

EDITORIAL

The notice on page three, concerning the Lifebelt, was handed in just as the April issue of the Haydon News was going to print. The original draft did not have a black border - that was added by the Editor to emphasise the gravity of the subject matter!

What is even more distressing is the fact that three days later, when the river was in flood and at its most dangerous the Lifebelt was again removed from its housing and sent mindlessly on another unwarranted journey. In addition, on that occasion a search of the river bank proved fruitless so a replacement has had to be purchased - a totally unnecessary drain on public resources.

A similar fate has met the rubbish bin on the Old Bridge. When it was torn down and tossed into the river some months ago a public spirited person retrieved it and put it back on its lamp post - only to be rewarded by finding a few days later that on the repeat "performance" the bin had been sent even further afield!

It beggars belief that anyone in their right mind should indulge in such "pranks". It must therefore be concluded that they are carried out by individuals who are being egged-on to show off in front of their mates or who have had such a "good night out" that they are temporarily incapable of using the sense they were born with. In either case it seems likely that someone knows or at least suspects who is behind the problem. If YOU know anything think carefully how the culprits can be made to behave more responsibly.

Another unfortunate cident has formed the subject of a letter to the Editor from A Very Angry Resident. So angry in fact that they forgot to add their name and address to their letter. The same applies to a literary contribution submitted for publication. It is the policy of the Haydon News to publish only items accompanied by the name and address of the originator(s), even if a pen name is to be used when they appear in print.

The items already mentioned will be considered for publication if the necessary information is forthcoming.

DRAWING COURSE Supported by Northern Arts

I shall be holding a drawing course of ten, two hour sessions in the Community Centre. The course is mainly targetted at people who find time hanging heavily on their hands: the unemployed, the elderly, mothers whose children no longer need their full attention etc. but anyone will be welcome. It is intended for beginners but people with some ability will also be welcome.

The course will be free to the unemployed etc. but a modest charge may have to be made to others, say 50p to pensioners and £1 to others, per session. If the level of grant is sufficient there will be the provision of drawing materials either free or at reduced prices. The classes will take place during the day.

PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS

April 23 Meeting 7 councillors present

In Public Participation the question of the lane behind Church Street was raised. The Co-op lorries are using it and churning up the road. The chairman pointed out that it is not a Parish Council matter because the PC is not a highway authority. The matter has been brought up many times before. It is a private road and public money will not be spent on it. It was recalled that the Co-op had originally agreed to spend money on the road and the residents do not see why they should repair the road for the Co-op to destroy again: in fact they do not want the Co-op to use it at all. It was requested that the whole matter should once again be brought up at Tynedale Council level but the feeling of the meeting was that this is yet another perennial, insoluble problem.

Bingo nights: Wednesday & Saturday 8.15 prompt Come along and bring a friend. speeding cars using Martin's Close was raised again. Steps are being taken to resite the gate and it was suggested that if the matter was put to the Highways Authority they might pay for bollards.

In the Council meeting it was reported that the Odd Job man started work at the end of March and has mainly been occupied with cleaning up jobs, although the responsibility for cleaning still rests with Tynedale. A great deal of mess is being made and damage done by the people working on the Bridge and it is hoped that they will clear it up before they leave.

A letter received from the Area Surveyor has suggested, among other things, that parents should stop their children from playing in the road along Heugh House Lane. The Chairman

reported that Charles Nicol expressed himself to be entirely in sympathy with the residents and said he was going to visit them all, individually. The new building will be built on the A69 soon after planning permission is received.

A letter received from the Rural Development Department on the subject of low cost housing was discussed at length. The feeling was that the Dept is trying to keep us quiet whilst doing nothing. It was pointed out that so-called affordable property built elsewhere was well above what people in Haydon Bridge would consider to be low cost.

Plans for housing near to Tate's Garage have been turned down because the Highways Authority will not allow access from the A69.

Christ is risen!

Christ is risen; He is risen indeed, Alleluia!



At the heart of the Christian Faith is the declaration and conviction that Jesus Christ is risen from death. This is a great mystery which we cannot hope to fully understand this side of the grave, but it is upon this mystery that the Christian Church is founded.

Jesus did not sit down one day with his disciples and lecide to form a new religion. It was the experience of those first disciples of Jesus alive, in a new but very real way, after his crucifixion, that gave rise to the birth of the Christian Church.

In the Gospel records we can read of some of those resurrection appearances of Jesus to his followers. The stories leave many questions unanswered. The history of the Church since that time however, points for ever at the reality of those experiences of the risen Jesus. If Jesus did not show himself to be alive, why would those who could not help but know the truth be prepared to face torture and death themselves rather than admit that Jesus was dead!

But it is not only the bistorical evidence that leads the Church to declare that Christ is risen. Generation upon generation of Christians right up to the present day have found Christ to be alive within their own experience. He who died and rose again still gives new life to those who choose to become his modern day followers. To share in Christ's resurrection is more than to hope for life after death. It includes the experience of living a new life now - a life in greater fulness.

As we all celebrate the new life that reveals itself each Spring time - the Church continues to declare that Jesus lives and because He lives we can always ourselves share the real hope of New Life through him.





CHILDREN'S CLINICS

To cater for the continuously rising numbers of children registered with the practice and to provide the more frequent service requested in some of the questionnaires we shall have Children's Clinics EVERY THURSDAY MORNING starting in May. The clinics will run from 9.00 until 10.00.

Please feel welcome to drop in during these sessions. whether for advice or for immunisation or for one of the regular checks on your child's growth and development. Having a clinic EVERY THURSDAY means that there will be more than double the number of sessions available and it will no longer be necessary to check with a calendar or the Haydon News. We hope that this arrangement will meet with your approval please let us know.

ANNUAL REPORT

As mentioned previously the Practice Annual Report is being complied. The Family Health Services Authority has laid down a particular format for the report which makes it even longer than last years, a copy will be available in the waiting room sometime during May for anyone who wishes to read through it.

For the third year in a row the practice has gained in size, 196 new patients registered with us from as far apart as Acomb and Melkridge.

7011 patients were seen in surgery, 1381 patients were visited at home, 396 out-of-hours visits were made (nights and weekends).

93.33% of primary immunisation, 90.90% of preschool boosters and 90.12% of the required smears were provided.

154 operations were performed in our Operating Theatre

SAME DAY APPOINTMENTS

We are continuing to check that all who wish to be are seen on the same day that they make the request.

7.4% are seen immediately, 45.8% are seen in the current surgery session, 31.5% are seen in the next surgery session on the same day, 4.3% are seen in the first surgery session on the next day and 10.9% choose to come at another time.

89.1% of people requesting an appointment are seen within 24 hours!

POLITICS

Now that the election is over and the Minister of State for Health has five years to pursue the changes which her predecessors started it is likely that almost all practices will, at the least, consider becoming Fundholders. How this will apply for small scattered practices remains to be seen but we feel that it is very important that the issue is discussed and the views of the customers made known. The track record of existing Fundholders is somewhat mixed, as you may have seen in the papers. The operation of a Fund is immensely complicated and involves huge amounts of time and effort. We note with some amusement that the achievements which some Fundholders are getting excited about have been standard procedure in this practice and much of Tynedale for some time! SF.
