

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Heugh House Lane

I read in the Haydon News that the Area Surveyor has suggested that parents should not allow their children to play in the road in Heugh House Lane.

I think this is sheer cheek and would like to know if the Surveyor can provide somewhere else for them to play, or should all parents padlock their gates? The children LIVE here and their parents pay their local taxes and have a right to pass freely. They probably came here to get away from heavy traffic and did not expect it to follow them into a fifteen feet wide lane a mile from the A69.

Even if they restrict themselves to the verges they are not safe because of overtaking and the ruined verges produce an awful lot of mud.

Children cannot be fenced in the garden all the time and how can you ride your bicycle in the garden? At this time of the year in particular there is much to attract them and to be seen and enjoyed in the lanes. Naturally they want to get out and see the new lambs, the clever school sheepdogs working and the varied wildlife which is being renewed.

I repeat that this heavy traffic has no place in a quiet country lane and should have been planned away from a residential area.

There is no wish to deprive anyone of much needed work. We can only hope that planning permission and re-routing come as quickly as possible and that more thought is given to traffic access in any future plans. Meanwhile, we could do with less "lorry driver's litter" tossed out.

I was concerned to read your letter which appeared in the Hexham Courant on the 8th May 1992, and would like to reassure you that the County Council does share residents' concern over the Traffic use of Heugh House Lane. However, you do recognise in your letter, that prohibiting Traffic to use this road could have implications asfar as local employment is concerned, hence we arepursuing a policy of attempting to reduce the traffic without detrimental effect on the local business and regrettably this is not proceeding as swiftly as could have been wished.

My remarks, which were quoted out of context in the Haydon News, relate to a specific request by the Clerk to the Parish Council on the matter of children playing on the highway, and as 5,545 children were killed or seriously injured in road accidents in 1990 I am sure you will agree that I could not condone such action.

PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS

May 28 meeting

7 Councillors were present but the majority of the attendance (at least at the opening of the meeting) was by members of the public.

It is necessary to elect a Chairman and Vice-Chairman annually. Mr T A Bates and Mr W J Dyson were returned to their posts without opposition.

In Martin's close the new gate has helped in some ways but it is oddly angled and probably too narrow for larger vehicles. Drivers prefer to back up the road rather than take the trouble to open the gate and use the turning space. This continuing problem has been reported to Tynedale Council and the Chairman also undertook to see how matters might be improved.

Another complaint related to traffic using the wrong side of the bridge in order to overtake stationery vehicles which prevent access to John Martin Street. As even your own law-abiding reporter has been known to do this, it seems unlikely that the Parish Council can do anything to deter the more reckless drivers! (But I for one shan't do it again.)

On the re-submitted planning application for development of the land behind St Joln's Church several negative aspects of the proposal were pointed out: problems of access, inadequacy

of the sewerage system and the risks involved in tampering with the run-off of ground water. Councillors were generally of the opinion that the application was unlikely to succeed.

On the other hand, success has at last come to the owner of the cottages at Hindshield. Having attempted to sell them as agricultural workers' homes for the necessary period, without any offer being made, the restriction will be lifted.

The level of service on the railway will be a subject for debate at a meeting of the Local Association of Parish Councillors on 17 June. At least two of our councillors will be present.




Responsible stewardship is about the wise use of our time, our talents, and our resources. If our relationship with God is right then our stewardship of our world will be much better.

HEALTH CENTRE NEWS

INCONTINENCE

Having "accidents" is horribly embarrassing and very common. Women and men. young and old can be sufferers. Many put up with the problem in miserable silence and by restricting their activities. It does not have to be like this! There is much that can be done to overcome the problem. There is much much more to managing incontinence than simply using absorbent pads. Quite often the problem can be traced to a treatable condition such as infection. If you are one of the silent army of sufferers put your fear and embarrassment behind you and come in to talk over the problem. The Nurses and Doctors will be very happy help you overcome the problem and rediscover freedom from incontinence worries.

HIB Vaccine

In October 1992 a new vaccine will become available against Haemophilus Influenzae B. This is a bacterium which causes several extremely severe occasionally fatal illnesses including a variety of meningitis. Infection after the age of 48 months or before the age of two months is rare. The vaccine has no live organisms in it, is judged safe for everyone and gives protection. 90 + %1987-91 over 20 million were given with no serious problems reported. Starting in October 1992 all GPs in the UK will be trying to get all children on their lists

between the ages of 2 and 48 months immunised quickly. For children under 13 months there are three injections at one month intervals which can be given at the same time as other injections. For children 13 -48 months only one injection is recommended - it seems to work more easily in older children. No boosters are required. Please make appointments for those children who fall into the age range or come to one of the Thursday Children's Clinics or expect to be offered the new vaccine if you attend for any other purpose. The sooner every child is immunised the sooner he or she is safe.

The meetings have for the first time appeared in the "Parish Magazines" of Newbrough, Fourstones and Bardon Mill resulting in several new faces appearing, please invite friends or relatives if you think they would like to come.

SPOTTY LUG DISEASE

In recent months three children have appeared bearing a crop of small, slightly itchy blisters on their ears. At first glance they look like Chickenpox or Hand, Foot and Mouth Disease. Discussions with a variety of specialists and even a Sunday morning visit by the eminent Professor Madely has failed to identify the problem. The Professor's Electron Microscope also drew a blank on samples from one sufferer. It is felt that a virus is a strong possibility and new cases will be the focus of a major effort to identify the virus responsible. If anyone notices that one of their children has small blisters on their ears please may we see them as soon as possible - I promise not to do any unpleasant tests on them!
