PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

MEETING OF HAYDON PARISH COUNCIL AT 7.30PM ON 27th June 2019, AT HAYDON BRIDGE COMMUNITY CENTRE.

Present : Cllrs J. Bates, I. Burrows, E. Charlton, E. Faulks, B. Howard, A. Kirsopp, K. Richardson, A. Sharp, and D. Thornhill; C. McGivern (mins.), public & press.

1. Public participation –

- a. Patient Group Vera Fletcher said that two patient surveys had been carried out by the practice and waiting times remained a concern. Two more doctors should join the practice soon, both part-time. Consulting hours will remain the same. A newsletter will be coming out shortly. Clinicians are keen to get the patient group "on board" and hopefully the group will begin to have a more active role. The surgery could become part of a larger group. GPs are not self-employed, but get a salary and are employed by a larger group. It would make sense to become part of this larger group, with each Patient Participation Group existing in its own right, and having working parties for particular issues. The practice is keen for a Parish Cllr to take part in this. These moves could help to attract more funds to the area. Cllr Thornhill offered to talk through the commitment involved with Mrs Fletcher. Mr Fletcher reiterated the importance of having a parish Cllr in the group. He said that rural practices were at risk and this would show that the parish council felt that the practice was important to the community.
- b. James Brown said that a composting bin had been installed at the cemetery, but has found a lot of plastic rubbish put into it. Cllr Charlton said that she found the same with the brown bin at the cemetery. Every time she visits she has to take out ordinary rubbish and put this in the wheelie bin in the layby outside the cemetery. He went on to compliment Mr Batey on his work at the cemetery.
- c. Peter Fletcher asked for the Neighbourhood Plan to be put on the agenda for July. By that time the group will have three documents for the PC to approve, as the overseeing body for the Plan. NCC have a dedicated planning team dealing with Neighbourhood Plans. Mr Fletcher said that the village entry signs were now in place, and that the lettering was more visible in some lights than others. The plan is to let them weather to see the affect that this has. If necessary the arches and lettering can be sealed and coloured to make them more visible. New equipment for the riverside has been

Some publicity is planned and this will include the Co-op, DT and the PC. Mr Fletcher will arrange a date and time for this, to be circulated to parish Cllrs. The submission date for the next round of funding for the Co -op is the 8th of July. The DT is keen to encourage community groups to apply. Mr Fletcher will be seeing the scouts and has been in touch with the football club. Cllr Sharp confirmed that he is providing £3000 for new doors etc at the Community Centre.

- d. James Brown asked if the crossing on Ratcliffe Rd was working properly. He said that he'd pressed the button, but it took so long to respond he had gone to sit in his car! Cllr Charlton wondered if the pressure pads in the road were still working. The Clerk will raise this with NCC.
- Apologies were received from Cllrs J. Keyte, R. Snowdon, and J. Thompson.
- Election of Chair and Vice-Chair Cllr Thornhill proposed that Cllrs Faulks and Charlton continue in their roles and this was approved.
- 4. Declarations of interest none received.
- 5. Minutes of previous meeting having been circulated were agreed and signed.
- 6. Report from Northumberland County Council -

Cllr Sharp said that the plans for the 20mph scheme had now been circulated. The pelican crossing and the road markings have been reinstated. The estates had not been included in the 20mph scheme, but on the revised plan this is now shown. Martin's Close was felt to be such a small area that speeding would not be a problem, and sleeping policemen are in place already. If the PC approved the revised scheme then work could begin asap. This was agreed. Mr Brown mentioned that the roads behind the Community Centre and Church Street were shown as part of the scheme, with signs. He queried how this could be the case if the roads were not adopted. Cllr Sharp agreed. A new bin has been installed in the layby at Threepwood. A day long litter pick was planned for the Langley road. Cllr Bates will investigate



whether this has been done. There are still a lot of grass and weeds growing on the inside of kerbs on the estate. Cllr Sharp is chasing up why this has not been done. There will be a Community Chest meeting in the next week, and Cllr Sharp hopes to get money for the Community Centre sorted out in this round. He acknowledged that he still needs to visit Whittis Crescent with Cllr Richardson to look at the pavement. The dropped kerbs on the estate have been discussed and Cllr Sharp is waiting for costings. The extension to the house at Staward Station House has been approved, but the garage plan has been withdrawn. Drains on John Martin Street should now have been done. Repairs to drains at Tofts have now been completed. The letters have been sent out to people living at the top of North Banks, and it was noted that everyone seems to be parking close to the wall and this is making a big difference. Cllr Sharp said that there had been a proposal to change the planning system, so that where there were objections from Parish Councils the plans would not automatically go to Committee. This had been withdrawn. Finally Cllr Sharp was pleased to say that the grave digger had dealt with a grave which had sunk.

7. Highways –

- a. Cllr Richardson asked if rumble strips could be installed to slow traffic coming into the village, and she also wondered if the speed camera could be reinstated.
- b. Cllr Kirsopp wondered why the new bin at the Showfield had not yet been installed.
- c. A letter had been received from Henry Swaddle regarding the noise generated by traffic on the A69 bypass since it had been resurfaced. It was agreed that the Clerk would write to Roadlink in support of this complaint. Cllr Charlton said that when the bypass had been in the planning stage the Dept. of Transport had acknowledged that if a low noise surface was not used, then soundproofing would need to be provided to those affected.

8. Lighting –

- a. Some of the orange street lights still remain in place. Work to complete this project has been delayed.
- 9. Planning applications None received.
- a. 19/00568/FUL Land East Of Croft Holme North Road this planning application was discussed and it was agreed to withdraw the original objections and submit a no-objections response.

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10. Accounts – as in budget.

The Internal Audit had been completed and details of this published on the website. The completed AGAR had been send to the external auditors.

11. Correspondence –

a. A letter from Christopher Armstrong asked whether anything could be done about the front of the old antique shop. The Chair explained that he had suggested a trompe l'oeil work depicting an antique shop could be painted on the boards. The owner of the property is going to approach the art department at the High School to discuss this. The idea of improving the area behind the (glass) window with display space was also discussed. Mr Armstrong had also suggested that a new dog bin was needed on the old bridge. It was noted that there are bins near to both ends of the bridge, and it was agreed that the Clerk would contact the dog warden to ask for new anti-dog fouling stickers to be put on the lamp posts. Poo bags are available from the library.

12. Parish projects –

- a. Development Trust Cllr Faulks said that the Haydon Hundred had attracted 30 more cyclists than last year. Over £3000 has been raised for the library. He congratulated Mark l'Anson for this achievement.
- b. Northumberland Plan Cllr Charlton said that there was a box at the library where people could submit their ideas. It was proposed that comments boxes could also be given to the schools, pubs and newsagents. Cllr Bates said that more volunteers were also needed to take this forward. A housing survey will go to all houses in the village, and it would be possible to add an extra sheet to this for other points.
- c. Riverside Cllr Charlton said that the picnic tables had been ordered and a price had been accepted from the builders for installation. The original tables will be removed, along with the broken seat. Thompsons are keen to be involved with the improvements to the site and will be talking to the lady from the Tyne Rivers

Trust. Cllr Richardson asked whether signage for parking on the riverside would be included, and this is agreed. No equipment will be installed in the area used by Thompsons for gravel removal.

- d. Cemetery maintenance -Cllr Faulks said that a quotation had been received from Mr Batey for cemetery maintenance. This included cutting the area outside the cemetery, and a larger area within the cemetery. At present he is cutting the grass every 10 days. He had also provided a lower price for maintaining the cemetery in the winter months. Cllr Charlton said that the improvement he had already made on site was amazing. For the first time she was receiving compliments about the site instead of complaints. Mr Batey has also filled the water tank and put in a jug. Mr Macdonald has promised to deal with the problem of silt clogging up the supply to the tank, but he is very busy at present. Cllr Charlton said that she had also received a price for building a low supporting wall and grading the ground and reseeding at the Northern boundary. A price of £1,300 was suggested for each of the 3 stages needed. It was agreed that the PC would wait until they received plans to make a decision on this. It was agreed to accept Mr Batey's quotation for cemetery maintenance for summer and winter.
- f. Finger post Cllr Faulks said that suggested designs had been circulated. The Stockport design with 5 arrows had been chosen. Cllr Thornhill wondered if a good site for this would be outside the Old Post Office. Cllr Sharp said that he would organise funding and then meet with parish Cllrs to agree the location.
- g. Visit to West Sleekburn recycling facility ClIrs Bates and Keyte had visited the site and ClIr Bates said that it was a fantastic place. They had been given advice about what could be put in the recycling bin. She went on to say that they are only collecting types of rubbish that they know that they have a financially viable end use for. Some waste is sent to Europe, but this has been checked to make sure it is dealt with sustainably. Hard plastic, aluminium, paper and card are all sold. The amount of rubbish going into landfill has gone down




from around 92% to 14%. During the tour they had also been reassured that glass collected from glass bins was melted down and not used for aggregate. Green waste goes to Teesside were it is burnt to produce electricity, after which the ash is magnetized to remove small bits of metal for recycling. NCC are hoping to trial kerbside glass and food waste collection with a view to having hardly anything in the ordinary bin in the future. The tour has been so successful that more are planned.

- h. Electric charging point The Clerk had contacted NCC for information on installation of charging points and they had replied to say that they are considering a roll out of more points and would put Haydon Bridge on the list.
- i. Trees for schools project Cllr Richardson will check with Mr Robson for an update.

13. Any other business –

Cllr Charlton asked what was happening about access to the Spa Well as this was part of the heritage of the village. Cllr Sharp promised to contact the Footpaths Officer to chase this up. Cllr Faulks said that NCC had a statutory duty to keep footpaths open. Cllr Sharp offered to discuss this with the landowner too.



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Update on Haydon Parish Neighbourhood Plan (NP)

In summer 2018 the Parish Council agreed to undertake a NP for Haydon Parish and formed a Steering Group (SG) to carry this forward. Since then we have carried out early research, preparations and an initial public consultation event. The SG has sent 3 documents to the July Parish Council, if agreed they will enable us to move on to the next stage.

Terms of Reference document - formalises the purpose, objectives and conduct of the SG and clarifies its relationship with the Parish Council.

Scope of the NP and development of Policy areas – some ideas arising from the public consultation event will be taken forward in the NP and others will be considered by the Parish Council for delivery in other ways. This document indicates which subjects the guidance tells us will fit into which category. It also identifies big pieces of work that residents may wish to get involved with.

Timetable – this is subject to review and amendment in light of experience. It is currently showing that the draft NP will be available for public consultation in about a year or so, followed by a referendum on the final version in late 2021.

Once the Parish Council has given the go-ahead, important pieces of work such as a Housing Needs Survey, audits of local Green Spaces, paths, bridleways and cycle routes, surveys of local businesses, community services and facilities etc need to be undertaken. Questionnaires and ideas about the design and layout of the parish will have to be collated. Your help and involvement will be crucial to the success of each of these pieces of work and the whole plan. Please keep an eye out around the village for calls for help in the next couple of months or volunteer now by leaving your contact details and areas of interest at the Bridge Library, marked for the attention of the Steering Group. 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Have you ever wondered what happens to your Recycling?

Northumberland County Council recently invited members of Northumberland's Town and Parish Councils go on a tour of their recycling facility at Sleekburn. With our interest sparked, recent recruit to the Haydon Bridge Parish Council, Jon Keyte and myself decide to go and have a look at what they do with the rubbish that goes into our Black Bins. And what an eye-opener it was.....

You drive through a fairly average industrial estate in Sleekburn and at the end there is a massive warehouse, within which resides an immense and fascinating machine. At one end of the mass of conveyors, metal, magnets and air knives is a telehandler with a bucket on the front, loading our waste into a hopper to start it's journey through the sorting process....

Stage one involves a human element - the site employs approximately 60 people on 3 shifts. It works 24hrs, all week except for the odd hour a day shut down for maintenance. Waste is delivered to the site 6 days a week. The (I imagine, undervalued by the general public) workers were a great bunch of lads, most of them local, mostly been employed for a long time at the plant. They have to separate out the big stuff at the start of the process, and remove anything obvious that shouldn't be there - stuff like pans, kettles, helium balloon canisters, plastic bags. Not to mention the awful stuff – lots of food waste, nappies, dog waste!! The rest then travels on.... through a huge revolving drum (a bit like a massive washing machine) - this separates the waste into different sizes. Then onwards... magnets remove the steel tins, electromagnets remove the aluminium tins and cans, light beams and air knives identify and separate out the different qualities of paper from each other. Likewise plastic is separated into different qualities by the use of light and air. The technology was completely amazing - mostly German by design. Final checks were also done by human hands - ensuring that different types of plastic and paper ended up in the correct hoppers.



Each different target material then progresses down its own conveyor. High quality paper is piled high and delivered loose to the paper mills for recycling. Card and lower quality paper is baled and sent elsewhere. There was a single baling machine – each different target material (card, aluminium, steel, plastic etc) can be selected and the conveyors bring the material to the baler for parcelling up for transport. All in all – it was amazing!! The process is hugely efficient and remarkably accurate. The staff were all great and we were all in admiration of what they did - I don't think many of us would do what they do!!

During our visit we also learnt a huge amount about the thought processes of NCC waste policies and what they are hoping to achieve over the next few years. Previously the vast majority of Northumberland's household waste went to landfill - we had lots of open cast holes to fill!!! In 2007 NCC entered into a 28 year agreement with the waste processing company Suez. Since then they have invested millions into the refurbishment of our household waste transfer sites - e.g. in Hexham and Allendale - I'm sure we all agree the 'tip' is great! They built the recycling facility at Sleekburn - which is amazing!! And they also now send all of our non-recyclable (Green bin) waste to a 'Energy from waste' plant in Stockton-on-Tees where it generates 9.6MW of energy per year (enough to power a town the size of Morpeth for a year). The ash from the plant at Stockton is put through magnets to remove any metal residues which can then be recycled (so don't worry about putting your aluminium foil in the green bin - it will be retrieved and recycled post incineration). The remaining ash is then made into thermalite blocks for building!!



NCC and Suez have made a commitment that they will not ask us to collect and recycle anything that does not have a financially viable end use – everything they target has a profitable and sustainable recycling destination. This is one reason why they do not want us to collect any low grade plastic (e.g. yogurt pots, food containers etc) – most of this type of plastic ends up being export to the Far East and does not have a sustainable, profitable end destination. They are committed to ensuring that all glass recycled at collection centres goes for re-melt which is more environmentally friendly than aggregate use.

So there were also a few take home messages about recycling that we all need to pay attention to:

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Do not package your recycling into plastic bags – the workers at the beginning of the plant spend a lot of time ripping open plastic bags!

Only put plastic bottles into the recycling bin – Any size or shape of bottle is fine. You can now also include bottle lids, however lids must be attached to the bottles – anything smaller than 4cm in diameter falls through the size sorting drum and ends up in a non-target pile. So reattach your milk bottle lid to the bottle (ideally after washing it out).

Do not put low grade plastic into the recycling -Yogurt pots and food containers etc are not wanted. They have no sustainable end use. But don't feel too bad about it – they are full of energy which will feed the incinerator at Stockton to produce electricity.

Jam Jar lids can be recycled – They will be sorted by the magnets.

Do not put foil or foil trays into the recycling – The machine finds these things difficult to sort – but they will be retrieved post incineration at Stockton.

All aerosol cans can be recycled – if you can remove the plastic top, please do, but don't worry if you can't

Wrapping paper can be recycled as long as it passes the 'scrunch test' – if birthday and xmas paper stays in a ball after you scrunch it up then it will have enough paper content for it to be recyclable – if it pings back into shape

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then it's probably mostly plastic and needs to go in to general waste bin.

Do not put shredded paper in the recycling bin – The paper mills don't want it, it falls straight through the size sorting drum and is wasted anyway. It causes a right old mess at the sorting plant!!

Any grade of cardboard can now be recycled – They used to only want lighter card, but now all of it is wanted in the black bins! Food card containers e.g. from the chip shop or pizza boxes are also fine as long as there's no chips/pizza left in them!!

Don't put random stuff in the black bin that you are not sure can be recycled – If in doubt, leave it out!! Take big items (e.g. pans, kettles!) to the recovery centres in Hexham and Allendale. The efficiency of the sorting plant at Sleekburn depends entirely on the quality of the waste that is put in at the beginning of the process. If we put the right stuff in the black bins, they can do a brilliant job of sorting it out!!

Since 2007 NCC/Suez have managed to reduce the county's waste going to landfill from over 90% to around 14%. They would like to reduce this further, but things like mattresses are extremely difficult to reprocess and inevitably end up in landfill. Over the next year they are going to trial kerbside glass collection in some areas and roll this out if successful. They aim to eventually introduce food waste recycling which will hopefully mean that very little of our household waste ends up in the general waste green bins. Overall Jon and I were very impressed by the commitment to recycling that NCC have already made, and we were convinced that their future plans are sustainable and forward thinking. I think we all should be proud to be a part of a remarkable process that hopefully, maybe is helping us all 'do the right thing' for our planet.





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
At the end of June we were visited by Jonathan Brown, an education consultant who carries out independent reviews of schools. Mr Brown, accompanied by our CEO Zoe Carr, carried out a number of monitoring activities on the day in order to allow him to make an informed view about the school, the progress that had been made since his previous visit in October 2018, and to give us some recommendations about what we can do next to make our school even better. These activities included work scrutiny, lesson observations, discussions with staff, discussions with our children (chosen at random!), data analysis and reviewing key school documents, such as our school development plan and own self-evaluation.

We were absolutely delighted with the outcome of the review, which confirmed what we already knew; that in the past year the school has 'improved significantly', 'eradicated poor practices' and is 'now a good school' where 'exemplary practices are seen in lessons

Investment in our school

We were absolutely thrilled to hear earlier this week that the Shaftoe Education Fund have approved a £20000 donation to assist us in improving the provision for our pupils. Included in this are upgrades to all of the ICT equipment in school, relocation of this into classrooms – so that IT becomes an integral part of lessons, the purchase of a suite of 32 Chromebooks which will be shared across KS1 and Ks2, and a class set of programmable lego to enhance our teaching of ICT.

WISE Academies have already committed considerable funds to install high speed broadband into school and upgrade of wifi network. We will also be putting new plasma screen board into all the classrooms and training staff in the use of Google Classroom. Shaftoe will be a school fit for 21st Century learning very very soon!



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

HEXHAM WATERCOLOURIST EXHIBITS AT THE ALLENDALE FORGE

August's solo artist in the Allendale Forge Gallery is a committed local water colourist with a love of the north's landscapes and an established reputation exhibiting in his chosen discipline.

For Gerald Selby, an exhibitor with the Yorkshire Watercolour Society and member of Hexham Art Club since moving into the area from the Yorkshire dales six years ago to be nearer his family, this will be his first solo exhibition and he is very much looking forward to seeing the public's reaction to this body of his work.

Like many young and aspiring artists, he was greatly encouraged by his grammar school art teacher, also a watercolourist, whose enthusiasm for the medium has remained with Gerald throughout his own art career. 

Gerald added: 'I like to approach painting in a loose manner, using as large a brush as possible. Watercolour painting gives few chances for the correction of errors which is possibly why so few artists seem to work in this medium. I always say that if a work doesn't satisfy, it can always be used to light a fire!'

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HISTORICAL NOTES OF HAYDON BRIDGE

John Martin (July 19th 1789 - February 17th 1854)

Part 2 - (Newcastle to London)

(See July 2019 for Part 1 - (Haydon Bridge to Newcastle)

In July, I celebrated two hundred and thirty years since Victorian artist John Martin's birth at East Land Ends, Haydon Bridge, and I introduced you to a letter from John to the editor of the Illustrated London News of March 1849; the letter from John is the closest we have to an autobiography. I left you in July 2019 with John having moved from Haydon Bridge to Newcastle, aged fourteen years and in employment as apprentice herald painter. Unhappy with his treatment at the hands of Leonard Wilson - a coach builder of High Friar Street, Newcastle and his employer - In 1804, John successfully defended his right to leave Wilson's employment and his indentures were returned to him.

Our young Haydonian's character and resolve shone through in his dispute with Leonard Wilson, when he was summoned in front of the Aldermen and his employer at the imposing Newcastle upon Tyne Guildhall. Following his success in retrieving his indentures, John ran back to the coach builder's factory, flourishing the indentures over his head and crying: "I've got my indentures, and your master has taken a false oath; and I don't know whether he is or not in the pillory by this!"

My edited version of John Martin's March 14th 1849 correspondence to the editor of the Illustrated London News continues:

My family were delighted with the spirit I had displayed (at the Newcastle Guildhall), and at my emancipation from an occupation they saw as uncongenial, and my father at once took measures to place me with an Italian master of great merit, and some reputation in Newcastle, named Boniface Musso, the father of the celebrated enamel painter Charles Muss. I remained under Musso's instruction about a year, when Mr. C. (Charles) Muss, who was settled in London, wished his father to come and reside with him, and Mr B. Musso urged upon my parents the advantage of my accompanying him.



JOHN MARTIN LEAVES NEWCASTLE FOR LONDON (1806)

After much cogitation, many misgivings on my mother's part, and solemn charges to our friend, it was ultimately agreed that I should join him (*B. Musso*) in London within a few months. I accordingly arrived in London at the beginning of September, 1806; but, unluckily for lovers of romance, I was not cast upon the wide world in quite such a forlorn and destitute condition as your contributor states. (*An Illustrated London News reviewer of March 10th, 1849, reported that John had set off for London on a Newcastle collier, with only five shillings in his pocket.*) ... I had good outfit - small though sufficient funds for my immediate purposes, notwithstanding my having been robbed of all my loose cash by a poor passenger in the ship - and most important of all, I was placed under the protection of kind and excellent friends.

The treatment I experienced from Mr. C. Muss soon satisfied me that he conceived my means to be far more extended than they were; I therefore took an early opportunity of informing him that I had resolved never more to receive pecuniary assistance from my parents who had already done enough in providing means for establishing me in London - and that, as my present resources were not equal to a due recompense for his liberality, I thought it only right to tell him my position. He (C. Muss) was pleased with my honourable candour, and saying that he would do all in his power to promote my laudable Intentions, undertook to employ me in his glass and china painting establishment in a department where my facility in designing and painting landscape scenes would be very useful; from this time I supported myself solely by my own exertions, and with advantage to my employers.

MARRIAGE AND JOHN'S ART (1809 - 1828)

After a few months, feeling uncomfortable, owing to some little indifferences with a member of Mr. Muss' family, I removed from his house in Wynyatt Street, New River-Head, to Adam Street West, Cumberland Place, continuing to work for Mr. Muss's firm during the day, and sitting up at night till two and three o' clock in the morning acquiring that knowledge of perspective and architecture which has

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HISTORICAL NOTES OF HAYDON BRIDGE

Dennis Telford

since been so valuable to me. Here I remained till 1809, when I married , and removed to Northumberland Street, Marylebone *(John married Susan Garrett of Crondall, Hampshire)*, thence to High Street; thence, in 1818, to 30 Allsop Terrace, New Road; and thence after thirty years' residence, to my present abode *(Lindsey House, Chelsea)*: and these are the only places in London I have ever lived in.

Shortly before my marriage, Mr Muss' establishment had broken up, and those employed in it had the option of seeking employment independently, or of following the fortunes of the different members of the firm. I, of course, accompanied my friend, and was subsequently engaged by him in the glass painting, carried on by Mr. Collins (*William Collins, 'glass painter'*), in the Strand, occupying my evenings upon water-colour drawings, and contriving, in odd hours, to paint in oil my first picture ever exhibited, (**"A Clytie"**), which was sent to the Royal Academy in <u>1810</u>, and rejected for want of room, though not condemned ... I therefore sent it again in <u>1811</u>, when it was hung in a good situation in the Great Room!

The 'Great Room' was the main exhibition space at the Royal Academy in London - quite an achievement, don't you think, for the young John Martin and former Shaftoe School pupil, only eight years after leaving Haydon Bridge for Newcastle and then London?

At the beginning of the following year (<u>1812</u>), having now lost my employment at Collins's, it became indeed necessary to work hard, and, as I was ambitious of fame, I determined on painting a large picture, being **"Sadak"**, which was executed in a month. You may easily guess my feelings when I overheard the men who were placing "Sadak" in the frame disputing as to which was the top of the picture! The work, however, though it was hung in the ante-room of the Royal Academy received, to my inexpressible delight, a notice in the newspapers, and was eventually sold, to the late Mr. (*William*) Manning (*MP*; and *Governor of the Bank of England 1812 to 1814*), for 50 guineas.

The following year, <u>1813</u>, I sent "The Expulsion" to the British Institution, and "Adam's first sight of Eve" to the

Tel 01434 618423 www.allenvalleysphysiotherapy.co.uk Royal Academy, and was again given a place. My next painting, **"Clytie"**, though a picture which has stood the test of criticism during many years, was in <u>1814</u> placed in the ante-room of the Academy.

This painting (Clytie) was the subject of an incident in the Royal Academy in 1814 when it was damaged by varnish spilt down the middle. John regarded this 'accident' as a deliberate attempt to blight his reputation. "Clytie" was repainted years later, titled "Alpheus and Arethusa" and exhibited in the British Institution in 1833, and sold to Charles, the 2nd Earl Grey - to whom Grey's monument was erected in 1838 in Newcastle to commemorate his political career and the passing of the 1832 Reform Bill.

The following year (<u>1815</u>) I sent <u>the</u> **"Joshua"** which was again hidden in the ante-room.

This was the painting: "Joshua commanding the Sun to Stand Still", reviewed in March 1849 which resulted in John Martin's letter - and 'autobiography'- being sent by him to the editor of the Illustrated London News.

Incidentally, the review said John was, 'born at Newcastle upon Tyne' Shame!!

The next year, I sent "Joshua" to the British Institution where it attracted great attention, and I was rewarded with the chief premium of the year, £100; but the picture was not sold till some years afterwards; as a companion to "Belshazzar's feast". (See next column.)

To this period I had supported myself and my family by pursuing every branch of my profession - teaching - painting small oil pictures, glass enamel paintings, water colour drawings; in fact, the usual tale of a struggling artist's life.

I had been so successful with my sepia drawings, that the Bishop of Salisbury, the tutor to the Princess Charlotte (of Wales), advised me not to risk my reputation by attempting the large picture of "Joshua." As is generally the case in such matters, well-meant recommendations had no effect; but at all events the confidence I had in my powers was justified, for the success of my "Joshua" opened a new era to me.

In 1816, Princess Charlotte married Prince Leopold of the Belgians, a friend of John's as a former neighbour in Marylebone in 1814. Leopold and Charlotte subsequently appointed John as their official, 'Historical Landscape Painter'.

In 1818 I removed to a superior house (30 Allsop Tc.), and had to devote my time mainly to executing some immediately profitable works; but, in <u>1819</u>, I produced the **"Fall of Babylon,"** which was second only to the "Belshazzar" in the attention it excited. The following year, came **"Macbeth,"** one of the most successful of my Landscapes. Then, in <u>1821</u>, an elaborate picture, **"Belshazzar's Feast,"** which occupied a year in executing, and which received the premium of £200 from the British Institution.

John Martin's 'Belshazzar's Feast' was such a success at the

British Institute that barriers had to be erected to protect it, and the exhibition was extended by two weeks to accommodate the crowds that flocked to see it.

A remarkable achievement by the young man, all the way from Haydon Bridge!

In the next year, 1822, there appeared "Destruction of Herculaneum," another elaborate work. In 1823, the "Seventh Plague," and "Paphian Bower". In 1824 the "Creation," in 1826 the "Deluge," and in 1828 the "Fall of Nineveh."

In addition to the above were many smaller pictures, duplicates of some of the above subjects, sketches, and

drawings; but most important of all was my acquiring the art of engraving, and producing "Illustrations of Milton," designed on the plates (and for which I received 2,000 guineas); the "Belshazzar's Feast," the first large steel plate ever engraved in mezzotinto; the "Joshua," and the "Deluge," between 1823 and 1828.

Thus it will be seen that all my greatest works which have gained me a reputation both at home and abroad, were produced within the eleven years immediately succeeding the first fair exhibition of my "Joshua."

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

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A VIEW FROM UP THERE

As our summer stumbles onwards, neither hot and dry, nor wet and cool, this month's VFUT starts on a health note. My friend Graham sent me the following unfortunate typos from church notices in the USA. In bold lettering on one church noticeboard the locals are called to prayer for "the many who are sick of our church and community" and perhaps especially for a Mrs Johnson who would soon be entering hospital for testes. And church activity certainly seems to offer significant risks to society when we hear that the scouts in a local church were collecting old drinks containers to be recycled, the proceeds being used "to cripple children" A potluck supper at one church was to be followed by prayer and medication – what were they cooking ??.

When asked what the weather is going to do, my stock reply, which is often reasonably accurate in the UK, is "changeable" and this was certainly an accurate descriptor for June's weather, with its mixture of cool and wet, and warm and dry, spells.

Over the first seven days the weather was dominated by Atlantic weather systems bringing a characteristic variability. There were some sunny intervals which ensured that daytime temperatures remained somewhere near the seasonal average, and just the one significantly wet spell on the 4th (10.6mm). A frontal system on the 10th heralded a spell of cooler and very wet weather, particularly on the 12th which was extremely dull with drizzle and low cloud turning to wet overnight. Local rivers were running relatively high on the 12th/13th.

Unsettled cyclonic conditions persisted until the 25th when the main influence on the weather was a developing ridge of high pressure but not before hot air from the south had introduced very unstable atmospheric conditions which brought thundery showers (24th).Once the high pressure had become established the weather settled into a pattern of early morning greyness followed by warm and sunny afternoons. By the 26th afternoon temperatures had exceeded 20 degC. Hot air from the south (40 + degC in continental Europe) broke June weather records across the UK and soared to 26 deg C in Haydon Bridge on the 29th, the day of the summer fete in Haydon Bridge. Falling pressure at the end of the month opened the door to cooler arctic air from the north-west.


