### PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

#### MEETING OF HAYDON PARISH COUNCIL AT 7PM ON 26TH OF JULY 2018, AT HAYDON BRIDGE COMMUNITY CENTRE.

Present : Cllrs I. Burrows, E. Charlton, E. Faulks, K. Richardson, A. Sharp, R. Snowdon and L. Thompson; C. McGivern (mins.), public & press.

#### Public participation -

Mr Parker went over the proposals contained in the document he had sent to the PC regarding Ratcliffe Road. It was agreed that these proposals were sensible and they should be included in the response to NCC. The PC said that they were happy to hear from residents/ businesses about how they wanted to move forward. This is no longer a trunk road and drivers need to slow down as they would on Church Street. Drivers can now park on the new bridge and at the west of the village. The PC will gather information and then hold a public meeting for people to give their views. There is a copy of the draft report from NCC in the library for anyone who wishes to read it.

**Apologies** – were received from Cllrs V. Fletcher, A. Kirsopp, D. Thornhill and J. Thompson.

**Minutes of previous meeting** – having been circulated the minutes were approved and signed.

**Declarations of interest –** none were received.

#### Report from Northumberland County Council -

Cllr Sharp had suggested the site near 34a Strother Close for the glass recycling bins, however the officer concerned was not in favour as the road is badly potholed and not adopted by NCC. In addition the road is currently blocked at one end due to being hit by a Coop delivery wagon. Cllr Charlton said that wherever they were moved to NCC would need to keep the site around the bins clean, as the problem of broken glass around the bins had led to them being moved from the station in the first place. The 20 mph zone around the Shaftoe School will be in force before the children return in September. Cllr Sharp was disappointed that not all drains had been attended to, in particular on Church Street, John Martin Street and Shaftoe Street. He had asked for them to be dealt with in the next week. Copies of the report on Ratcliffe Road will be available in the library for everyone to read, and Cllr Sharp will try to get officers to attend a drop-in session. Cllr Snowdon explained to the public how the current situation had been arrived at. The PC had been considering how to create additional parking in the village, when NCC had resurfaced Ratcliffe Road. It had been agreed not to put road markings back immediately and to see how the road worked with no centre line etc. Issues under discussion include

the pelican crossing - is this needed or could it be moved? NCC will carry out a survey.

West-bound bus stop – would it be possible to improve access?

Is herringbone parking appropriate?

Dropped kerbs – do not conform to equality rules at present. This needs to be looked at.

Claire Marshall wondered whether it was possible to have double yellow lines in front of her shop and the Pharmacy. She was assured that this could be considered too. Cllr Charlton confirmed that in case of an accident on the A69 traffic would not be re-routed through the village. Cllr Sharp said that residents parking had also been requested for Church Street. If this was to go ahead it would have to have 75% support from respondents. Cllr Sharp said that he had been told that sewage conditions for the fire station site had been addressed and he is waiting for confirmation of this in writing. Cllr Richardson said that residents of Innerhaugh had asked for an additional bus stop at the entrance to this estate. It was agreed that Cllr Sharp would request this. She also suggested that the cameras used for the survey of Ratcliffe Road should be returned so that the outcome of the recent changes can be monitored. Cllr Sharp will take this request to NCC.

**Highways** – Overhanging branches at the Craggs North Bank - the owner had informed the PC that he intended to trim the trees and had permission from NCC.

Emails were received from Susan Oldham, Abbie Oldham and Debra Burgess expressing concerns about the lack of road markings on Ratcliffe Road and road safety in this area. The reasons for this had already been explained and it was agreed to have a site meeting for ClIrs and then a public meeting to discuss parking throughout the village.

**Lighting** – It was noted that all of the new LED lights seem to be in place.

#### Planning applications –

18/02083/LBC & 18/02082/FUL - No objections.

Cllr Snowdon noted that amendments had been added to the plans on the website. The plans are now classed as retrospective and there will be "foil" on the windows to obscure view out.

Accounts – As in budget.

Cllr Faulks said that Mr Gray, who carries out cemetery maintenance, will be resigning from his post at the end of the growing season as he has a new full-time job. The Clerk will draw up an advert for the position.

**Correspondence** – A request for top 3 transport priorities for 2019-20 was received from NCC.

Details of a consultation on the draft Statement of principles were received from NCC. The consultation

period ends on the 14th of September.

Details of a new grounds maintenance programme were received from Karbon Homes.

A response from Northern to a letter regarding train fares from Haydon Bridge to Newcastle was received. This explained how the price of season tickets was worked out and said that from Sunday 2nd September they will be lowering the price of the season ticket from Haydon – Newcastle. On a weekly season ticket, this equates to a 1.6% reduction in price. The Clerk had replied to say that this is appreciated, but the standard day fare needs to be looked at. An email in support was also received from Haltwhistle Town Council.

Cllr Faulks said that there had been a problem with some recently dug graves. They had been dug in very wet/ freezing weather. Clay had been dug up and then dried out and was now raised above grass level. Cllr Sharp will speak to the Michael Glenwright about this.

#### Parish projects -

**The Bridge** – Cllr Charlton said that the volunteers with a reading challenge over the summer months. A lot of tourists are visiting the Bridge, many of them staying in the village.

**Neighbourhood Plan** – It was agreed that a subcommittee would meet in the library on the 2nd of August to agree a way forward.

**Draft Local Plan** – The closing date for comments is the 15th of August. It was agreed that comments would be sent to the Clerk, who would draft a response and circulate it before submitting it to NCC.

**Riverside picnic area** – The Clerk said that the new interpretive panels would be installed in the next week. It was agreed that she would contact Mr Wardle to arrange a site meeting with him to agree where to position large stones to protect the grassed area.

**Parking in the village** – It was agreed that ClIr Sharp would arrange another site meeting to discuss the report received from NCC. He asked that as many ClIrs as possible would attend. In addition to the report Mr Parker's suggestion and ClIr Richardson's request for an additional bus stop at Innerhaugh would also be taken forward.

**Alexandra Terrace cemetery** – Cllr Sharp will chase up a request regarding the gates.

#### Any other business -

Cllr Burrows asked Cllr Sharp whether potholes in the lane behind the Community Centre could be filled. Cllr Sharp will try to get this done. The lane is currently blocked at one end, where the wall was in danger of collapsing. Cllr Sharp will ask when this will be reopened.



New Year is fast approaching, and things are going on behind the scenes to organise the fireworks display.

As most of you know we must close the road on the new bridge so that people can gather there and get a fantastic view of the fireworks on the old bridge. Although there is very little traffic around at that time on New Year's Eve the police insist that we close the road for safety reasons. Northumberland County Council are very good and deliver/pick up barriers and signs so there's no hassle.

Road closure has always been free......until now.

New regulations stipulate that this year we'll be charged £250 to close the road for an hour. Next year that rises to £500!!!

Add that to the price of the fireworks (over £2000) and that's a lot of money for the Get It Together Society to raise every year.

We get very generous donations from various clubs, organisations and individuals around the village and we organise fund raising events to get in as much money as we can. We're just a bit worried that it's not going to be enough to keep the fireworks going into the future.

Meanwhile we're checking the fine print and talking to NCC to see if there's any way we can be exempt from this charge. It seems rather excessive for such a tiny bit of road for such a short space of time.

Looking on the positive side we've got a fantastic event coming up on November 17th-

#### A VIEW FROM UP THERE ....

#### John Harrison

While my wife and I were driving along a narrow country lane near Alston the other day we came across a rather alarming sign which informed us that RED SQUIRRELS DRIVE SLOWLY. We wondered whether this was because of their cautious nature, or whether they experience difficulty reaching the vehicle's control pedals. And amusing road signs are not restricted to our local roads. Apparently there is a sharp bend on a road in the US mid-west where the locals became very fed up with the number of accidents caused by drivers travelling too quickly. So they erected a sign which said "if you can read this you have had an accident" – the sign was installed upside down !!

At this time of year the questions start – what sort of winter are going to have? My gran always said that trees loaded with fruit are a sign of a bad winter to come – and there's no shortage of berries in the hedges near our cottage this year. Such nonsense aside, we hear the old chestnut "bad winters often follow good summers" or some such. Sorry to disappoint but neither I nor the Met Office can predict a season ahead (I can't even forecast over a few days sometimes !! – no comments). So we'll just have to take it as it comes.

We do know about the summer (June, July, August) – the average daytime maximum temperature was 20.7 degC, which is +1.7 above the long-term average; the average night-time minimum temperature was 10.9 degC, which is +1.1 above the long-term average; the total rainfall was 133.0mm which is 77% of the long-term average. So taken overall it would appear that summer 2018 was warmer and drier than usual. Despite autumn rain the ground has continued to be relatively dry well into September.

June (See previous Haydon News). July was an exceptionally dry month resulting in low reservoir levels and water shortages. Exceptionally high temperatures exceeded 20 degC on 26 days. The temperature reached a remarkable 29.5 degC on the 26th. Thunderstorms occurred on the 26th and 27th when squall-lines crossed Tynedale bringing some short-lived torrential rain and violent winds. Further rain in the form of torrential showers fell on the 30th, which was the month's wettest day (10.3 mm). August saw the hot and dry weather of the summer months in full retreat and the weather was dominated by more



unsettled, cooler and wetter conditions, with winds from a broadly westerly direction being recorded on 27 days. The first half of August was relatively warm with daytime temperatures exceeding 20 degC on fourteen out of the first twenty-one days. Some of the rain came in the form of very localised showers. Rain was recorded almost every day until the 26th. On the very last day under clear night skies there was the first taste of approaching autumn, the temperature falling to 4.9 degC early on the 31st. Despite this being a wetter month, the ground water levels remained exceptionally low.

#### HARVEST

During my recent Sabbatical, I looked in detail at some of the Psalms, I also studied some paintings and artists, I pondered with paint and pencils and also walked St. Cuthbert's Way.

I had a picture of an almost dried up river bed with just a trickle of water passing through it!

My reflection was that perhaps we are sometimes like this river bed with just enough water to keep us going, however this is not as we should be.

Without us standing close to God, like a tree by the river, it is very easy to 'dry up' If this is the case, we cannot then hope for a good harvest, we too will become dried up and bear no fruit or harvest. We need to be planted by 'streams of living water' and we need to draw on that 'water of life' in order to reap a good harvest.





#### **RETAIL THERAPY 1900s STYLE**

In 2018, I don't expect to buy a packet of broken biscuits at Bobby Todd's Grocer's shop; or a quarter of black bullets at Tot Barron's; or a roll of caps for my six shooter at Elsie Watson's. I am well aware that folk's shopping habits have altered immeasurably in recent years. Believe me ... I am reminded every time I trail up and down Tesco's aisles - occasionally and disgruntled - in the wake of Betty, my wife. Or, when I curse the delivery driver in his ten ton truck who is destroying the surface of our drive with a weekly supply of groceries.

But, what does surprise me a little, as local landowners continue to concrete over their estates and our green fields and the population on Haydon Bridge's South Side increases significantly, is that unless it's fish and chips, an Indian takeaway or a pint of beer you're after, there is no one catering for the everyday needs in close quarters to those from John Martin Street, Martin's Close, Temple Houses, Whittis Hill, Whittis Crescent and Smith's Terrace, Shaftoe Street, Land Ends, and the recent Show Field and Crook Hill Close estates.

In The Haydon News of December 2017, I published a request for information about a one time Shaftoe Street retailer, John William Vickers. (*More of that later*) It was that request that stirred this wave of nostalgia.

I can recall, or in a couple of instances have been told about, five or six retail shops on John Martin Street and at least five on Shaftoe Street in the early to mid/late 1900s. Let me introduce you to some of them, briefly, starting here at the west end of John Martin Street, and walking along the cobbled path to the west, along Shaftoe Street.

Having passed George Cowing's butcher's shop on the left - later to become Wilkinson's painter and decorator's - and Scudamore's garage *(neither of which are on this photograph)* the first shop seen here, at 4 John Martin Street, is Barron's Grocer & Confectioners and, perhaps, more importantly for residents, Bakers. Tom Barron's and his son Tot's bakery was at the rear of their shop premises and accessed through Scudamore's garage yard.

The next shop on the street is Minto's Confectioners, that eventually became Mrs Simpson's fish and chip shop; since when, Bob Clark, Arthur Fulton, Harry Steele, and in 2018 Robert Johnstone, have been frying there.

Charlotte Gladstone's drapery shop is next, on the ground floor of the Odd Fellows Hall. Miss Gladstone remained there until after the Haydon Bridge Cooperative Society bought the Odd Fellows Hall for £650 in 1947 and eventually moved the store butcher into her shop. Lottie Gladstone then moved her drapery, wool and thread business to Church Street in the 1960s.

The Haydon Bridge Co-operative Society started life in a former chapel on Ratcliffe Road, before moving to new premises on Shaftoe Street, purchased for £390 in 1888. The 1888 Co-op is on the left in this photograph - beyond the painter standing with his ladders against the house wall that was number one Shaftoe Street and home to the Bates' family - and eventually the Teasdale's, who had moved there from the Scotch Arms Hotel.

Just beyond the arch on the left leading to Shaftoe Court is Vickers' bakery and confectionery shop. - Could this be Anthony Vickers at the shop doorway, I wonder!



Vickers' shop was No. 9 Shaftoe Street and was at right angles to the main street frontage, before the building was demolished to provide unobstructed street access for large motorised vehicles; especially service buses, I'm told. As a consequence of the demolition, the Vickers' family moved their business to double fronted premises at number 19 Church Street; premises in which B. Knight & Sons continued the bakery business until 1965. *(It was the email request to me for more information about the Vickers' family, that led to these reminiscences.)* 

At the west end of Shaftoe Street before it turns onto the Langley road, is the building that was to become Henry Watson's house and garage in 1921. Initially, the property was rented by Henry from the owners of the Haydon Hotel, before buying it in 1925 when the Haydon hoteliers filed for bankruptcy. The Watson family also opened a small radio shop opposite, and a confectioners on the left of the garage as it is in 2018. Access to the sweet shop was inside the house door off Shaftoe Street and beyond a heavy hanging curtain on the right, where Henry's daughter Elsie's domain was ideally situated for those of us who queued on the street to get into the Town Hall pictures or, as young children, were returning home from a Shaftoe Trust School day - or, if we needed caps for our revolvers or 'Standard' penny bangers, jumping Jacks, rockets, Roman candles and Catherine wheels, for Guy Fawkes day.

The Haydon Hotel - previously 'The Wheatsheaf' - is in the corner and almost out of sight on this photograph. If you listen carefully, however, you may hear the echo of accordions and singers whose lyrical tones filled the air in later years. (Another story ... another time, perhaps!)

I know of two businesses that were on the north side of Shaftoe Street, east of the Haydon Hotel. Mrs Hannah Lily Thomson sold pies and peas from the front room of her house there - so I am told; and there's no mistaking William Todd's Grocer's corner shop. Although William Todd retired in 1876 after fifteen years as a grocer and postman, the business continued in the Todd family until our well respected Haydonian Bobby Todd's retirement in 1978, after forty six years behind the counter.

#### A HAYDON BRIDGE BUSINESS

Thanks to research by former Haydon Bridge resident and genealogist, William Veitch, I can add more detail to the story of the business owners on Shaftoe Street in the 1900s. Let me start with William's investigation into the Vickers' interesting family tree.

Sometime around the year 1880, **Joseph Vickers**, a thirty year old lead miner, set up home in Haydon Bridge with his wife, thirty two year old **Frances (nee Place)**.

Before their marriage, Frances Place was working as a domestic servant at Moss Kennels Farm on the Military Road. Presumably, Joseph worked at the new Langley Barony 'Honeycrook' Lead Mines north of Chesterwood.

(Thomas Bewick's Langley Barony lead mines operated from 1871 - when the first adit was driven in alongside the Honeycrook Burn - to 1893.)

In 1881, Joseph and Frances Vickers were living on Smith's Terrace, and they had two sons: John William (1883) and Anthony Place (1886). Unfortunately, Joseph Vickers died in 1888, but, by 1891 his widow Frances had set up shop as a 'confectioner' on Shaftoe Street. By 1901, Frances' business was booming and she was now a 'Grocer and Baker' at number 9 Shaftoe Street, with son John William a grocer's assistant and her younger son Anthony Place Vickers, a baker's apprentice.

In 1911, Joseph's sixty year old widow, Frances, was still a shopkeeper at 9 Shaftoe Street and her son Anthony, now a fully fledged baker, was living with her. However, her other son, John William, had married Jane Maughan Walton at Tynemouth in 1910 and they were living with their baby son John Bousfield, at number 18 Ratcliffe

Frances died in 1911 and the Probate for her Will reads:

'Frances Vickers of 9 Shaftoe Street, Haydon Bridge, Northumberland, widow, died 18 May 1911. Probate Newcastle 10 July to John William Vickers, grocer and Anthony Place Vickers, baker and confectioner. Effects £1,276.' (2018 value - £105,084) It seems clear that Frances died a successful, self-made lady, after starting out in business 20 years earlier as a miner's widow.

After his mother died, Anthony married Jennie Scholick at Haydon Bridge on August 19th 1917 and they had four

Children; Joseph Place (1918), Frances (1922), Anthony (1925) and Kenneth Place (1928). The family bakery and confectionery business continued in the family, moving to the double fronted shop at number 19 Church Street when part of the building obstructing the highway at number 9 Shaftoe Street was demolished.

#### So who were Joseph and Frances Vickers?

**Joseph** was born at Nenthead, and in 1851 he was there as a seven month old baby with his **father John** Vickers, a lead miner, his **mother Phoebe (nee Swinbank)** and his two sisters Betsy and Hannah. By 1871, Joseph, a twenty year old lead miner, was living at Page Croft, Haydon



from birth to 5 years.

A headstone in Haydon Bridge cemetery is a memorial to John, Phoebe his wife and their son Joseph - the husband of our Shaftoe Street business woman, Frances Vickers.

In affectionate remembrance of John Vickers who died at Plunderheath May 26th 1865 aged 58 years also of Phoebe Vickers his wife who died at Brokenheugh August 26th 1882 aged 72 years also of Joseph Vickers their son who died at Haydon Bridge September 25th 1888 aged 38 years.



**Frances Vickers'** surname before her marriage to Joseph, was Place and this was often used as a Christian name in the family. Frances was baptised at Haltwhistle on June 25th 1845, the **daughter of Anthony and Margaret Place** of Barcombe, Bardon Mill. Anthony Place had married Margaret Stirling at Lanercost on June 13th 1818 and in addition to Frances, they had another eleven children including: Ann, John, Margery, Mary, Hannah, Elizabeth, Sarah, Jane, Ellias, Eleanor and Bell.

Anthony Place was born at Close Head, Thorngrafton on January 5th 1789, the son of Anthony Place Snr. who had

married Ann Pickering at Haltwhistle on February 18th 1776. In addition to Frances' father Anthony, Ann and Anthony Snr. had at least another twelve children.

So, Frances Vickers (nee Place) came from a long line of very large families, was widowed early and through her hard work and entrepreneurial skills became a wealthy Haydon Bridge businesswoman. A very impressive local achievement, don't you think?

There are three further headstones I know of, in Haydon Bridge cemeteries, marking the graves of the Vickers and Place family members:

Ralph Place, Mary his wife and their son Anthony were interred at Haydon (Old) Church and the gravestones of Anthony Place Vickers and Joseph Place Vickers are in St Cuthbert's Churchyard extension, above Alexandra Tc.

My closer look at our early retailers on John Martin Street and Shaftoe Street will continue with the Barron and Todd families in a future Haydon News.


