

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PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS

26 September meeting 9 Councillors present (there was no meeting in August).

People are having trouble getting into the amenity tip with large vehicles because a bar has been put up to prevent the disposal of industrial waste at that site. If members of the public are having trouble they can call Mr Jim Thompson at Northumberland Waste Management Ltd, Morpeth Tel:0670 505566.

The lights at the pedestrian crossing are changing too quickly from green to amber when the button is pressed so that vehicles have insufficient time to stop. According to the authority the crossing is still within legal limits.

The trophy for the Best Kept Large Village will be presented at 6.00pm, on Monday 5 October at the War Memorial in Church street. It was suggested that all those who had helped towards the winning of the Trophy should try to be present. The Chairman praised everyone concerned. A discussion took place as to where to put the plaque.

Discussion took place on the proposed Information Board which is to cost about £515/535, plus the cost of applying for planning permission. The surveyor had objected to the proposal to position the board next to

the library because traffic might obstruct the approach to the level crossing! An opinion was expressed that the surveyor was being illogical. It is hoped that it could be up by next Spring.

On long term problems Tynedale Council has now agreed that people receiving benefit should get free treatment for insect infestation, but the question of heavy traffic using Heugh House Lane continues to drag on.

The question of providing Mr Curry. the village handyman. with extra equipment. including strimmer, was raised and in turn gave rise to the matter of protective clothing and safety implications. The replacement of the mower used by Mr Orde was also discussed.

If anyone is interested in continuing the topiary work on the hedge near the bus shelter at the East end of the village would they please contact the Parish Council? Otherwise the Topiary will revert to ordinary hedging.

Finally suggestions would be welcome as to how to stop little girls from getting onto the roof of the bus shelter opposite the library and not being able to get down. Otherwise it is feared that sooner or later one of them will have an accident.

DRAWING COURSE FOR BEGINNERS

I think it would be fair to call the class, which finished on 17 September, a success in most respects. The Community Association allowed me to hire the room at a very reasonable rate.

This was in spite of being given some fairly tedious exercises to do, particularly at the beginning, and in spite of the fact that one or two of the group found the work extremely difficult. Most of them found it totally absorbing.

On the last day I compared the work done at the beginning with that at the end and there was what I can only describe as a very dramatic improvement. Most of the group came to the class because they "couldn't draw" and went away feeling that they could ...

HAYDON SPA

This history of our noted local feature was prepared for the Society of Antiquaries of Newcastle upon Tyne and we are pleased to have been given permission to publish it in the Haydon News.

The story begins in 1863 when the Haydon Bridge Picnic Committee asked permission of Mr John Grey of Dilston, the Receiver for the Greenwich Hospital Estate, to construct a path down the steep bank of the River South Tyne a mile to the east of the town, to give access to a natural sulphur spring. A basin to contain the water and a tablet to commemorate the event were also proposed. Permission was given after the Public Analysts, Pattinsons, reported that "the water is very free from organic impurities and we are of the opinion that it may be safely used for drinking". fortunately the activities and purpose of the Picnic Committee have gone unrecorded as have the reasons for the spa project. Whatever the initial impetus, however, the venture was short-lived as by 1897 the area had become overgrown and the path difficult to negotiate.

It was on the last Saturday in April 1897 that a body of Haydon Bridge worthies met together to discuss the thorny question of how the town should celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria. A sports day, firework display, bonfire and public tea were suggested and approved but "it was also agreed that a committee be appointed to formulate a scheme for the celebration (of the Jubilee) in some permanent form". By the end of the afternoon the Rev. J H Mandell, & Messrs

T Clemitson, W H Batey, W Brown, W J Morrison, R Bogdon, H Ware, J Moore, J Lee, L Philipson, W Pittar and J G Clemitson

found themselves on the Committee. By May 8th a sub-committee had been spawned to inspect the Spa Well with the intention of "making some improvement to that valuable water supply". The success of this committee and the tensions of the following months were faithfully recorded by the Hexham Courant:

June 5th 1897, Mr Walton reported that the Jubilee Committee had cleaned out the Spa Well and wished the expense of it, amounting to 6/-, to be borne by the Parochial Committee. Their efforts had revealed that "there was an excellent supply of water but it has got contaminated by the clay water". The other celebratory activities had also done well... (to be continued)

HEALTH CENTRE EXTRA

Is it in the Family?

One of the fastest growing and potentially most rewarding fields of medical understanding in recent times is the study of *Genetics*.

Genes can be thought of as Programmers situated in the most vital parts of every cell of our bodies. They are paired structures, half coming from Mum and half from Dad. How the paired structure, the Gene, will operate depends on whether a particular fraction of the part of the gene that came from Mum will dominate or overrule the fraction that came from Dad, or vice versa, or whether the two fractions are the same in which case they will "pull together".

These gene programmers will influence every aspect

of our lives - the size, shape, colour and every single feature of our bodies and it is now known that certain genes, which can be seen by special magnifying techniques from a sample of blood, or indeed from any cell of a person's body, may carry a potential for that individual to be prone to certain diseases. Downes Syndrome (mongol children) and Cystic Fibrosis are but two examples of a huge and growing number of conditions now known to be determined by genes.

Of course genes are not the only factors that influence the way we develop our lives. Much depends on the influence of environment and accidental factors. A person could be born with the genetic potential of an Olympic runner but if the environment does not provide training facilities and encouragement or if a car crash causes spinal injury he may not achieve his genetic potential.

To explain what genetic research and understanding can do and what counselling services are available, consider such questions as "My uncle had Cystic Fibrosis/Diabetes/Asthma/Altz heimers Disease etc etc,

what are the chances of my children getting it? Could you tell me before the child was born whether they might get it and, if so, should I consider having the pregnancy terminated?"

To shed light on this exciting branch of medicine and to explain whether *Genetics* may be able to provide answers to questions such as these Dr Miranda Splitt - Lecturer in Clinical Genetics will be coming to the Health Centre at 7pm on Wednesday 28 October.

Watch out for posters about this important event nearer the time.


Economic growth and the creation of wealth appears to have become the main function of our life on earth.



HEALTH CENTRE NEWS

NEW SOFTWARE

When this new software has been tarned I should be able to make the Health Centre News much more informative and even include pictures and graphs to illustrate items of news. My progress or lack of it will become apparent as the months go by.

COMING SOON -

During the winter Mary and I propose to hold sessions to help those who wish to try to stop smoking. We hope to hr ¬ some audio-visual aids breath analysing equipment to show how much carbon monoxide gas people are exposed to when smoking. At present we are planning to take advantage peoples New Year resolutions by holding the first session in January. Please let us know if you would like to come to session. The problems which are known to be associated with smoking are now almost too many to shake a stick at. We do not want to make life miserable for smokers - we want to help.

N' PRETTE etc.

The are now several products to help smokers kick the habit, such as gums and stick on patches. The price can be steep but it is no more than the price of tobacco, once you've stopped it's all profit from then on.

Nicorette gum is available in two strengths, the lower strength is available over the counter without a private prescription but if you have such a prescription then you will not have to pay VAT - 17.5% cheaper already! Ask if you would like a prescription, we shall be happy to oblige.

FEMIDOM

You may have seen in newspapers and magazines that there is a new contraceptive device. a condom for women. We have a number of samples at the surgery for anyone who would like to see one prior to buying their own - not on prescription yet. They seem quite a promising development but are more expensive than ordinary condoms. Using them should be easy, detailed instructions are included in each pack of three. We shall be happy to discuss their use and advise if any problems occur.

NEW VACCINE - HIB

October should have arrived by the time this edition hits the streets and the catch-up effort for all children aged 48 months or less will be well under way. The vaccine is against **Haemophilus** Influenzae (type 8) bacterium which causes meningitis, amongst other things. Over twenty million doses have been given in other countries with not a single serious reaction. Children aged 13 months or less will get three doses, usually at the same time as other vaccines. Older children will get only one dose. Please ask if in any doubt about what is needed. Within twelve months all children should be covered and another fatal disease will be no more!

YOUNG PEOPLES HEALTH

Some years ago we looked at the possibility of sending invitations to adolescents to come and discuss health worries and to offer advice on a variety of topics. Part of the purpose was to show that we are keen to help young people both avoid problems and deal with them when they arise. Though the response at the time was not great we hear that the same idea is being tried out in Prudhoe, so we shall look at the plan again. Parents views will be most welcome, drop a note in to the surgery or have a word with one of the doctors.

COUGHS AND COLDS

It's that time of year again! Having just recovered from the allergic sneezes and wheezes of summer we can now look forward to a winter of infections!

Temperature can be lowered by taking paracetamol, cough can be soothed by drinks, steam or sucking a sweet. Bunged up nose can be relieved by Vick or Olbas Oil or similar smellies. Aches and pains can be lessened by paracetamol. Feeling ghastly is best treated by going to bed.

THAT QUESTIONNAIRE Here are the last few items from the questionnaire which was circulated earlier

this year:

Seven people expressed worry about confidentiality. need for absolute secrecy concerning every bit of information about patients is clearly understood by all the staff. Breach of this trust will bring immediate dismissal and probably legal action. If anyone feels that they wish to take this matter further please make direct contact with one of the partners or the Community Health Council. We are concerned as anyone to keep our practice absolutely leakproof.

Dietary advice is freely available from the partners and nurses at the Health Centre, simply ask for an appointment. If you have a special problem we also have access to the Dietician at Hexham Hospital.

Self Help groups - we have a list of several, the Citizens Advice Bureau or the Community Health Council or the Telephone Directory are other sources of information. Counselling - the doctors and nurses are keen to be accessible to people who feel the need to talk through

problems of any sort. More detailed counselling is available at the Fairnington Centre in Hexham, you may either refer yourself there or we can do it for you.

we can do it for you. Emergency domestic help

may be organised with the assistance of a Social Worker. Most people did not want to take part in a Patient **Participation** Group. We welcome all ideas for change and improvement at the Health Centre, please feel free to contribute as and when inspiration strikes you. Most people wanted us to pursue the British Standards Institute "Kitemark" for quality of service, BS5750. During the week that I am writing this we are expecting a visit from an advisor and we have discovered that we may be eligible for a grant from the DTI towards the expense involved in applying for the "Kitemark" . At present only one other practice in the UK has got the "Kitemark"
