A FAMILY MATTER

Mrs Howard Havdon News

Dear Mrs Howard

I have been in touch with Rev. K Fletcher who has very kindly suggested that I contact you on the following family matter. I am engaged in researching some ancestors in the Haydon Bridge area and it is possible that there may still be descendants of the following families to whom I could write about this. I understand that you edit the local paper which is delivered to each household and wonder if you would be kind enough to mention the following names in case they "ring a bell" with some of your read-

DAVISON

Joshua Davison (son of Joseph) who died c1845 is buried in the Parish churchyard at Haydon Bridge with other members of his family ie John died 1832 aged 28, Ann Brown (daughter wife of James) who died 1851 and his infant children. Also Joseph Davison - son of Joshua died 1874 and some of his children ie Jane 1849: Henry 1849 (aged 18) Cuthbert 1875 (aged 39) and his wife Ruth 1894 aged 91.

LANGLANDS

Stephen Langlands who died 1798 buried Haydon Bridge Old Chapel. Lived Whinnetley. Had children Dorothy born 1776 (married Joshua Davison son of Joseph at Warden in 1779): Nathan - my ancestor who left Whinnetley on the death of his father - married in Greenwich and became a Grocer in Dartford, Kent: Edward: John: and Jane: and possibly a son Stephen.

I paid a short visit to Northumberland in June but apart from searching among the tombstones did not have time to make enquiries. "Whinnetley" appears to consist of one farmhouse but may have been a village once.

Hope I am not making too many demands on your time or asking too much. I understand the name Langlands is unknown in Haydon Bridge at the present time but there may be descendants through the female line. I do hope so.

MEDICAL NEWS

We are now working in our new Health Centre and hope you like the new facilities we have. The external landscaping is not yet completed but we hope it will be before long. Most people agree that both externally and internally it is a worthy addition to the village and the villagers have played a most encouraging part in enabling us to provide equipment and internal decor of good quality by their generous gifts to our HEALTH CENTRE APPEAL FUND. Up to now we have received over £10,000 details of which are given later and this generous response has made us think that this APPEAL FUND should be an on going function which will enable us to offer patients the very best facilities we can.

It might be helpful if I outline the facilities we now offer at the Health Centre.

Consultations with a doctor are normally made by appointment so that patients are not kept waiting unduly long and so that doctors can give adequate time to each patient. This does not mean that you have to plan ahead when you will be ill. dents and emergencies will always be attended to as circumstances dictate but many consultations are "follow-ons" from previous ones and can be spread over available surgery times so that we are not rushed off our feet in one surgery and "twiddling our thumbs " in another.

Dr Graham, who came to us in 1984, has decided to go to New Zealand and join a friend in partnership there. We wish him well and are grateful for the skillful and conscientious service he has given us. In his place Steven Ford, his wife, Jean and 2 young children will be coming on August 14th.

Dr Ford is a son of a Devon farmer and has been in practice on the Yorkshire Moors and in a rural area near Nottingham and I feel sure he will

"fit-in" well with us. I shall be around for a month or so after he comes to us and then hope to take a 2 - 3 month break to see what my family in South -

Africa and Australia are getting up to! I shall then return and work in partnership with Dr Ford, for, I hope a few more years, health and competence permitting!

Our district nurse, sister Karen Cousins, will continue with her present duties which include a well-woman clinic every other Thursday afternoon

(at which cervical smears can be done) and a "weightwatchers " clinic on alternate Tuesdays. These clinics are not " exclusive " and cervical smears can be done at other times, by prior arrangement, if your work commitments make " clinic times awkward. Sister Cousins also has clinics on Mondays. Wednesdays and Friday mornings, at the health centre for routine ear syringing and the taking of blood samples.

In addition to Sister Cousins we are going to employ a practice nurse who will be in attendance at all surgeries as well as holding surgery sessions of her own when she will be seeing that all immunisations are brought up to date as well as attending to other matters that will enable the doctor to give more time and attention to conditions that need his expertise and time. The practice nurse will be Mrs Mary Southwaite S.R.N. who is, at present, staff nurse on ward 5 at Hexham General, and I am sure that she will be a most valuable and pleasant addition to the "team ". Our social worker. Mrs Sandra Cullen can see clients at the centre by prior arrangement Hexham Social Services. Hexham 603582, as will the community nurse, Eddie Wilson or one of his female colleagues, by ringing Hexham General Hospital, if you have emotional problems although, usually, you will probably bring your problem to the doctor.

Chiropody service is now available on Thursdays at the Centre but appointments must be made via the Area Health Authority Chiropody service at Morpeth, Telephone Morpeth (0670) 514331.

Wart and Verruca Clinics will be held at the centre from time to time when we collect liquid nitrogen from Hexham, which is a quick, painless, and convenient method of dealing with this troublesome complaint. We take your name and telephone number and will inform you when to attend the next session. Minor operations for the removal of "lumps and bumps" are arranged in a similar way. The Child Welfare Clinic will be held on Monday afternoons in the Health Centre when the Health Visitor, Mrs Sarah Macalister and a doctor, will advise on baby and infant problems and development.

In time we hope to have a Physio-therapy services but this will depend on the demand for such services and the staff resources available from Hexham General.

Health Education is of growing importance and we hope to have talks, supplemented by video films and other demonstrations on such subjects as Asthma, Eczema, Psoriasis, Arthritis, etc, etc, etc from time to time, mostly during the winter months.

In addition a Chiropracticioner, Mr Peter Lomax, will be available for consultation and treatment sessions on Thursdays. Chiropractise is a method of treating various painful conditions by manipulative methods. Mr Lomax is a well qualified and responsible practitioner but he is not medically qualified and not employed by the N.H.S. In other words he will charge a fee for his services and operates quite independently of us. We are not responsible for his professional activities, he is just using our accommodation for his professional purposes.

Finally I would like to thank both parents and my staff, Mrs Marion Hunter, Practise Manager and receptionist, Mrs Geraldine Round and Sybil Gobsill, for their cheerful adaption during the transitional period from the old surgery to our present Health Centre. I am pleased to say that my house is now, almost back to normal. If you are coming to the Health Centre by car, please use the Car Park if space available. If your passenger is disabled, let them alight at the surgery entrance. Let us try to keep

the North Bank as clear of parked cars as possible. It is safer for the school children and enables the Council to clear the drains better. THANK YOU ALL
