PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

MEETING OF HAYDON PARISH COUNCIL AT 7PM ON 28th OF FEBRUARY 2019, AT HAYDON BRIDGE COMMUNITY CENTRE.

Present: Cllrs J. Bates, I. Burrows, E. Charlton, A. Kirsopp, K. Richardson, A. Sharp, R. Snowdon and D. Thornhill; C. McGivern (mins.), public & press.

- 1. Public participation -
- a. Mr Harrison spoke for a group action group from Newbrough/Fourstones who were concerned about a proposal to remove gravel at West Wharmley. This proposal had been added to the latest version of the Draft Local Plan. He said that North East Concrete was interested in removing gravel, sand and clay at the site. It appeared that the two farmers whose land would be affected had not been told by the landowner, and had heard this second hand. Mr Harrison said that public health, wildlife and highways would all be damaged if this went ahead. Cllr Sharp said that he would need to leave the meeting if the PC discussed their response as an associate of Land Factor. Although he appreciated the concern generated by this issue. The Chair said that the PC shared the concerns raised by this proposal. He requested that the literature produced by the action group be sent to the Clerk so that the PC could base their response to NCC on this.
- b. Mrs Brown asked if there were plans to replace the gate to the cemetery, behind Alexandra Tce, soon. Cllr Thornhill said this was planned, however work had been held up as NCC had received a very large quote and were now trying to find an alternative contractor.
- c. Mrs Armstrong had asked whether a new site had been found for the glass recycling bins. Cllr Sharp said that it was proving difficult to find another site, as landowners were reluctant to have the bins on their land. Cllr Charlton agreed, saving that the site at the bottom of Martin's Close had been considered, but people living nearby had objected. The bins had been moved because of the amount of broken glass left around the site.
- d. A member of the public asked whether the PC had looked at the planning application for Staward Farm. He said that the site plan included did not show all of the outbuildings already on the site. The proposed new building would be quite high up on the site and therefore very visible. The gentleman went on to say that neighbours believed that a retail unit was being run from the site. It was agreed that representatives of the PC would make a site visit on the 2nd March and formulate their response following the visit.

- 2. Apologies were received from Cllr J. Thompson.
- 3. Declarations of interest See above at point 11a.
- 4. Minutes of the previous meeting having been circulated, were agreed and signed.
- 5. Report from Northumberland County Council -

Cllr Sharp said that there had been a good meeting with representatives of NCC, himself and Cllr Snowdon had attended. Following this the drains on North Bank and Strother's Close had been cleaned out. They had also looked at local roads; in particular at New Alson, Langley and Chesterwood. The road past Castle Farm was still in a bad state as was the road past Tedcastle Farm. In the next 2 months most of the ditches should be cleaned out. £5000 from the Community Chest had gone to Haydon Bridge Football Club, so that they could replace their grass cutting equipment. The footpath to the Spa Well has now been cleared. Cllr Sharp confirmed that the new bus stop at Innerhaugh still needs to be installed. With regard to parking on Ratcliffe Road, there had been an extension to the period for comment to the 8th March. Cllr Sharp had told Neil Snowdon that it was vital to have the information collated for the March meeting of the PC. It was agreed that there should be a separate meeting to discuss this. Cllr Charlton said that parking could not be allowed on the road bridge as the road was cantilevered and could not take the extra weight. There was to be resurfacing on the military road. Council tax and was set to increase, as NCC had had to save another £30 million.

6. Highways -

a. Cllr Richardson asked why there was no lighting at the west end junction with the A69, as the junction at the other end of the village was lit. Cllrs Charlton and Snowdon said that this had been looked at and the cost was prohibitive. The Police did not want this junction to be lit, as they felt that when drivers were travelling at night they can see the lights of cars coming toward them and this was safer.

- Cllr Kirsopp said that she was grateful that the footpath had been cleared along to the Spa Well turn off.
- c. Cllr Sharp said that he was happy to fund further dropped kerbs at Strother's Close. Cllr Charlton said that they were needed at Langley Gardens too. Cllr Sharp will look at this.
- 7. Lighting nothing to report.
- 8. Planning applications -

19/00676/FUL - Change of use of redundant farm buildings into 2 dwellings. Amendment of withdrawn 18/03911/FUL at Vauce Farm, Langley - No objections.

19/00542/FUL Staward Station House: OBJECT - While the Parish Council has no objection to the kitchen extension, they do object to the garage. This is on the following grounds -

- 1. The danger posed by being so close to a junction where traffic is moving at speed.
- 2.The wood construction of this building is inappropriate in an area of outstanding natural beauty, particularly as there are a number of other wood buildings on the site which are not shown on the site plan.
- 3. Additionally the Parish Council is concerned that the "garage" would be used as a furniture factory. We would request that the planning office looks at the Staward Station website advertising the renovation of old furniture etc.
- 9. Accounts as agreed in budget.

10. Correspondence -

- b. The NE War Memorials Project had requested help with funding for their website. It was decided that this body had not provided assistance to Haydon Bridge, and therefore no grant could be given.
- c. Local Plan consultation Cllr Charlton said that in the latest draft the proposed 140 houses for HB had risen to 160. The B1 site at the end of the allotments was now proposed for 20 houses and there was a proposal to extract gravel at West Wharmley as already discussed.

11. Parish projects –

 a. Neighbourhood plan – A public consultation is planned for April. Cllr Bates will arrange the date and Cllr Charlton will book a room at the Community Centre. Carol Price has agreed to be lead person for

b. Development Trust – there had been no meeting of the DT. It had been suggested that Mr Batey could cut "windows" through the growth to give views of the river. It was hoped that 3 extra parking spaces could be created. A work day will be arranged to help clear the area up. One of the trees near the railway underpass had storm damaged boughs resting on one another, and the tree surgeon will be asked to look at this.

12. Any other business -

- a. Cllr Richardson said that the road surface on the bank near the Haydonian Club had been destroyed by recent work.
- b. Cllrs Sharp and Snowdon hope to get some repairs done to the road behind the Community Centre.
- c. Flood wardens Cllr Snowdon said that there had been a useful meeting of the Flood Wardens. There will be an article on flooding in the Haydon News and a personal flood plan will be included, for householders to complete for their own use. David Robson has joined the group. Cllr Thornhill noted that no.s 1-7 Ratcliffe Road had been flooded in 2015, and this did not seem to have been flagged up anywhere. This was the first time these properties had been flooded.
- d. Cllr Charlton said that a recent meeting she had taken the opportunity to speak to Daljit Lally (NCC) about the proposed charges for road closures. She has been asked to put the PC's concerns in writing.
- e. Cllr Bates wondered what would be done about filling the 2 vacancies on the PC. These vacancies will be advertised on the notice board and a decision will be taken at the next PC meeting.
- f. Cllr Kirsopp will attend the Healthwatch Northumberland meeting on behalf of the PC.



SCHOOL REORGANISATION IN HAYDON BRIDGE PARTNERSHIP



In July 2018, the Council's Cabinet approved proposals for the schools in the North Pennine and Redesdale areas to reorganise to the primary / secondary system. This included the closure of Bellingham Middle School.

Bellingham Middle School Governing Body appealed this decision to the Office of the School Adjudicator who subsequently rejected the Councils decision to close the school. The Council's preferred pathway is that children will remain in their first school as this becomes primary for years 5 & 6, and then transfer to Haydon Bridge High School or another school of their choice. However, parents will now have the choice to send their child to Bellingham Middle School from Year 5.

INVESTMENT IN HAYDON BRIDGE PARTNERSHIP AGREED BY CABINET

Bellingham Primary School (as it will be)

Funding has been approved for internal refurbishment to include relocation of the children's centre provision into the main building. This provides 0-11 provision in one building. As a result of the School Adjudicator's decision to retain Bellingham Middle school, the original model for capital investment will need to be revised.

Wark C of E Primary (as it will be)


£10k has been approved for minor internal refurbishment of Wark C E First School.

Otterburn Primary (as it will be) £360k will be invested for a classroom extension to include cloakroom provision. This scheme has been approved

This scheme has been approved for planning by Northumberland County Council.



Greenhaugh Primary (as it will be) £366k has been approved for a classroom extension to include cloakroom provision. This scheme has been approved for planning by the Northumberland National Park Authority.



Haydon Bridge High

£3.1m has been approved to rationalise all teaching accommodation. There will be a refurbishment of the teaching blocks, together with roof and window replacements. A further £1.4m has been identified to support planned maintenance to give a total of £4.5m investment.

HBHS has one of the largest catchment areas in England (642.2 miles²) and has 359 students aged between 11 and 18. Through the investment, there will be less need for money to be spent on buildings maintenance, the school will be able to redirect savings from the refurbishment back in to the curriculum for the benefit of students.

Funding has been secured by Northumberland County Council to carry out improvements to parts of the school. These improvements include a new allocated walking route for students to the edge of the car park (in the boulevard area), which with the new layout of the one way system in the car park will increase student safety and will make the car park easier to navigate for drivers. There will also be allocated mini bus drop off points in the new car park as well as maintaining the current coach park.

To the north side of the redesigned car park will be new Multi Use Game Areas (MUGAs), which will enable students to participate in sports activities all year round.

As shown above, there will be a new entrance façade. This will be the refurbishment to the front of the school building to provide a welcoming atmosphere for visitors, whilst staff offices in the entrance to the school will be remodelled to enhance the safeguarding of students. Visitors will be able to access the reception area and facilities but will not gain access to the remainder of the school without being accompanied by a member of staff. This will therefore provide safe working for staff and enable students to learn in a safe environment.



Throughout this design process, a number of work areas have been identified and these include the following:

- Designated car parking area to the front of the school
- MUGA's located at the front of the school
- Entrance Façade Improvements
- Main entrance / Reception remodelling
- Remodelling of Design and Technology block to form new Vocational Centre to provide teaching space for Construction, Engineering, Hairdressing and Catering
- Re-roofing of main entrance block
- Replacement of all single glazed windows with new double glazed units
- Remodelling of various areas including Staff Offices, 6th Form and Library
- Redecoration of other school areas



CHURCHES WORKING TOGETHER CLERGY MESSAGE

From: Rev. Dr. Benjamin Carter

One of the great privileges of my job is being asked to go into our schools and lead assemblies and talk about the Christian faith. This time of year, I can guarantee that the one question which will come up again will be: "Why do we call it "Good" Friday"?

This is an excellent question and one which naturally challenges all of us. For those of us who regularly attend Church Good Friday is unlike any other day in the Church's year. We find the Church stripped of all its decoration and colour, no candles are lit, and our worship is sombre and reflective. And this is right given that this is day we remember that Jesus died. This is an important day, one of the most important days in the Church year. But why is it "Good"?

Well perhaps we might think of it a little like this. If we look at our own lives, we can all reflect on an experience a moment which was painful or hard at the time. The break-up of a relationship, the loss of a job, an argument with a friend. That moment was, and remains, a painful memory and experience. But so often when people tell me about those experiences, they go on to say: "but some good came from it". Sometimes in the pain of our human experience we discover a new opportunity, a new relationship, a new honesty with one another which sets our lives on a new and more positive path.

If we can think of these examples in our lives, then think of the journey of Jesus to the Cross, his suffering and death as this type of "good" but amplified and multiplied beyond our possible imagining. In a world of sadness and suffering, of human cruelty and pain, God in Jesus shows us in the events of that first Good Friday the love he has for each one of us. A love which goes anywhere, does anything, overcomes all things, to show us the transforming power of that love. And that is not only "Good" it is the greatest truth we can know.

On Good Friday all the Churches of Haydon Bridge will be gathering at the War Memorial at 10.45am and then on the Old Bridge to remember the "Good" of this day. There we will sing Isaac Watts famous hymn When I survey the wonderous cross. As we sing it we will remember the pain and suffering of Good Friday, but we will also remember the life and good that flows from:

Love so amazing, so divine,

Demands my Soul, my Life, my All.

HISTORICAL NOTES OF HAYDON BRIDGE

Dennis Telford

NORTH SIDE V SOUTH SIDE

Historically, the River Tyne at Haydon Bridge was a boundary separating Haydon Bridge 'North Side' and Haydon Bridge 'South Side', two postal districts of our village. Going back in time even further, as early as the lawless sixteenth century, the North bank of the Tyne was referred to as: 'The outside of the water' and the South bank as: 'The inside of the water'.

As recently as the twentieth century, there was a clear distinction and competition between those on the 'South Side' and their peers on the 'North Side'. My good friend the late Maurice Armstrong, would tell me how he spent almost all his boyhood days on the South Side and never thought about crossing the *(old)* bridge to the North Side

other than to go to the doctor's, or St Cuthbert's Church where he was a choir boy. Everything he needed as a youngster living on John Martin Street, he could find on the 'South Side'. And, no doubt, the young people of the same generation on the 'North Side' had a similar affinity with their own patch, choosing to spend their time there, rather than venturing to the 'South Side' other than to learn their a,b,c's at Shaftoe Trust School and, maybe, running messages to the store. (By the way; my friends from other parts of the country haven't a clue what I'm talking about when I mention: "Running messages for me Mam".)

I don't recall such strict demarcation in the village when I was young and, although we were satisfied on the 'South Side' with Gee's Wood, the Langley and Spring Woods, Pandon Pool (see photograph), Sandy Bay and Spa Well and beyond to the east, as our 'playground', that didn't stop us crossing the 'boundary' to enjoy swimming at Limestone or in Kidd's Hole, or to follow the Honeycrook Burn to its source past Bewick's lead and silver mines, Joicey Shaft, and Black Dyke to Muckle Moss; or, to catch eels down the Eiland (Or maybe it's Eel- land?).

That is not to say that the ancient border trait of gang warfare between North and South didn't raise its head on occasions and I can remember many a lawless stone-

My memory is that the 'South Side' generally held the upper hand. The residents of Martin's Close - Rumney's, Brown's, Beaver's, Duffy's and Burrows', for example - were not to be messed with if you knew what was good for you! Dodging smooth stones thrown at each other like cricket balls from opposite river banks might seem, to present day readers, like a dangerous sport and yet, I don't recall any child from either side of the water being seriously hurt. We were well practised at avoiding the stone missiles; although, a ricochet in an unexpected direction off the stone bed could result in a nasty bruise on the leg or the lower body. "Ouch!"

Guy Fawkes also had a lot to answer for when it came to North versus South disputes in my younger days. For a week or more in advance of November 5th, the bonfires proudly built alongside the river at the foot of Martin's Close and down the Eiland on the 'North Side', were the source of much dubious activity as we each sought to reduce the other side's fire to ashes, long before the fifth of November. The bonfires that had taken many hours to build and were our pride and joy, were jealously guarded day and night.

My memory of this 'warring' North versus South activity (above) is stirred as I recall a more sedate competition between the 'North Side' and the 'South Side' in 1945. A Haydon Bridge Methodist 'Literary Quiz' that ended the year. Shaftoe Trust School science teacher Miss Bury asked the questions and four members of the 'South Side' team were from the Telford family: Sybil and Laura, Cecil and Ridley, along with Mrs E. Dinning and team captain, Eddie Dinning. On this occasion, the knowledge of the 'Southsiders' failed the test and the North Side team of Miss A. Kirton and Mrs Watson, John Davison, Ridley Coats, J.R. Beavers and W.G. Thompson were winners by fifty one points to forty four.

And so ended the year of 1945, which had seen the end of World War II in Europe and the Far East, and we looked forward to what has been over seven decades of peace on our shores. Except for the occasional

local skirmish at Haydon Bridge, of course, between those who lived on the 'outside of the water' and their friends (Yes! We were all good friends really.) from the 'inside of the water'.

A VIEW FROM UP THERE

John Harrison

Looking around for unfortunate church notices I was sent these offerings from a contact in the USA. The local church was very popular with young families and there were many baptisms over the course of the year. On this particular Sunday there were ten children which being baptised prompted the administrator to post the following notice on the church door "Due to the large number of children being baptised on Sunday we shall be using the fonts in both north and south porches. Please note that children will be baptised at both ends." And relating to the forthcoming Easter Sunday services "This Easter Sunday the vicar's wife will come forward to lay an egg on the altar" (let your imagination run with this one)

February: The unsettled and very cold polar weather from late January continued for three more days before a complex Atlantic low pressure system brought in milder air from a more southerly direction. Air temperatures began to rise and cloud cover increased and by the 8th/9th the British Isles were under the influence of Storm Erik which resulted in the month's wettest day on the 8th and in exceptionally strong winds, reaching gale force by the 9th. However, this was the last wet weather of the month and only a further 0.7 mm of rain fell before the end of the month. Pressure then began to rise and by the 14th anticyclonic conditions were in charge. As the cloud cover cleared, daytime temperatures rose above 10 degC at the start of what proved to be a spell of unseasonably warm weather. However clear night skies meant that frost was an ever-present risk. As high pressure moved eastwards into continental Europe the British Isles was brought in to a very warm tropical airstream and daytime temperatures rose above 15 deg C on several days (20+ deg C in parts of Britain). The 25th was more typical of late spring than late winter, reaching 17.5 degC, followed by a night minimum of 0.5 degC. By the end of the month the average daytime maximum was 4.1 deg C above the

long-term average and rain was recorded on only seven days. The ongoing rainfall deficit is now approximately 40% which may lead to severe water shortages in the months ahead.

Conversation in the village at this time of year invariably turns to when to plant. When do the spuds go in — a slave to Good Friday planting or do you keep your eye on the weather and the soil conditions. It is the latter which makes gardening such a lottery. This time last year planting anything was out of the question. February 2018 was on the whole a cold and wet month and by the end of the month we were dealing with heavy snow and frost. In terms of averages, February 2019 was more than 5 deg C warmer than 2018. Such variability could perhaps be seen by some as a nuisance but for me it is one of the delights of living here in Britain. Next one to look for is late frost — in spring it all depends on cloud cover. Clear skies bring the risk of that late frost which knocks back your growing season.

Shaftoe Trust Academy Visit


It was wonderful to welcome every class from Shaftoe Trust when each one visited the Bridge between 5th and 7th March - a total of 130 children and 26 staff and
