

Dear Friends

This month I wish to use my usual letter space to pass on INFORMATION FROM TYNE-DALE.

1) The Closed Cemetary to the rear of Alexandra Terrace.

I managed to covince the Parks and Open Spaces Committee that under an Act of Law, 1972 they have responsibility to maintain the Closed Cemetary "in a decent and fitting manner". As a result each year for the next four years, there will be a once yearly initial clearance and 10 grass cuts in the growing season.

2) Rent Rises.

Due to the introduction of the Housing Benefit Regulations last April, there has been a great increase in Rent Arrears in Council Tenancies. At the same time other Housing regulations will reduce the Housing Departments income. In order for the capital Action Plan to implement Housing maintenance and Major repairs the present rents will rise by £1.50.

3) Sports Hall

At a meeting held in December the major issues were resolved. Since the Sports Council have promised financial support for three years (to be reviewed yearly), it was agreed that funding from Tynedale and Parish would be continued so that the Sports Motivator could continue with the already successful Sports Program in the coming years.

Cllr Lloyd and myself are both pleased that the Sports Motivators appointment has been given a more secure basis.

4) Play Arca

The old Play area is in the process of removal. As soon as the growing season allows, it will be top soiled and seeded with grass.

Parish Council Pickings

Meeting held 22 December 1988.

6 Councillors present.

It has now been more or less confirmed by the County Council that a serious accident is required before any money can be allocated even to quite minor road improvements.

The Ridley Hall junction, Sewingshields and the view East from John Martin Street all seam to fall into this category.

Similarly there seems no hope at all of the bridge repairs or the climination of "the dip" being undertaken in 1988/89, in spite of earlier promises.

The Parish Council will press Cllr Gibson to keep these matters alive at County Hall Morpeth.

Nobody yet understands how the "Poll Tax" will work, but the best opinion is that the needs of the Parish will not add any more to the "Poll Tax" than they now do to the rates. Anyway a Rate has to be set for 1989/90, and bearing in mind the estimate presented at the last meeting, it was agreed to fix it at $3^{1}/_{2}p$.

The Ministry of Agriculture's Food Store at Strothers Close is on the market, it is understood that at least one Housing Association has registered its wish to provide Sheltered Housing on the site.

Bowman's Chemists want to extend their shop. No objection was raised to this, but nobody much liked the idea of three very visible new houses on Tofts Bank: that application will go back to Tynedale without the Parish Council's blessing.

Finally, there was some criticism of the level of service provided by the Royal Mail. Isolated houses have perforce to wait till late morning for their first delivery, and the first class mail certain y does not seem to match up to the claimed national average efficiency.

Dear Marion,

It can hardly have escaped the notice of anyone living in the village that building of the new Health Centre has made a good start what with J.C.B.'s & great cranes altering the landscape where the old blue building used to be and a magnificent new building is starting to take shape.

We have had no capital assistance in this venture from the Area Health Authority whose budget, now, has nothing to spend on projects such as this although the Family Practitioners Committee, so whom G.P.'s work under contract to supply medical services via the Primary Care Team, to the public, are helping to paying a "Cost Rent" to the practice which will cover the interest on the loan we have had to take out to build the new Centre.

However, apart from the actual building, there will be a lot of furnishings and equipment, not only medical instruments etc but other items like the furnishings for the Child Welfare Clinics etc, etc, etc which we will need to buy and Dr.Graham and I are very grateful that individuals and groups of people in the village are already starting fund raising efforts to help us.

All such endeavours will be acknowledged in the "Haydon News" as they occur and, when we open, hopefully in May 1989, by public notice in the new building.
