Hints from the last century



PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

MEETING OF HAYDON PARISH COUNCIL AT 7PM ON 27TH OF SEPTEMBER 2018, AT HAYDON BRIDGE COMMUNITY CENTRE.

Present : Cllrs I. Burrows, E. Charlton, E. Faulks, V. Fletcher, A. Kirsopp, K. Richardson, A. Sharp, R. Snowdon, J. Thompson and D. Thornhill; C. McGivern (mins.), public & press.

1. Public participation –

a) Mrs Armstrong asked about the pedestrian crossing on Ratcliffe Road. Cllr Charlton explained that it could not be turned on at present as there were no zig-zag lines marked on the road. Cllr Faulks said that the plan was to leave the road as it is for 6 months, and then a public meeting will be held, with PC and representatives of NCC present to allow everyone who wishes to do so to have their say. Cllr Thornhill had heard from several people who were in favour of the de-regulation of the road. Cllr Sharp said that camera surveys were being carried out, and results were expected in the next few weeks. It was noted that NCC are now moving away from enlarged 20mph zones, as they feel this are less productive. Statistics have shown that slowing traffic in the centre of the village puts drivers coming off the A69 and using it as a shortcut.

b) Mrs Brown asked whether the grave digging fee was still £400, and the Clerk confirmed that this was the case.

c) Householders living near the proposed new location for the bus stop on Ratcliffe Road had been consulted. Most had responded to say that they had concerns about the proposal. The PC has no plans to pave over the rose beds as had been suggested. If the crossing does not move, then it would not be possible to move the bus stop.

2. Apologies – were received from Cllr. L. Thompson.

3. **Minutes of previous meeting** – having been circulated the minutes were approved and signed. Cllr. J. Bates had been mistakenly left of the list of Cllrs present at the July meeting.

4. **Declarations of interest** – none were received.

5. Report from Northumberland County Council -

Cllr Sharp said that the grills in the pavements still need to be cleaned out, and some drains still need to be attended to. Cllr Richardson said that the drains opposite 32 Strother Close are full of silt. The warning sign at the top of North Bank should be installed soon. The next meeting to discuss funding from the Community Chest will be in September, although there will be another chance to apply in January. The PC has raised several concerns with the Planning dept. recently, and Cllr Sharp said that he felt it was important to proceed with a Neighbourhood Plan for Haydon Bridge. Potholes

need to be repaired on the Newbrough road. The road into the village, west from the bypass, is in need of resurfacing. Cllr Thornhill said that NCC has agreed to repair the gate into the cemetery above Alexandra Tce. He reminded Cllrs that the War Graves Commission wished to put a sign on the cemetery gate, but it was not strong enough at present. Cllr Snowdon asked whether Cllr Sharp had received written confirmation that drainage issues at the fire station site were being addressed. This had not been received yet.

6. Highways –

a) The options for a replacement bin in the layby were considered. It was agreed to go for option 3 a re-used bin, to be installed by the Handyman.

7. Lighting –

a) Cllr Charlton asked when the remaining orange street lights would be replaced. This should happen by the end of October.

8. Planning applications -

18/03094/VARYCO Variation of condition 2 pursuant to planning permission 17/02577/FUL in order to amend the location of the access road and unit 4-5 at former Fire Station Haydon Bridge – **Object for the following reasons** –

i) To alter the entrance to this development, and move bin collection outside onto Station Road is dangerous and unnecessary. Provision should be made within the site. The Parish Council notes that Case Officer Sashi Bhatta states that "the position of refuse collection point shown on the plan 200/01 Rev 26 is not acceptable", and they share this view.

ii) Documents included in the online plans for this development suggest that it is planned to tap into drains which appear to be on private land. Has permission been given for this?

iii) The online application includes reports from Apex Acoustics and others which look at the noise levels on the site, as it sits close to the railway. All of these reports seem to be using different plans to those received by the Parish Council. No explanation has been provided for why this should be so.

iv) A site layout plan is provided for the beginning of construction. This suggests that construction will be from timber frames, with a skin of stone/brick. Timber frame construction has not been mentioned elsewhere in the plans. Why has there been no explanation of this change?

v) The above mentioned acoustics reports refer to construction from blocks, with infill, and then outer layer of brick/stone. The readings for noise would be completely different for timber framed buildings. Again,

there is no explanation for this.

vi) In addition, if timber framed buildings are to be constructed then fire certificates and quite different separation distances would need to be provided, and this does not appear to be the case.

The Parish Council wishes to receive written clarification on all of these points.

18/02905/FUL Proposed loft conversion with dormer to rear and side, Alderside, 8 John Martin Street – **no objections.**

18/03272/FUL Change of Use from C1 (Guest House) to C3 (Domestic Dwelling) at Hadrian Lodge – **Object for the following reason** –

i) This was built as a place of employment and the Parish Council object to the loss of another employment site in the parish. The Parish Council would like to it to be proved that this is not a going concern, before change of use is allowed.

18/03150/FUL Proposed four bedroom detached dwelling, together with associated gardens landscaped areas and parking on land south east of Rest and be thankful, Haydon Bridge – **Object for the following reasons** –

i) Access is via one entrance, which would be shared with other properties onto North Bank. This is a safety issue.

ii) The Parish Council is concerned that the proposed development in a green space may set a precedent allowing for infill with more properties at a later date.

18/02997/LBC Listed Building Consent for reinstatement of cast-iron, rain water, drainage down-pipe on the front elevation at 22 Shaftoe Street – **no objections.**

18/02905/FUL Proposed loft conversion with dormer to rear and side at 8 John Martin Street – **no objections.**

9. Accounts -

As in budget.

I. Playgrounds - Cllr Faulks said that the funds set aside for the play areas in the village looked healthy. Mr Oliver felt that an additional trustee should be sought and Robert Adams has been recommended. Mr Adams said that he was willing to stand and this was agreed. Due to this an amendment to the existing bank mandate will be made adding his name for the bank account relating to the play areas.

10. Correspondence –

a) Mrs MacDonald had been in contact with the PC as her sheep had got into the cemetery following damage to the fence. It was agreed that the PC would on this occasion pay 50% of the cost.

11. Parish projects –

a) **The Bridge and the Development Trust** – The DT is overseeing the spending of funding received from the Coop. Flower beds have been improved and the next stage is to install signs at either end of the village. The locations have been agreed with NCC. These will be near the gate into Langley Gdns at one end of the village,

and near the Low Hall layby at the other. The PC will oversee the funding of this project. Cllr Charlton went on to explain that new picnic tables are envisaged for the picnic area, and the PC already has funds set aside for this work.

b) **Neighbourhood Plan** – Mr Fletcher reported on a recent meeting of the sub-group and set out next steps as follows –

Initial public consultation meeting in January 2019, with pre-publicity via the Haydon News and Haydon Bridge Matters. NCC can help design posters and a drop-in session.

Developing terms of reference for and recruiting the Steering Group. NCC will attend as many meetings of the Steering Group as they are able.

2 Agreeing the scope of the plan and developing a project plan.

Applying for a grant from Locality AFTER these initial steps have been completed. The main purpose of a grant is to employ a local planning consultant.

12. Any other business -

a) **Hanging baskets** – Cllr Fletcher said that she would collect the hanging baskets in again. The PC agreed to have hanging baskets again in 2019.

b) Cllr Snowdon noted that the **planning application for a garden studio** has now been agreed under delegate powers.

c) ClIr Charlton asked whether there had been any feedback about repairs needed to **footpaths at the Spa Well**. A number of people have been asking when this will be carried out as money was provided by government to carry out repair work following Storm Desmond. ClIr Sharp will investigate.

d) At **Allen Banks paths** also remain in need of repair. There is no path between Ridley and Plankey Mill. It was agreed that Cllr Charlton would provide details to the Clerk so that this could be raised with the National Trust.

A VIEW FROM UP THERE

Now that warm sunny weather is but a memory of summer days gone by I thought it would be appropriate, now that bare flesh equates to hypothermia, to share a humorous story about nudity as seen through a child's eyes. A man and his family were driving home from a day at the seaside when a woman in back seat of the convertible ahead of them stood up and waved. She was stark naked! The man and his wife were dealing with the shock when their young daughter piped up "'Mummy, that lady isn't wearing a seat belt!'

My early primary school memories of 'seasons of the year' were to expect in September a mixture of warm sunny days with the first frosts, and of autumnal storms with mist and fog. It has always seemed to me to be a mixed up sort of month that throws a jumbled package of all-sorts at us. There is, however, a general end-of-summer feel about it. True to form, September this year was generally rather cool, damp and windy and was indeed typical of autumn.

The summer's heat lingered for only a couple of days, the temperature reaching 24.7 degC on the 2nd. By early on the 3rd Atlantic weather systems assumed control and the remainder of the month was unsettled with the wind persistently between south-west and north-west - and the first of the autumnal storms put in an appearance. Although there was a persistent cloud cover and relatively strong winds, there was remarkably little rain which tended to be showery except on two notable days, the 10th and the 20th. Both days were very windy but the latter was the more exceptional. The wind remained at gale force for many hours and gusted to storm force. Many trees and branches were brought down and there was widespread travel disruption. Averil and I had to travel west on the 20th and had to negotiate a large number of trees which had fallen across the main roads. We were impressed with the speed at which most of these had been cleared away. At home, our apple tree shed most of its crop in the space of an hour or so. The 20th was also the wettest day (33.8 mm) since December 2015 which we remember as 'Storm Desmond'. Fortunately the ground in the Tyne river catchments remained particularly dry after the summer drought, so we didn't experience significant flooding.



A notable feature of unsettled cyclonic weather is the variation in temperature from day to day. Typically, the eastwards passage of a warm front on the 26th brought about a marked increase in temperature after what had been a spell of cool weather. As pressure began to rise towards the end of the month the skies cleared bringing some sunny weather, but temperatures began to fall at night and the first ground frosts arrived.

Despite the heavy rain on the 20th, by the end of the month the ground remained remarkably dry down to a considerable depth, and it may be some while before this depleted store is replenished.

REMEMBRANCE 100

After German forces entered Belgium on August 3rd 1914, Britain declared war on the aggressor, on August 4th 1914. Four years and 100 days later on November 11th 1918, the Great War ended.

Those who gave their lives in pursuit of our freedom have not been forgotten in our parish.

Pristine headstones tended by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission stand erect in St. Cuthbert's Church cemetery above Alexandra Terrace; framed photographs of our war heroes hang in pride of place in the village Community Centre; an inscribed table here and a stone plague there are testament to individuals who made the ultimate sacrifice; and, of course, an annual reading of the names of the fallen, in the shadow of our Haydon Bridge Memorial, will keep their names alive. As will the local biographies - as part of the remarkable research undertaken by Pam and Ken Linge - each one published in The Haydon News. And, I guess that many readers, like me, can open a drawer at home to find a photo of a proud ancestor in his or her forces' uniform, no longer with us in life, but, remembered forever through a sepia image, in death.

In this significant month of remembrance, my Notes are dedicated to those who gave their lives on our behalf, with a brief look at five permanent Haydon Bridge memorials to 'The Fallen'.

THE HAYDON BRIDGE WAR MEMORIAL UN-VEILED

The Haydon Bridge memorial of a life size figure, in bronze, was commissioned by a parish committee and depicts a Northumberland Fusilier in his full fighting equipment. The monument was erected on a six feet by four feet base of Woodburn stone and unveiled in its (original) position on Sunday afternoon, September 21st 1921, between two Lime trees planted by councillors John Davidson and Thomas Carrick some years earlier. The memorial was on a raised platform approached by three steps from the roadway and enclosed on three sides by stone walling. The original wall at the rear and to the south, running parallel to the River Tyne, was used to house two bronze tablets bearing the names of fifty six men and one woman who died due to the Great War, out of around three hundred and fifty who joined up from the parish. The inscription on the base reads:

IN PROUD AND LOVING MEMORY OF THE MEN OF THE PARISH OF HAYDON WHO GAVE THEIR LIVES FOR KING AND COUNTRY IN THE GREAT WAR 1914—1919

At three o' clock on a fine afternoon, the parish's exservicemen under Captain Blaney M.C., the officers in full regalia, and members of the Haydon Lodge of the R.A.O.B. marched in procession from the station yard to the site of the memorial where relatives of the fallen were seated. Supporting the Vicar and chairman of the War Memorial Committee, the Rev. W.H. Ainger, at the ceremony was Brigadier-General Sir Charles Loftus Bates K.C.M.G., C.B., D.S.O. and the hymn , 'Oh God Our Help In Ages Past' was sung and accompanied by the Haydon Bridge Brass Band. A dedicatory prayer was read by the Rev. J.E. Trantor of the Congregational Church.

The Last Post was sounded as Sir Loftus Bates drew the cord holding a Union Jack and exposed the figure:



'standing at the ready, grasping the rifle in both hands with the grim and determined countenance typical of the man in the trenches as he fearlessly awaited the order': "Over the top".

The chairman of the Memorial Committee expressed his hope that the memorial would be a constant reminder of glorious deeds done by those at rest, and a stimulus to those living in Haydon Bridge to show something of the loyalty, self sacrifice and perseverance they had shown. The chairman then handed the custody of the memorial to the Parish Council; the National Anthem was sung, and a large number of floral tributes were laid at the base of the memorial.

In November 1948, the names of sixteen men who gave their lives in World War II were added to the Haydon Bridge War Memorial.

The names of those who lost their lives due to World War II were unveiled by Major General F.W. Festing C.B., C.B.W.E., D.S.O. Honorary Colonel of the 4th Battalion Northumberland Fusiliers. On this occasion, the Vicar conducting the service was W.J. Lapping and the prayers were offered by W. Morris (Congregational), Lesley G. Buckingham (Methodist) and Mr. Dan Liddle who had fought in the conflict. The Last Post and Reveille were sounded by Harry Swallow, Haydon Bridge bandmaster.

On June 21st 1969, the War Memorial was moved to a new site on Church Street when a new bridge was built across the River Tyne.

(My original Notes and references describing the Haydon Bridge War Memorial and its history, were published in The Haydon News of November 2009.)

INTERESTED IN RUNNING? TRY ALLEN VALLEY STRIDERS

Now that the nights are getting dark have all you runners out there considered the safety and camaraderie benefits of running with a group? The Striders is a very friendly running club which really does cater for a wide range of ability and running interests. Members range in age from 18 to 70 with a fairly equal number of male and female members.

If you can run 3 miles in 35 minutes or faster, you would be fine running with the Striders. We have 6 minute to 11 minute a mile runners running together. Nobody is ever left behind due to the way each run is conducted. Everyone sets off together and every mile or so the faster runners loop back to "collect" the slower runners and this continues over the duration of the course. ST CUTHBERT'S CHURCH MEMORIAL

The dedication to the war dead, in St Cuthbert's Church, Haydon Bridge was funded by public subscription and is at the east end of the chancel on each side of the altar. The memorial was unveiled and dedicated on October 31st 1920 by Bishop Ormsby in the presence of a large congregation. The Vicar of the parish, Rev W.H. Ainger, officiated.

The memorial is of eight oak panels with tracery at the top, four placed on each side of the 1885 reredos. In the framework above the panels is a series of carved bosses of flowers. The dedication is carried on the frame below the panels.

TO THE GLORY OF GOD AND IN MEMORY **OF THOSE FROM THIS PARISH** WHO LAID DOWN THEIR LIVES IN THE **GREAT EUROPEAN WAR 1914 - 1919**

At the top of each panel is an incised cross, below which fifty three names from the Great War and seventeen names from the Second World War are listed in single columns. The names from 1914 - 1919 are on six panels on the left hand side and the names from 1939 - 1945 were added to two empty panels, on the right side.

SHAFTOE TRUST SCHOOL MEMORIAL

The doorway to the school hall, formerly a classroom, incorporates the eight feet nine inches high by six feet nine inches wide memorial. The dedication is across the top of the door canopy and reads:

IN GRATEFUL MEMORY OF THE PUPILS AND STAFF OF THIS SCHOOL WHO FELL IN THE **GREAT WAR 1914 - 1919**

Pewter plagues inserted horizontally across the head of the doorway - in memory of Mathew Southern a teacher who taught in the classroom beyond the panelled door and frame - and vertically into panels on either side of the frame, bear the forty one names of the one teacher and forty former pupils of the 1914 - 1919 conflict.

The memorial's cost was covered by entertainment and



concerts given by the Shaftoe Trust School pupils and it was unveiled on June 21st 1921 by Canon Crawhall. An additional plaque was added to each side, below the original vertical plaques, to carry twelve names of forHAYDON BRIDGE METHODIST CHURCH MEMORIALS

When the original Methodist Chapel on Church Street was demolished in 1996 and a new place of worship built on the site, stained glass windows and the chapel pipe organ, with dedications to the fallen, were kept and they were included in the new structure.

Each window overlooks Church Street and has a glass border which forms an arch at the top. In the centre of the two outer windows is a shield shape, with the date '1939' in gold on the left and '1945' in gold on the right.

The window second from the left incorporates a scene commemorating the fallen, depicting a Knight in armour facing an archangel across the river with two angels blowing trumpets. On a scroll across the archangel is the text: Glory to God and on earth peace. Below the scene and above ten names is the following quotation: So they passed over and all / the trumpets sounded for them / on the other side. And with the ten names: To the Glory of God and in honoured memory, of those / associated with this church who made the supreme sacrifice.

The third window from the left is dedicated to those who returned from the war and depicts a Knight wearing the whole armour of God receiving the Crown of Victory from Christ and standing on a slain dragon. In the top left hand corner is the text: Life for evermore. Beneath the picture is the text Well done thou good and faithful **servant**. The dedication is at the foot of the window:

In grateful commemoration / of all the young men and women connected / with this church who served and who were / mercifully spared in the Second World War.





The Methodist Church pipe organ, with a brass plaque below the nineteen central pipes, is dedicated:

TO THE GLORY OF GOD / IN GRATEFUL AND LOVING / MEMORY OF THOSE AS-SOCIATED / WITH THE CHURCH WHO MADE / THE SUPREME SACRIFICE IN / THE GREAT WAR, 1914 - 1918

Twenty names are listed in two columns, below which is the quote:

"Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends."

Me and my greenhouse—Grape Vine

I have a four-year-old grape vine in my greenhouse and a two-year-old in the garden. From the greenhouse vine I have had about 40 bunches of grapes and one from the garden vine this year.



I had a major problem, I trained my vine to the top of the greenhouse which was all good until late spring when all the side shoots sprouted and I ended up with a tangled mess and the grapes hanging below. It ended up so heavy and broke away from the hanging wires, so I had to prop it up with timber. What I should have done is train the vine laterals along the eaves of the greenhouse so the side shoots would grow up towards the ridge.

The type of vine I bought is white and has seeds. Do not let the seeds put you off, just eat them as they are very good for reducing cholesterol, so I have been told. I have had many cuttings from it and virtually all of them have produced good plants which have gone to neighbours and friends as far as London.



One of the cuttings I planted outside next to a stone wall has climbed up a trellis and up my apple tree. You do not have to keep tying them into the trellis etc as they are self-supporting, just trim it as it tries to run away. It makes a great climbing type shrub and as for me I had grapes on it (see photo). Growing a vine is not complicated or difficult and if you thin out the bunch by removing 25% of the grapes from it, you will have the same quality product as you would buy in the shops. When planting your vine in the greenhouse plant the roots either outside then bring the stem immediately into the greenhouse or as I have in the corner of the greenhouse so the roots can make their own way outside. Vines will grow in most soils but they prefer an alkaline soil and no fertiliser required the first year. The first year's growth will be slow until the roots have established. I do the pruning in December but no later than the first of March. You should prune back so you just have the stem and two laterals along the eaves of the greenhouse. Vines are a strong plant and like to be pruned and thinned.






