

Dear Friends.

This time, I am offering you Notes from Tynedale instead of my usual letter.

Home Insulation Scheme The new Homes Insulation Grants Order came into force on 1st February 1988. There are important changes to the conditions under which applicants will qualify for grant, and to the availability of different types of grant.

The general 66% grant (maximum £69) has been abolished.

The 90% grant has been extended to cover all householders in the "special need" categories, regardless of age.

This means that applications on the grounds of "special needs" are the only ones for which grants will be available. The grant is 90% of the cost of the qualifying works or £137, whichever is the less.

What is "Special Need": related to Home Insulation Grant?

During the Transition period February 1988 to April 1988 the following householders are eligible:

Those in receipt of a) Rate rebate

b) Hent allowance, supplementary benefit or family income supplement.

After April 1988:

Households receiving housing benefit, income support or family credit will qualify.

All these subject to compliance with scheme conditions.

Housing Matters

Central Heating: British Coal has been requested to prepare a scheme for the upgrading of the solid fuel systems in some areas of Haydon Bridge. This means that all those who will be involved will receive a letter and an invitation to visit a mobile unit to view the types of fire available so that a choice can be made by each householder. If you miss the exhibition and wish to make a choice, contact me and I will pass on your request

Metal Window Replacement: Finances have been set aside from the Housing Capital Programme 1988/89 to replace the metal windows in 10 properties in Hordley Acres as Phase 2 of the scheme.

A number of houses in Strother Close will also be financed in 1988/89 but these will depend on the capital available at the time of introduction.

Major Repairs: Hordley Acres will have gutter replacement and roughcast repairs.

Haydon Bridge By-pass: Both the Parish Council and myself have received letters from Mr Alan Amos, in which he makes the following statement:

"I am becoming increasingly frustrated and angry about the delays and uncertainty involved with this. Accordingly, I have written a strongly-worded letter to the Minister. Unless I receive a satisfactory reply, I intend to take the matter further by raising it in Parliament"

May I take this opportunity to hope you have a happy Easter holiday.

PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS (February and March 1988)

Both meetings well-attended by Councillors and by more members of the public than is usual.

Traffic and Roads

Some houses in Radcliffe Road are reportedly suffering damage caused by the vibration produced by large vehicles passing at speed. The Council will contact the Department of Transport about a survey of this problem. It will also be brought to Mr Amos' attention.

An 'old people' traffic sign at Peelwell has been refused. Apparently, if you put up too many, drivers ignore them.

By November we should have some new level crossing gates. These will be of the barrier type with a skirt undermeath. They will continue to be operated by the signalman, so there should be no change in the safety aspect. But there will not be a footway wicket-gate, so a new access to the eastbound platform from the north-side will be constructed.

In spite of Parish Council protests on the last occasion, the County Council has agreed to allow British Rail to CLOSE the LEVEL CROSSING without any consultation about the date.

CLOSURE is from 2200hrs on Saturday 9 April to 1500hrs on Sunday 10.

Illuminations

New light fittings in Langley Gardens have made a welcome improvement. (No need to go to Blackpool!)

The Church clock-tower is to be re-wired for £255 plus VAT.

Playtime

Clir Bill Howard drew pretty much of a blank when looking for any possible alternative site for the children's Play Area. Tynedale D C has all the new equipment waiting, so the Council decided to ask them to put some of it where the old equipment was, and see how things develop.

Cllr Loyd told us that an appointment to the job of 'Motivator' at the Sports Hall will definitely be made in May. It seems that the County Council has agreed to take responsibility for the whole thing, but subject to reserved rights for local use. However, some members were doubtful whether the County had actually made the necessary financial provision.

Amenity

Nobody has thought of a 'Go-go Area' for dogs. (There is some knowledgeable advice on this subject on the Letters page)

It was reported that Bowman's Chemists are to give up selling three-wheeled bikes from the riverside. The idea of placing some large stones to dissuade cars from cutting up the grass will be looked into again.

There is to be more frequent road-sweeping from June. Church Street will be attended to twice a week and the other roads once. It was suggested that this improvement will have even more noticeable results if the Church Street residents could be persuaded not to leave their cars parked there on sweeping days.

Best-kept Village

In spite of some notorious black-spots in the village, the Parish Council thought there might be some value in entering the 1988 competition provided some people can be found who will organise it.

If anybody feels like taking on this task, please get in touch with the Parish Clerk. The decision whether or not to compete must be taken at the meeting on 28 April.

YOUR LETTERS

A few observations on that perennial problem - dog droppings.

If dogs are regularly wormed, the very unlikely possibility of a toxacara infection is greatly reduced. However, getting the mess on your feet or clothes is still very unpleasant.

It is possible to regulate a dog's habits by altering its mealtimes, once it is adult. While it is young and untrained in toilet habits, it shouldn't be out in public anyway, because its vaccinations aren't complete.

A "poop-scoop" costs under £3 and all the pet shops in Hexham stock them. They are very easy and convenient to use. I took one with me to Crufts. The Borough of Kensington have a fine of £20 for anyone allowing dogs to foul public areas - no distinction between pavements and grassed areas - simply "public areas" Crufts also have an instant fine of £5 if dog exhibitors allow dogs to foul inside Earls Court. The poop-scoop doesn't get dirty as it is used with a plastic bag around it - it is a neat little invention and occupies as much space as a half-pound pack of butter. If it's kept beside the dog's leash, it won't be forgotten when going for a walk.

I must say that the problem is not as bad in Haydon Bridge as it is in Newcastle. There, many dogs are turned out to exercise themselves and it would be difficult to trace the irresponsible owners.

My own dogs will not defaecate when on their leads, and are only allowed to run free in their own garden. This posed quite a problem when in London and required some hours of hopeful lead-walking with scoop at the ready! Dogs not fortunate enough to have a large garden need somewhere to run free, but if watched carefully, the scoop can be used.

The whole problem boils down to education of dog-owners, which could start by asking a representative of PRO-dogs to visit schools with a demonstration dog. PRO-dogs give talks on responsible dog ownership and their visits are always very popular. The children usually pass the message on. Leaflets are available for schools. There were 15,567 dogs at Crufts and very little mess, so it can be done, mainly because of constant propaganda by the dog press.

Usually it is a very small proportion of uncaring owners who allow fouling, and this gives them all a bad name. I am all in favour of not allowing dogs in play areas or on football fields, having had some nasty football kit to wash in years past. But dogs are a very necessary part of some people's lives; and some provision must be made for them. Dog-owners are ratepayers to.

Before the old chestnut of horse-droppings is brought up - it is much easier to see and avoid horse-droppings, and they do seem to disperse very quickly. At one time city gardeners used to rush out to collect them for the roses!

Finally, PRO-dogs motto: - Dogs Deserve Better People
