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#### **EDITORIAL COMMENT**

So 'a room with a view' could be a thing of the past, particularly if it's a bedroom. Gone will be those hotels who advertise their (bed)rooms as having sea/mountain/city views. No longer will the clientele be expected to pay a premium for those (bed)rooms with the most favoured panoramas. Houses will no longer be advertised as having wonderful/attractive/ extensive views from all rooms. Not, that is, if folk pay heed to the latest pronouncement from the chairman of Northumberland West Area Planning Committee.

At their final meeting of 2011,the West Area Planning Committee approved a planning application for the building of a two storey office on the site of West End Joinery. I doubt whether there would be many who would object to the site being developed, it has been something of an eyesore for years. But objections were received from local residents concerned about loss of privacy and light. The plan was subsequently amended and received approval with the new building shown as being built 10m away from the end of Victoria Terrace.

However, someone, at some point, must have made reference to the loss of the view from their bedroom window, as the Chairman, Cllr I. Hutchinson, responded with, 'bedrooms are for sleeping in, not for looking out of!'

Now we know that loss of a view is not a major consideration in planning matters. You don't have to look too far in this village to witness the devastating effect of some recent planning decisions on some of the our most valued rural views. Nevertheless, such a remark does seem rather arrogant. Sitting rooms for sitting in; dining rooms for eating; and why is the kitchen sink by the window; and is a conservatory where folk of a particular political persuasion get into a jam??

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#### PARISH COUNCIL NOTES from meetings in Dec 2011 & Jan 2012

#### Meeting on the 15th Dec 2011

At a previous meeting a councillor expressed concern about an apparent increase in incidents of anti-social behaviour in the village. Representatives from the Community Police had been asked to come and talk with the Council on this matter but no one was available to attend the meeting.

However the Police did send a brief update on the issues raised by the Council. The following is a summary of the Police response.

The only complaint to the Police of

anti- social behaviour in the village in the last two months was on Oct 29th when a complaint was received about youths outside the old post office. This matter has been dealt with.

There have been no complaints or incidents reported at the railway station since Sept 3rd. Incidents that occur at the station are also passed to British Transport Police as the station platforms and tracks etc are their jurisdiction.

With regard to the cars parked on Ratcliffe road being scratched, I am aware of the incident via another source. However only one resident actually reported the matter to the police. The police are dealing with the matter of the broken window at the Anchor Hotel in November. At this time it would appear to be linked to another matter, and not a random incident of anti-social

The police have checked frequently for cars parked on the projecting pavement at the Ratciffe Road westbound bus stop. They have not seen any cars parked on the pavement at this section but will continue to monitor the situation and deal appropriately with any vehicle parked there.

Throughout the report the police reassured the Council that they regularly patrol the village and asked that members of the public report incidents to the police as soon as possible.

#### **Public participation**

behaviour.

A member of Network Rail staff reported incidents at the station and on Station Road. A member of the public reported problems with the behaviour of some people outside the newsagents both late at night and very early in the morning. It was suggested that these incidents be reported to the police.

#### Council Meeting.

9 councillors were present.

#### **NCC Report**

The road repairs in Strother Close, Langley Gardens etc are temporary. These areas are to be resurfaced in the next financial year.

£3,000 was awarded from Cllr Sharp's local works/initiative fund to Shaftoe school to help meet the costs of the biomass project.

#### Highways

Following an enquiry about road sweeping, the council received the following reply from NCC; 'NCC's policy is to visit the village four times per year with a large sweeper and sweep all the adopted curbed roads. In addition we have an operative in the village on Mondays and Fridays litter picking, removing dog fouling etc. We also respond to all reactive work reported by members of the public throughout the year'.

#### Lighting

The lamp post near the Health Centre has been replaced and is currently waiting for Northern Power Grids to reconnect it.

#### **Parish Projects**

The Council was informed of the Haydon Bridge Development Trust's Oil Co-operative initiative.

#### AOB

Councillors raised questions on the progress made towards getting an ATM installed in the village. Nothing has been heard of the proposals put forward by HSBC or the Co-op. It is known that Claire's Newsagent has made enquiries with Barclays Bank about installing an ATM, but has expressed concern about costs. Questions were also raised about the tree planting proposals at The Showfield as nothing has been done following the meeting between Parish Councillors, Planning Dept Officers and Bellway representatives.

#### Meeting held on 26th January 2012

#### **Public Participation**

A complaint was heard from a family about the allocation of social housing in the village. They are from Haydon Bridge, have a family of young children and have applied for social housing, but are experiencing difficulty obtaining a house. The local NCC councillor is to contact them to discuss their case.

Complaints were also received about overflowing waste bins at the cemetery and the general untidiness of the area with dead flowers littering the place. A further complaint was made about the west side of the cemetery which appears not to have been mown for some considerable time.

The person employed to maintain the cemetery is to be asked to empty the bins more frequently.

#### **Council meeting**

#### **NCC Report**

Cllr Sharpe informed the Council that NCC plan to resurface the roads in Langley Gardens, Greenwich Gardens and Hordley Acres in the 2012/13 programme of road works. It seems likely that Strother Close will not be resurfaced until later in 2013. The Rattenraw -Peelwell road is to be added to the list for possible future works and will continue to be monitored. It was noted that during the construction of the bypass the road was used by drivers wanting to avoid the road works. Repairs to the road were discussed at the time with the bypass contractors.

#### **Highways**

The Council has been informed by NCC that dog waste can now be deposited in standard litter bins. The Parish Council is responsible for the provision and installation of all litter bins including the replacement of damaged bins. However, charges for emptying bins will now only be made for bins on Parish Council owned land.

#### HISTORICAL NOTES OF HAYDON BRIDGE - Dennis Telford

I have many abiding memories, as a young child living in Haydon Bridge, of the joyous activities that went to make our village such a wonderful place in which to grow up; special occasions in which the whole community shared. There was, however, one event which was without doubt the highlight of our social calendar. Indeed, for most of its lifetime, it was an event which attracted many hundreds of visitors, not just from the parish but from all points east and west across the north of England.

Do you remember the Haydon Bridge Show?

September days brought memories so fine.

Folk came from the hills and the valleys below.

And on special trains on the Newcastle line.

Fine village gardens were shorn of their blooms,

Vegetables laid out row upon row,

All lovingly cared for by village sons,

And brought to perfection for the Haydon Bridge Show.

For a young child at Haydon Bridge, nothing surpassed the build-up to the Flower Show and the thrills generated on the big day; the first Saturday in September.

From the first arrival of Murphy's, Togood's or Slater's hoppings in McDonald's show field, until the last ornate caravan and low loader piled high with large sections of the dismantled dodgems, sideshows and shuggy boats made their way across the *(old)* bridge to their next engagement, our young hearts were filled with romantic notions of the travelling showman's nomadic existence.

For a week or more we lived in a wonderland of bright coloured lights, strident fairground organ music and a constant hubbub of chatter, laughter and screams of delight; all accompanied by the constant hum of the generators.

How very happy and impressionable we all were! For weeks following the showmen's visit, I would trail blocks of wood with Meccano wheels, behind Dinky lorries and land rovers, to all four corners of our sitting room carpet, loading and unloading imaginary hoppings for the 'Haydon Bridge Show'

and, with a little imagination, we transformed my dad's garden shed into a showman's caravan in which I and the rest of the John Martin Street gang played out the dream.

Fine painted horses on merry-go-round,

Roll down the penny but keep off the line,

Bairns pulling shuggy boats right off the ground,

In McDonald's field on the banks of the Tyne.

As pupils at Shaftoe Trust School - as it is in Mrs. Cox's school today - we always took part in village events and, before leaving for the summer holidays, there was a lot to prepare in readiness for the school's contribution to the Haydon Bridge September Show.

'Encouraged' with a hefty slap from Mr. Nicholson and a rap across the knuckles with a steel rule by Mr. Robinson - not as in Mrs. Cox's school today I'm sure - paintings, drawings, essays, our best efforts at handwriting, and book ends and table lamps made in woodwork were all completed and selected for entry to the show.

Stories we'd written when at Shaftoe Trust,

Were laid on the table for people to view.

And after the judging to the tent we all rushed,

To see who they'd given the red ticket to

Most importantly, the bonniest girls were chosen in competition to be the Show Queen and her attendants and, on the day of the show, they led the boys and girls and men and women of the village, dressed up in costume for the fancy dress parade.

Fancy dress led by the Haydon Bridge band,

Lads dressed as young lasses, women as men,

A bonny bit bairn with a wave of her hand,

Queen for the day, she'll remember it well.

I have to admit that, as time went by, the 'romantic notions' of the Haydon Bridge shows of my later teenage years had more to do with the girls of the parish, and those who visited from other towns and villages in the Tyne Valley, than nostalgia for a

showman's life. Sharing a spinning car on the waltzer, or a double seat in a dodgem car, provided a grand excuse to cuddle much closer than we had ever dared before, and a 1950s teenager's inhibitions were swept away on a rush of adrenaline and a cacophony of piped rock 'n roll and lusty ballads, echoing across the showfield from Bill Haley, Elvis, The Everley Brothers, Bobby Darin, Johnny Mathis and the like.

Show Saturday ended with a packed dance in the Town Hall, when the seats were pushed to one side and those experts in the terpsichorean art - a sprightly Geoff Duffy comes to mind - took to the floor in style, while the older boys and girls of my generation shuffled round in the Bradford Barn Dance.

A few steps in, a few steps out, Go round the best you can, Move on to another lass, And her another man.

Unless, that is, the partners chose to stay together and move on to a showfield event irreverently labelled by our late raconteur and naturalist Bill Tait as the 'Bankside Handicap'; a liaison that took place within earshot of the seductive music of the hoppings, but well away from prying eyes. I do not intend to name the runners and riders who partook of the 'event'. They know who they are!

It was a sad day when, in 1960, the show committee signalled the end of our famous annual Haydon Bridge gathering, one hundred and nineteen years after its inauguration, and for those Haydon News readers who were never party to this wonderful occasion on the first Saturday of every September, let me assure you:

## 'You've never seen nowt like the Haydon Bridge Show.'

Memories are all that there's left to recall,

Of queer goings on in the Haydon Town Hall.

The Flower Show's gone, no more for to be,

But these memories are safe here forever, with me.

**B**ut enough of this sentimental wallowing; having rolled six ping pong balls down a wooden slope into a narrow slot and knocked six tin cans off a shelf with a bean-bag, I'm off home, the proud owner of two goldfish, and it is time to return to my true brief for these

'Notes - a history of the Haydon Bridge Floral, Horticultural and Industrial Society and the Haydon Bridge Show.

The Haydon Bridge Floral and Horticultural Society was established in 1840 and its first Haydon Bridge Show was held on a Saturday in September in 1841, probably at the Black Bull Inn.

The property which was the nineteenth century 'Black Bull' at Haydon Bridge, is known as 'River House' in 2011 and is on the south side of Ratcliffe Road.

I do not have a record of the first and second shows, in 1841 and 1842, but the third exhibition of the Haydon Bridge Floral and Horticultural Society, held on Saturday September 2nd 1843, was considered important enough to be reported in the Newcastle Journal where it was described as being, 'numerously and respectably attended'.

Growing Dahlias for competition was a popular nineteenth century hobby, with Dahlia shows held throughout the north east, and the Newcastle Journal records the special awards presented to William Walton, Matt Hetherington and John Urwin for the best Dahlias at the Haydon Bridge society's third annual show in 1843.

The Journal report continues:

'A splendid bouquet of cut flowers was shown by Mr. Edward Dickenson which occupied the centre of the room and was admired by all. It is only justice to Mr. Dickenson to state that he is not yet twenty years of age and the skill he displayed would have done credit to the most practised hand in such matters.'

It was also reported that some very fine potatoes were shown by Mr. C. Pattinson and one by Mr. Armstrong which weighed three quarters of a pound.

By 1844, the society was holding weekly floral, fruit and vegetable competitions, alternately in the Black Bull and the Scotch Arms, where Dahlias, Pansies, Hollyhocks, French Marigolds, Carnations, Potatoes, Beans, Peas in a pod and various fruit were exhibited. Prizes in the weekly shows were won by J. Urwin, T. Dickenson, J. Robson, W. Coates, W. Pearson, S.G. Benson and T. Foster. John Urwin received a special mention for his four stalks of rhubarb which weighed 4lb 4ozs each, all taken from the same plant. Mr. Urwin's giant rhubarb was much admired!

The fourth Annual Show of the Haydon Bridge Floral, Horticultural and Industrial Society was held on Friday and Saturday September 20th and 21st 1844.

This seems to have been the first occasion on which the show was held outdoors, in a 'spacious pavilion' at the Anchor Inn, where a band from Hexham played music and 'enlivened the scene ....... the pavilion was appropriately decorated with evergreen flowers and beautiful exotic plants from Whitfield Hall'.

The Annual Show in 1844 included classes for; Market Gardeners, Nurserymen, Gentlemen's Gardeners, Amateurs and Cottagers, and prizes for exhibits were awarded to:
Thomas Dickenson, Matt and William Hetherington, John Urwin, Francis Davison, Matt Pigg, Isaac Bell, John Corbitt, William Walton, Robert Armstrong, William Pollard, John Robson, Alex Drummond of Ridley Hall and William Coates of Lipwood.

Special prizes for cottagers described as, 'residing in the Chapelry of Haydon and not holding more than one chain and a half of land', were won by John Pattison of Peelwell and John Elliott of Pandon.

The prize for the best imperial bushel of white wheat was won by William Longhorn of the Mill Hills and a prize for red wheat and barley was won by Mr. Cowing of Low Hall.

After the prizes had been awarded, seventy members of the society sat

down to dinner provided by Mrs. Hetherington of the Anchor Inn, 'in her best style'. William Longhorn was Chairman for the evening and Mr. Benson of Allerwash Vice Chairman.

According to reports:


'The evening was spent in the most convivial manner and all went off with harmony and glee.

During the afternoon of the second day, a number of poor people were admitted for free and, although the pavilion was crowded to excess, yet, the greatest order and regularity prevailed' - In spite of the presence of the 'poor people' I suppose!!

The spacious pavilion, the number of exhibits and exhibitors, not to mention 'special cheap train fares' from Newcastle, suggest that the show at Haydon Bridge came of age in 1844 and, from this first exhibition at the Anchor Inn, the Haydon Bridge Show soon built a reputation as the premier exhibition of its kind in the north of England; an event which attracted hundreds of visitors to our village every year.

It is no doubt significant in the Haydon Bridge Show's development that the Newcastle-Carlisle Railway had opened along its full length on June 18th 1838, and the shareholders in the railroad company were eager to provide transport to events along the length of the line and, by doing so, attract customers to their investment.

This is the earliest image of a train leaving Haydon Bridge station you are likely to see. The engraving was published in 1836 from original drawings by John Wilson Carmichael, with text written by engineer John Blackmore.

Notice the east bound train using the south line. This was the case until March 1864 when the change was made to eastbound on the north line and westbound on the south line.

From September 1841, trains were transporting passengers from Newcastle and Carlisle to the Haydon Bridge Show.

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The Haydon Bridge Floral and Horticultural Society continued holding its weekly exhibitions in local hostelries in 1845, and the fifth Annual Haydon Bridge Show was held on Saturday September 13th 1845.

The display of fruit, vegetables and flowers were reported as being, 'of the best possible description and elicited the warmest of praise'.

The prizes in 1845 are worth recalling. They included, in addition to money prizes of five shillings; silver snuff boxes, pruning knives, a garden rake to John Elliott of Haydon Bridge station, a draw hoe to James Nicholl of Haydon Bridge. And - wait for it - a pig ....... to John Coulson of the Waterhouse Inn, for the best collection of vegetables.

I will leave my history of the Haydon Bridge Show, for this month, with an interesting report of the sixth annual show held on Saturday September 5th 1846. A show described as the, 'best exhibition held since the formation of the society in 1840'.

#### **NEWCASTLE JOURNAL: SEPTEMBER 12th 1846**

**E**arly in the morning (September 5th.) there were observable indications of a fete at Haydon Bridge. The anxious housewife was busy at her domestic toil preparing for the reception of the many guests who, from the neighbouring towns, were intending to participate in the pleasures of the kind and hospitable villagers.

It was quite a delight to witness a meeting like this comprised of all grades of society. Such scenes may be looked upon as the surest mode of forming that bond of union between the wealthy and the less fortunate which no human power can dissolve.

Among the company present were:

The Venerable Archdeacon Scott, President of the society. Wm. Ord Esq., MP & Mrs. Ord, Whitfield. Mrs. Davidson & party, Ridley Hall. Col. & Mrs. Coulson, Blenkinsopp. Capt. Coulson, Low Warden. R.Reed & Mrs Dickinson of Haydon Bridge. All of whose kind attention to the humble classes in their respective districts are well known and duly appreciated.

It was gratifying to see the number of children which visited this exhibition. With early impression properly fostered and encouraged, they might learn to know the bounty of God's gifts to man.

Hundreds of the country people whose occupations prevented them attending during the day visited in the evening. In the afternoon sixty gentlemen sat down to an excellent dinner at the Anchor Inn, provided by Mrs. Hetherington whose proficiency in gastronomic science is too well known to need one word of praise.

#### LOWINGER MADDISON

In response to my recollections of the inundation of the River Tyne in November 1771, (HN November 2011) Willam Veitch provides further information on the man who re-built the Haydon bridge following the flood. The contract was awarded to Lowinger Maddison and partners.

The man who rebuilt the bridge at Haydon Bridge, after the Great Flood of 1771, was a mason from Stanhope in Weardale. His unusual Christian name had been used by the Maddisons of Stanhope for many generations. In those early days the term 'mason' could apply to anyone from a simple worker to what today would be a building contractor.

Despite the magnitude of his task, Lowinger obviously had time for other things as, on the November 4th 1773, he married Elizabeth Scott at Warden. They must have set up home at Hexham as they had children there - Ann, Mary, Elizabeth and William. The obvious attractions of Haydon Bridge must have impressed Lowinger, however, as, in 1783, he moved his family to Harlowfield (Langley) where further children Margaret, John, George and William were born (the first William having died there two years earlier). Unfortunately Margaret, John and the second William all died at Harlowfield before reaching adulthood.

Lowinger Maddison died at Harlowfield and was buried at Haydon Bridge on November 19th 1802. His wife Elizabeth died at Harlowfield, age 67, on August 20th 1816.

The Lowinger family did not desert Harlowfield as, on May 9th 1801, Mary Maddison married Michael Pigg and on July 11th 1807 Elizabeth Maddison married William Pigg.

Mary had a daughter born five weeks after they married. Both grooms came from Whitfield and both families continued to live at Harlowfield.

As Lowinger had become a 'naturalised' Haydonian he must have found gainful employment and, living at Langley, this could have been in the Lead Industry.

One oddity in the Great Flood of November the 16th and 17th 1771 is that on November 17th 1771, Thomas Robson of Dean Raw was buried.

How did they get Thomas's body across the river?

Maybe they had been very fortunate and had taken his body to the Old Church the day before. Certainly it is a burial that the family would never forget.

#### **GOOD NEWS OF GREAT JOY**

The message of Christmas was brought to the streets of Haydon Bridge on Saturday December 17th, when Ratcliffe Road and Church Street hosted a very special 'Street Nativity' performed by Joyce Armstrong, Kathleen Armstrong, William Hopkins, Ethel Mason, Peter Parker, June and Michael Rumney, Sylvia Swinburn, Christine and Pamela Thompson, Gary and LauraThompson, Dave and Will Thornhill.

On the site of Haydon Bridge's nineteenth century Wesleyan Chapel (1874 - 1946) the Rev Les Hann introduced the Christmas story and the assembled cast and followers, including a heavily pregnant Mary, sung 'O Little Town of Bethlehem' with great gusto.

The group continued to proclaim the Christian message along Ratcliffe Road and upon reaching the General Havelock Inn, Joseph and Mary sought a room there. Sadly, the couple were left in no doubt, by a licensee seemingly reluctant to draw the bolts, that there was no room for them at the inn. Mary's air of anticipation soon turned to one of disappointment at being turned away by an innkeeper she felt certain would have been more understanding of her plight.

The sight of a hostelry 'round the corner' on Church Street raised the spirits of Joseph and Mary and the many followers who had gathered together to serenade them with percussion, wind instruments and song. At the Railway Hotel, however, after a resounding chorus of 'Rat-a-Tat-Tat' at the door, Bronia was equally dismissive, offering nothing but a high priced room the couple could ill afford and sending them on their way in the direction of a rude crib, laid at the foot of a reverend monument to those who had fought and died for their country.

It was at this enshrined spot, in the shadow of the Church of St Cuthbert and below the flickering lights on a tree prepared specially to mark the festive occasion, where the birth of the baby Jesus was celebrated.

The child, wrapped in swaddling cloth and lying in the manger, was showered with gifts as three Kings crossed the River Tyne from the direction of the Royal Anchor Inn, shepherds drove their flocks south from windswept Haydon Fell, and wise men set aside their Haydon News crosswords. All were determined to be present, as the assembled cast and congregation celebrated the birth of the Messiah with moving renditions of 'Silent Night' and 'Away in a Manger'.

As a final act in this special event, celebrating the Christmas message on the streets of Haydon Bridge in 2011, the Rev Hann extended a prayer to all; in the hope that they be brought close to one another this Christmas and in the years ahead, in the memory of Jesus Christ.

Amen.

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#### A VIEW FROM UP THERE .....

John Harrison

As I approach the milestone of 65 yrs of age I realise that the state will now be providing me with the means to treat myself to an extra pint of beer per month. And what has happened in the 50 (nearly) years of ale drinking? When I embarked on this journey, my local offered the standard three colours of wine plus the usual bitter, best bitter and mild – now I go into a pub and have to ask for a pint of Farting Frog or Duck's Bum. And I am not allowed just to order a white wine, I am supposed to have preferences for country of origin and the type of grape used. Has life become more complicated or has my approaching milestone qualified me to become an overnight GOM?

There are two months' worth of weather and a whole year to fit into my report this month so bear with me. **November** was a mild and quite dry month. Daytime temperatures were well above normal, which was common across the UK. Cloudy skies meant that night frosts were rare but the first air frost was logged on the 6th. The first three weeks were remarkably dry, only 8mm of rain having fallen by the 19th. Less settled weather then brought the final total up to 44 mm but much of this rain was showery. November was rather more dull and murky than the traditional foggy. Many of my garden plants were still in bloom at the end of the month.

**December** was dominated by relatively mild and wet westerly/north-westerly winds (29/31 days). Unsettled weather patterns associated with the passage of occasionally deep Atlantic depressions brought a mixture of exceptionally mild weather in tropical air and more typical colder weather with frost and snow in polar air. Relatively colder conditions were dominant between the 5th and 20th during which there were ground frosts on most nights. Light sleet or snow fell but very little accumulated on the ground, in contrast to higher ground above 300m where there were significant accumulations. Mild air arrived behind a warm front and the days from the 21st were generally very mild. The daytime temperature on **Christmas Day** reached a remarkable **12.8degC**. Like much of 2011 the wind occasionally became strong with gale-force gusts, causing some minor local damage.

Taken as a package, 2011 was a strange year with drought in April, a cool and wet summer, and a warm last four months. November and December together gave us only 9 air frosts compared to 32 in 2010. The wettest month of the year was August with 147mm but by the end of the year we had received roughly 89 % of the long-term annual average. A particularly personal memory of 2011 for me has been the number of occasions when the wind has been strong enough to cause damage – the prophets of doom tell us that this is a manifestation of the effects of our old friend 'global warming'. I think we are eating too many beans if truth be told.



#### HAYDON BRIDGE WAR MEMORIAL by Pam and Ken Linge

We continue our series of articles on those individuals who died in the Great War. The biographies are published chronologically and the twelfth casualty, in 1916, was

#### **Francis McGurk**

#### (12) Francis McGurk

Francis served as Corporal, 1257, 1/4th Battalion, Northumberland Fusiliers. He died on 4th August 1916, aged 21.

Born in Bishop Auckland, Co. Durham, he was one of six children of Michael and Jane McGurk (nee Jolly). Francis was educated at Haydon Bridge, and was a pre-war Territorial. He was mobilised and went to France on 20th April 1915.

Francis was a splendid shot and was soon appointed as a sniper. It was reported that he was full of humour under all circumstances, when a shell had burst close to him he would remark. "That was a near one, that would clip the whiskers for you." He was wounded while out sniping and died the same day at the dressing station where he was being treated.

As well as having his name on the War Memorial and the Reredos in St. Cuthbert's Francis is also commemorated on the Shaftoe Trust School Memorial.

Second-Lieut. G. E. Charlewood, wrote:-

"..... Your son was a splendid soldier, able and keen, and I think one of the bravest men I have ever met, and I looked upon him as my right hand man at his job.

He was greatly beloved by his companions ......... And I shall also miss him enormously, as he was always cheerful, and an exceptionally nice fellow, and I am very sorry indeed to lose him."





Francis is buried in grave II.F.140 in Bailleul Communal Cemetery Extension.

#### THE PARISH PRECEPT (Annual budget)

Each year the Parish Council meet in the autumn to consider its expenditure in the following financial year. A contribution towards this expenditure is paid by each household as part of the Council Tax. In 2011/2012 there was a slight reduction in the Parish Council's expenditure compared to the previous year. There are always likely to be small fluctuations each year as special one off payments for repairs or new equipment may be needed one year but not the next. For 2012/13 the following expenditure was agreed.

Administration including audit fee, payroll services, stationery, postage, subscriptions etc	£1048

Based on the above possible expenditure the Parish Council have asked NCC to approve a Parish Precept of £38,400 for the financial year 2012/13. This represent a further decrease in the Parish budget. However, it should be noted that usually the Council set aside amounts for future expenditure on extending the cemetery; repair and replacement of information panels on the John Martin Trail and for Trail leaflets; Spa Well repair and maintenance; Riverside Picnic Area improvements and major repairs/ replacement of play equipment at Shaftoe Green. As the money set aside for these projects is at a reasonable level the decision was taken not to set aside further funds this year.

\*The Parish Council has been informed that dog waste may now be placed in ordinary litter bins. If this is the case, then the dog waste bins may be removed in the future as this would be a substantial saving in the annual budget. NCC do not charge for emptying litter bins.

## CONGRATULATIONS WILL! RSPCA YOUNG PHOTOGRAPHER OF THE YEAR AWARD

16 year old winner of the RSPCA Young Photographer of the Year Award, Will Nicholls, developed a simultaneous interest in wildlife and photography when he moved with his family from Newcastle to Haydon Bridge. Stimulated by the great variety of wildlife and the beautiful countryside on his doorstep, he borrowed his parents' digital camera and took his first photograph of sheep.

Discovering a specific site from which to observe, feed and photograph red squirrels over a period of three years, Will has been able to develop and fund his hobby himself, by selling his work.

At the moment Will is trying a remote release technique to take photographs. This will allow him to have the camera outside the hide, so the subject can get very close to the lens, and allow for a unique perspective to his shots.

At some stage Will hopes to take part in developing and presenting TV wildlife programmes, particularly conducting scientific expeditions, but is also interested in travelling the world in search of and studying wildlife. We wish him success.

#### Parish Council Notes (cont'd from page 3)

Any bins on or adjacent to the public highway will be emptied free of charge.

NCC have requested information on traffic and street name signs that need replacing/cleaning/rescuing from overgrown trees and hedging; gullies and ditches that need clearing/digging; information on problematic highway areas where minor traffic management may be required. Work on these is to be carried out in early 2012 once local priorities have been identified.

#### Lighting

Councillors welcomed the new street lights in Ratcliffe Road as being more appropriate to the village.

A new street light is to be provided on North Bank where there is a long gap between existing street lights. Cllr Sharp is to fund this from his 'councillors' local projects fund'.

Several complaints have been received by councillors from people who use the old bridge and are dazzled by the recently installed floodlighting. Modifications to the existing lights are to be sought to help solve the problem. It was suggested that the lights be removed if, after modification, the problem still exists.

#### **Planning**

The following planning applications were received; Installation of a 24hr ATM cash machine into the existing elevation at 4, Ratcliffe Road. (*Co-op shop*). The Council supported this application.

Construction of garage/store and creation of a new gateway in the existing stone wall at the Old Vicarage, Haydon Bridge. No objections were raised.

#### Correspondence

A letter and maps were received from NCC to explain those areas in the village where grass cutting is the responsibility of NCC.

In response to the enquiry made last month, about the, previously proposed provision of an ATM cash machine by HSBC/BT, the Council was informed that this project has now be abandoned. (Cont'd top of next column)

#### **CHANGE OVER TO DIGITAL TELEVISION**

Our region is the last one in England to change over to Digital TV. The change over to digital television is taking place on September 12th for BBC 2, and September 26th for all other TV channels. The current analogue provision will be switched off on these dates and Freeview coverage boosted to reach virtually all homes, including thousands served by local relay transmitters who will be able to receive digital TV free via an aerial for the first time.

There's plenty of help available for those who need more information. The Digital UK website at <a href="digitaluk.co.uk">digitaluk.co.uk</a> has lots of information about how to switch to digital; viewers can call the Digital UK advice line on **08456 50 50 50** and if you need face-to-face advice you can speak to your local television retailer.

Around 3 months before the switchover happens, every household will be sent a handy how-to guide giving all the information needed to set up and retune digital equipment. The **Switchover Help Scheme**, run by the BBC, helps older and disabled people to make the change to digital TV. For £40 (or free for those on certain income related benefits) every eligible person will be offered practical help to convert one of their TV sets to digital including equipment, installation and aftercare. People are eligible if they are aged 75 years and over, if they have lived in a care home for 6 months or more, if they are registered blind or partially sighted or get (or could get) certain disability benefits.

This order was linked to orders from Allendale and Tarset to give a grand total of almost thirty thousand litres. This was secured at 56.9 pence per litre – excluding VAT. This time there was insufficient interest to place a diesel order but do keep the option in mind. Delivery appears to have been very prompt and trouble free.

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
