

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EDITORIAL

A personal experience

Not many people in this day and age can say they have witnessed a miracle, although some have! I can only recount my own experience to help you judge for yourself. You can call it what you wish.

In November 1990, on a fine sunny day, I was driving to my home, Coldingham, in Scotland. I always prefer the picturesque route via Rothbury, Wooler, Berwick on-Tweed to "Mutende" (Peace). At 12.30pm, somewhere on the A697 near Glanton (I don't know yet exactly where), I knew no more!

At 5.00pm that evening I awoke in bed in Newcastle General Hospital with a policeman sitting on my bed asking for my next of kin. He proceeded to tell me how I got there: a young man had attempted to come out from a minor road and cross the A697 but misjudged his timing. He was driving a large Landrover and hit me head-on. I never saw him nor indeed, quite miraculously, felt any impact. car was a write-off according to the PC. There were two witnesses who gave evidence. fortunately me. I had been taken to the hospital by Helicopter (the main point of this letter).

We have all received a leaflet asking for support for this wonderful service. Please consider seriously what happened to me. Who knows who may be next? Such a worthy cause deserves our support, particularly in a County where the nearest Hospital is quite often more than an hour's drive away.

When you read this in September I will have retired from my position as Matron at Haydon Lodge Boarding Wing. In the three and a



half years I have been living in Haydon Bridge I have become acquainted with many of the residents. My sincere thanks to them, to the Doctors and Staff, shopkeepers and clergy who have all helped to make my time here most enjoyable.

YOUR HAYDON NEWS

You may have noticed that the Haydon News is now being delivered to you on a much more regular basis than formerly. This is largely because it is being printed locally, by the St Cuthbert's Press, after which every effort is made to ensure you get your copy early in each month.

All the work which goes into the production of the "News" is voluntary. It begins with the collection and putting together of contributions by the Editor,

who then prepares the master copy ready for printing. We are pleased to include the regular Health Centre News which I am sure is of great interest to everyone.

The printed pages, usually between 3 and 4 thousand including the Church Newsletter, have then to be collated and stapled before being taken to the twenty or more individual distributors in the village who make the doorstep delivery of the 800 copies.

In return for the inclusion of the Church Newsletter in the distribution system we are charged a special rate of little more than the cost of paper and ink for the printing service. Even so the annual cost amounts to nearly £400.00. The income received from advertisements meets a good proportion of this but individual donations are a significant help.

The production and distribution of the Haydon News is the principal activity of the Friends of Haydon Bridge but the organisation also supports worthy causes within the Village. Contributions in cash or kind have been made in recent times to the Health Centre, the Community Centre, the Pass Campaign, Hanging Baskets and the Village Fete. Which all leads me nicely into letting you know that the AGM of the "Friends" will be held on 26 October. Annual subscriptions (£1.00 minimum) are now due: new members

DISCHARGE into RIVER TYNE at HAYDON BRIDGE

From time to time there is a discharge into the river from a release pipe situated just down stream of the main road bridge on the North bank. It is normal for this discharge to occur during or after periods of rainfall, however it can happen in dry weather due to blockages in the sewage system.

Whereas this release pipe is necessary to prevent a far more distressing appearance from elsewhere in the system it is indicative of an inadequate sewage system in Hay-don Bridge and the cause of unacceptable pollution of the river.

The National Rivers Authority (NRA) has been set up by Act of Parliament to be an independent pollution watchdog with powers and resources to control water pollution. The NRA Senior Pollution Prevention Officer for Northumbria Region is aware of the problem in Haydon Bridge and has asked to be informed whenever a discharge occurs.

Anyone who notices a discharge into the river from this release pipe (or from any other source) should inform the NRA by telephoning 091 2130266. The same number can be used out of office hours when the call is put through to the Emergency Control Room. The duty standby officer will be contacted and will deal with the problem as quickly as possible.

PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS

23 July meeting7 Councillors present. No public participation.

So we are in the final of the Best Kept Village Competition! It has to be said that there has been a vast improvement in the tidiness and colourfulness of the place over the last year or two and a lot of people have gone to trouble and expense smartening up their own patch. But it does raise the question - "is it fair that private owners should be put under moral pressure to do something if their particular patch is singled out for criticism by the judges?" Perhaps you would like to express a view on this via our letter column. Personally, I derive a wry smile from the fact that two of the local churches are mentioned in the judgement while the final judge, Rosemary Harthill, used to be the BBC's Religious Affairs correspondent!

British rail admits there is a problem of dust blowing off the Coal wagons and will do something about it. They may already have slowed the trains down.

After a meeting with Parish Councillors a satisfactory scheme for relighting Strother close has been adopted by Tynedale Council. A car has landed up in Langley Burn. The Parish Council decided to suggest that a crash barrier be put up, if the money can be found.

There were several Planning proposals to discuss. Development of Tait's garage site and the extension of the caravan site have both been deferred for further consideration. The County Council has put in for outline residential development of the vacant land on the left of the North Bank below Peelwell and it is proposed to convert a garage in Church Court into a twostorey house. Most of these proposals reinforce existing anxiety about the capacity of the village sewerage system, about which Cllr Loyd has tackled the River Authority.

The local branch of the Fire Brigades Union sent in a letter asking for support in their efforts not to have the Hexham station downgraded to "retained-only" status. They estimate that the response-time to attend a call to Haydon Bridge



would be a minimum of 45 minutes. The Parish Council had no hesitation in deciding to enter their protest about the proposed cutting-back of the Fire Service and agreed to write to the Home Office and also to make their views known to County Cllr Purdue.

The meeting ended by registering a well-deserved "thankyou" to Mrs Christine Swaddle for her years of uncomplaining service as Parish Clerk.



We meet on the fourth Wednesday of the month at 7.30 p.m. in the Church Hall.



Family Planning - nearly everyone knew that we offer a full FP service.

Most people did not know that we are a Yellow Fever Centre. This means that we can supply ALL foreign travel immunisations including Yellow Fever.

Health Promotion - the four most popular items were: stopping smoking, good diet. Children's immunisations and regular exercise. We are keen to offer help and advice on all of these items and more besides. Being healthy is much more than simply not being ill!

CONDOMS

After a great struggle we have managed to get a small number of condoms to distribute. We shall be giving these to the most vulnerable group - the young people. It is absolutely potty that the Government places such a heavy emphasis on AIDS prevention and then places limits on the distribution of the only effective means of slowing the spread of the disease. We have raised the issue with the local MP. We'll let you know what happens.
