the show field off the Langley Road. The numbers of visitors almost reached the records set for the show in the late nineteenth century, and many Haydonians who had moved away and settled in all corners of Britain, returned to the village for this social event of the year.

The canvas coverage in 1950 was twice the size of any previous Haydon Bridge Show in living memory, and many residents of the parish sacrificed their summer holidays to prepare the show field and tents for the exhibition.

Successive Society committees had been faithful to the show's original ideals, ensuring that the growth of the exhibition did not sacrifice the parochial competition between local gardeners. This continued in 1950, when fifty one classes were confined to exhibits grown by 'cottagers' residing within the Parish of Haydon. These exhibits were benched alongside fifty three classes open to all exhibitors; ten 'Farmers Classes' for turnips, potatoes, wheat and oats; sixteen classes for flowers and vegetables grown by members of the Haydon Bridge Branch of the British Legion; and fifty 'Industrial' classes for butter and eggs, bottled fruit, honey and jam, bread and cakes, needlework, knitting, and photographs.

The Industrial Classes in the Schedule were organised by the ladies committee of the Society, as they had been for many years previously.

The Centenary Show festivities commenced when Stan Hankin's Band played for a dance, in the Town Hall on Friday, August 4th 1950, and Irayeda (Dey) Armstrong of 35 Hordley Acres was chosen as Show Queen. Dey was accompanied by her attendants who had been chosen by their fellow pupils at Shaftoe Trust School: Lorna Dixon, Dorothy Ridley, Margaret Routledge and Linda Ridley.

At Low Hall Park, on the evening of Wednesday, August 30th, and following a parade through the village led by the Haydon Bridge Silver Band conducted by Harry Swallow, Irayeda Armstrong was crowned Show Queen by Mrs R. Allen, the wife of Colonel Robert Allen, the president of the Society. Mrs Allen was presented with a bouquet by Linda Ridley, one of the Queen's attendants. Following the crowning ceremony, a large crowd enjoyed a Comic Football Match between 'Haydon Ladies' and 'The Old Tymers'. On the following evening, the festivities continued with children's sports on the Haydon Park Cricket Field.

Almost every gardener and more than half the houses in the parish exhibited at the Centenary Show on September 2nd and in the 'Open Class' a unique competition was held, when the Royal Horticultural Society Veitch Memorial Medal was presented to a village Society for only the second time in its history.

The Veitch Memorial Medal may be awarded by the Royal Horticultural Society annually to persons who have made an outstanding contribution to the advancement of the art, science or practice of horticulture.

The prize was inaugurated in 1870, and was awarded to individuals by the RHS, from 1922.

The Medal is still a prestigious award today and, as far as I can tell, prior to 1950, the award had been presented to a Society only once before; twenty one years earlier.

The RHS Memorial Medal was awarded at the Haydon Bridge Centenary Show to **J.W. Ferguson of Willimoteswick**, the competitor winning the most prize money in the Open Section. Mr Ferguson, who had exhibited at the show for the previous five years, won nineteen prizes including thirteen 'first' red tickets, becoming the only holder of the award in the north of England and joining a list of the great and the good in horticultural circles.

Mr Ferguson's nearest challengers for the RHS medal were Haydon Bridge's Thomas Teasdale and William Watson. William won more prizes than any other exhibitor at the show, with flowers and vegetables grown in his renowned garden at West Rattenraw - or 'The Buildings' as it was commonly known in the 1950s. William also received the Bowes-Lyon Challenge Cup for the most points in the 'Cottager Class', ahead of his nearest rivals, Norman Veitch and Fred Pearson. Fred had held the trophy for the three previous years.

F lags and bunting decorated the village streets in 1950 for the first Saturday in September and, along with many other housewives in the village, my mam and grandma were up early in the morning getting everything and everybody ready for the do. After all, there was a lot of titivating up to do. The proggie mat from the front room had to be beaten, the house made spic and span, the bairns washed behind their lugs, cakes to be baked and trifles and cucumber sandwiches to be made before aunties, uncles, cousins, friends of the family and those Haydonians we'd seen neither hide nor hair of for a year, arrived on their annual visit for the big day. And let's not forget the finishing touches to the fancy dress costumes. It'll be two o' clock before we know it and we'll be off to the Station Yard where we'll join the procession walking through the village, across the bridge and up to the show field. We'll follow Harry Swallow and the Haydon Bridge Band, and Dey, the Show Queen, with Lorna, Linda, Margaret and Dorothy, her beautiful little attendants.

In 1950, Capt J. Straker and Mrs Straker of Threepwood, Colonel Swinburn of Staward Hall and Mrs Mellersh of Haydon Lodge were the judges who chose the winners in the fancy dresses:

<u>Girls</u>: Lorraine Turner (Mary had a Little Lamb), Joyce Adamson (Red Roses), Elizabeth Jeffrey (Carnival Girl), Margery Ohlson (Lavender Lady), Norma Brown (A Gypsy), Margaret Swallow (A Flower fairy), Maureen Brown (Chip off the Old Block) and Jennifer Jeffrey (Scarecrow).

Boys: Colin Edwards (Last Bevin Boy), Billy Herdman (A Footballer), Malcom Birnie (The Kitten), Wilfred Goodfellow (The Misfit) and Robert Tindale (The Rabbit). A full record of the awards made at the Centenary Show from the one thousand stands of flowers, fruit, vegetables and industrial sections staged by our amateur gardeners and housewives, would easily fill this Haydon News. There are, however, a number of local prize winners who caught my eye as being, perhaps, the most successful in the Cottagers', Farmers', British Legion and Industrial classes, in 1950:

Horticulture:

Billy Watson, Tommy Teasdale, Fred Pearson, Norman Veitch, Sid Young, George Stokoe, J. Dargue, Ted Raine, Jack Graham, J.Brown, (There are a few J. Browns!) Jeff Marshall - who had the best exhibit in the vegetable class - Robbie Murphy, T.F. White, Willie Kent, John Oliver, Dent Oliver, John Waugh and W.J. Clark.

Farmers' Classes:

J. McDonald, R. Ridley, W. Reed, Miss E. Veitch, Miss G. Veitch, E. Johnston and W. Glenwright.

British Legion Classes: John Graham - who had most points in both the veg. and flower sections. Peter Spooner, Maurice Brown, Ozzie Moore and Tony Havard.

Industrial Classes:

Mrs G. Wardle - who had the most points for bread and cakes. Mrs J. Ridley, Mrs R. Telford, Mrs Uldall, Mrs P. Spooner, Mrs W. Tait, Miss E. Harrison, Mrs E. Marshall, Mrs N. Westall, and Miss J. Rogan.

THE GEORGE ANDERSON ROSE BOWL

George Albert Anderson was born at Haydon Bridge on June 6th 1887 and played football, in goal, for Haydon Bridge, Mickley, Sunderland and Aberdeen F.C. Following his playing career, George joined the Aberdeen F.C. Board of Directors and in 1945/46 moved to Dundee F.C. as Managing Director.

At Dundee, George took his team to within one point of winning the Scottish First Division from Rangers, and to a Scottish Cup Final and two Scottish League Cup victories at Hampden Park. George went on to become a successful Aberdeen businessman but never forgot his Haydon Bridge roots. As well as providing football strips for our village team, in 1950 he provided a silver rose bowl to the Haydon Bridge Floral and Horticultural Society, to be presented for the best window box - and eventually hanging basket - in the village.

In addition to the exhibits in the marquees, there were lots of activities in the open, on the show field. These events included a programme of sports; twenty four dogs competing in the Sheep Dog Trials; many Powderhall runners competing in the Foot Handicaps; and some of the finest exponents of Cumberland and Westmorland Wrestling, in competition.

The one hundredth Haydon Bridge Show was a remarkable success, thanks to the work undertaken by the Society Committee and the co-operation received from parish organisations, businesses and the public; and local retailers festooned

In addition to the competitive exhibits in the scheduled classes, the Women's Institute provided an exhibition of their members' work and pupils from Shaftoe Trust School staged an exhibition of schoolwork, from the infants' class to advanced science and horticulture.

Following the presentation of the trophies and prizes, a bouquet was presented to the Show Queen by Miss Margaret Routledge.

The bouquet was later laid on the village War Memorial in memory of those parishioners who could not attend, having made the ultimate sacrifice

JAMES ROBINSON

One exhibitor who deserves a special mention in my report of the 1950 Haydon Bridge Show, is 90 year old James Robinson of Church Street.

James was Haydon Bridge's oldest resident in 1950 and he took three first prizes and a special award for the best stand of tomatoes.

Of special interest in the history of the Show, is ninety year old James's recollection of the first ever Haydon Bridge Show to be held under canvas. James remembered it being in the Anchor Yard when, unable to obtain a marquee for the occasion, members of the Society's committee collected sheets from the residents and spruce branches from nearby woods - Geeswood perhaps - to provide a cover for the exhibits.

As the Show moved from the Anchor Yard in 1865 and the society purchased its own marquee in 1868, if James did indeed remember the incident, he must have been around five years old at the time. It may be, of course, that he was told the story at a later date and remembered it, but whatever the case, the event as James described it is an interesting curiosity in the history of the Haydon Bridge Show.

A photograph of James Robinson was placed in the tent in 1950, alongside the photographs of the committee, in appreciation of his long association with the Society.

James Robinson was to compete in one more Show, in 1951, where he won prizes for tomatoes again, and potatoes.

Forty eight hours later James passed away, aged ninety one years.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

A pint or two of real ale can be a great pleasure when sampled in moderation in the midst of good company and, therefore, we look forward to the Carts Bog real ale and music festival 'Bog Stock' on August 3rd and 4th. The Haydon Local Artists' Summer exhibition is a most successful and appropriate spin off from our 2004 John Martin celebrations and continues to be enjoyed by the artists and visitors; like the Beer Festival, many of whom come from outside the parish.

As I write these notes, celebrations at the Haydon Bridge Football Club's Presentation Night will be in full swing. The football club's long history and its regular updating of facilities at Low Hall Park is testament to what can be achieved by committed volunteers working on behalf of the community.



Continuing on a footballing theme, I can report that we have a Lancashire team to follow this coming season, as twenty two year old Haydonian **Michael Liddle** makes his full season debut for Accrington Stanley, following his apprenticeship at Sunderland. We wish Michael well during this, the next stage of his professional career. **Dennis T**

HAYDON BRIDGE BEER FESTIVAL

More than 1,400 people visited the third Haydon Bridge Beer Festival on Friday and Saturday, July 6th and 7th. An attendance that was up by fifty per cent from last year and included local residents and, perhaps equally as important for those who seek to develop tourism in our parish, visitors from as far afield as Sweden. The atrocious weather on the Friday evening did little to dampen the enthusiasm of those present - typical Festival weather we heard it described as - and a large throng warmed to the entertainment provided by the village's Irish and NE47 Dance Troupes. It was a thrilling set from local band Pikey Beatz, however, that had the party goers on their feet dancing the night away, in spite of the conditions. A VIEW FROM UP THERE

Looking for some chutney in a supermarket the other day I came across a jar on the lid of which it said "Reject if this button is depressed". My first thought was how I was supposed to know whether the button was depressed – I guess sitting for days on a supermarket shelf is enough to depress the cheeriest soul. Should I try to cheer up the poor jar? And how cruel – to reject it just because it's going through hard times. So next time you are in our new Coop, take some jokes with you to cheer up the chutney and jam jars – the men in white coats will be right behind you !!!!

Talking of being depressed, do you really want to hear about the weather?? June was a remarkably dull and very wet month which broke many records across the UK. This was the third month in a row with average daytime maximum temperatures well below average and rainfall total well above average. Over April, May and June the total rainfall has been more than double the seasonal normal.

The cool and wet weather which has been predominant in recent months continued for most of June. The long-term average daytime maximum of 17.7 deg C was exceeded on only six days in total. Winds from a broadly easterly direction dominated again which brought low cloud and murky weather, although there were a few sunny periods on some days. Cloudy skies meant that night-temperatures rarely threatened to fall to freezing, with just one notable exception on the morning of the 4th when there was a slight ground frost.

Rain fell on 21 days and there were some exceptionally heavy falls. Between the 5th and 10th 56.3 mm of rain fell, 25.8 mm of which fell on the 8th. Between the 21st and 28th a further 65.8 mm was recorded of which 11.7 mm fell during a heavy thunderstorm on the afternoon of the 28th (rainfall intensity 13.5 mm/hr). Although the latter resulted in localised floods, it was considerably less than elsewhere in the north where rainfalls in excess of 40mm brought widespread disruption.

Rainfall, in combination with very low cloud (below 200 m base), resulted in some very dull days which prompted many folk to turn up their domestic heating. Log fires in June !!?? The farming year is well behind and vegetable plots/allotments have continued to suffer. There would appear to be very little promise of a crop on fruit trees. The humid conditions have also created an ideal environment for plant diseases and infestations. O woe, thrice woe !!!

We continue our series of articles on those individuals who died in the Great War. The biographies are published chronologically and the eighteenth casualty, in 1916, was James Edward Robinson

(18) James Edward Robinson

James served as Private, 1305, 1/4th Battalion, Northumberland Fusiliers. He died on 15th September 1916, aged 20.

Born in Haydon Bridge, he was one of ten children of James and Mary Robinson (nee Davidson).

He worked as a platelayer at Haydon Bridge station.

James enlisted at Pateley Bridge, Yorkshire.

As well as having his name on the War Memorial and the Reredos in St. Cuthbert's, James is also commemorated on the Shaftoe Trust School Memorial and the organ in the Methodist Church.



James has no known grave and is therefore commemorated on one of the panels on the Thiepval Memorial in France.



James's picture is one of 600 chosen in 2004 to form the "Panel of the Missing" which is displayed in the Thiepval Visitor Centre.

The churches for a number of years have celebrated the second Sunday in September as Racial Justice Sunday to help Christians develop the confidence to get to grips with prejudice and racism in themselves, in the church and in the wider community. It is hoped that then individuals might respect and honour those who are different from themselves.

The old story of the child talking to her mother about her new friend, and describing her as the girl with the red dress and red ribbons in her hair. What she did not describe was the colour of her skin which was ebony. We know that it is good that a small child has none of our prejudices. The story may or may not be true. But why do we applaud the child's lack of prejudice yet think it is all right for us to keep our prejudices, whatever form they take?

That needs to be updated for we have girls in the scouts now. Yet what a sentiment and ideal for all of us to live up. 
