

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EDITORIAL.

we observe are available to "less favoured" town and city dwellers.



LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I have to report that the meeting between Mr D Thompson, Headmaster or Haydon Bridge High School, and members of the public at the school on Monday 14 December 1992 indicated that the school's policy of sharing its grounds and playing fields with local residents, when the school was not using them, has altered from what it was in the past.

I have always had great respect and pride in Haydon Bridge High School and for the three Headmasters whose work for the school I have witnessed and admired and believe this view is widely held in the village. Indeed I believe that it was by joint fund raising between the school and the



village that the Edward Waite pavilion and travel foundation were established. I believe there is a feeling among local residents that these notices seem unnecessary and offensive and they now feel debarred from using the school's facilities with the same welcome and freedom they enjoyed in the past.

I feel that these notices will sour relations with the local community and I hope that the School Governors, the County Solicitor and the Headmaster will consider their early removal.

VILLAGE FETE 1992 Application of Proceeds

I t is generally known that these funds are to be applied to "improving the visual impact at the entrances to the Village, as approached from East or West on the A69".

With the approval and encouragement of the Parish Council detailed plans are now in hand. The necessary formalities have also been completed in relation to who else may lay claim to the pieces of ground (or claim a say in what can be done with them) and what services, such as electricity, phones, water and drainage may cross the sites.

At the west end:

A low growing shrub border will be created against the fence behind the old people's bungalows.

At the east end:

A raised bed will be constructed in the grass triangle at the end of John Martin Street and planted with heathers.

To make best use of the funds it is planned to call on volunteer labour in the conplanting struction and Offers of help in stages. "kind" have also been received: for instance the Parish Council has agreed that stone for the raised bed may be extracted from the derelict wall at the cemetery which will tidy up that site at the same time! The loan of a tractor and trailer has

been promised to move that stone and Egger have promised to supply forest bark at minimal cost provided they have it available when it is needed.

Even so it will be necessary to purchase sand and cement and possibly a load of top soil for the heather bed. A rotovator will be hired for the preparation of the shrub border and that and the tractor will need to be fuelled. It is likely that sections of the shrub border will have to be left bare for a future project. Ouite a few local gardeners have offered to take cuttings to help with this scheme. In thanking them I would just like to point out that to create a bold effect we are planting groups of 5-7 of a kind and the Department of Transport is insistent on a maximum height of 3 feet. This will restrict us to Dwarf and Prostrate varieties.

To get to the nitty gritty, the first working party is to be on *Saturday 6 March*. Please study the separate notice and consider whether you are able to help with this project which should ultimately delight us all.

PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS

17 December and 28 January meetings

There were five councillors present at the December meeting but they were all there in January. Having a "full house" presents a problem for your reporter, because the larger the number present, the greater the level of background noise through which he has to try to listen to what the discussions are about. If these notes are deficient, I apologise in advance, but I cannot report what I cannot hear.

"The Public" was in evidence at both meetings. In December there was complaint about the coverage of the "back-lane" controversy by the Courant - about which the Parish Council could donothing. In January, the Council's attention drawn to the increased tendency for drivers to overtake while passing through the village - a result, it was claimed, of higher speeds encouraged by the Watson's Garage road improvement. The County Council has refused double white lines before, but it was agreed to try again, citing the changed circumstances and asking for hatch-marks at the various junctions.

A consortium of wellwishers at Langley has arranged to erect a shelter to protect the huddled children waiting for the school



buses. Tynedale Council has approved, subject to the Parish Council accepting nominal ownership of the structure.

A scheme for village improvements has been settled by the By-Pass Committee. Volunteers who work on this project will be covered by the Parish Council's insurance policy.

Further modifications to the Martin's Close gate are to be made. The money for this comes out of the housing budget and it is not likely that any further suggestions will be listened to. Cllr Mrs Howard, as a member of the Housing Committee, is to have a site visit with councillors resident on the estate to discuss the re-lighting programme, with particular reference to the Greenwich Gardens garages.

There was also a complaint about dangerous stunts by car-drivers on the North Bank - to add to the worries about oversize lorries driven by non-local drivers.

Outside the meeting, I was asked to warn you to wear galoshes if you are walking along the Newbrough Road. The dogs have made it their own!

HELP WITH SMOKING

Wednesday 17th February at 7.00pm at the Health Centre there is a special session to help smokers to give up. We shall have a smoker's version of a breathalyser to show how much carbon monoxide is in your breath, videos, pamphlets, a chance to talk about stopping and an opportunity to see the nicotine patches which many are now using. We want to help - do drop in for a chat!

FOOD HYGIENE

In the last few years we have all been made aware of the importance of food hygiene in the prevention of illness. Diarrhoea and vomiting are miserable symptoms to have at any time but in small children and the elderly there can be very serious consequences. The lengths to which the food industry goes to ensure the safety of the food we buy are quite extraordinary and even then there are still occasional problems. A programme on the BBC showed how a sandwich factory bathed all incoming packages in pure alcohol before opening, clothed the workforce in "space suits" and kept the entire factory, all the delivery vans and all the shop display cabinets at 4 degrees. After all this care a customer can buy a sandwich and leave it in his car for a few hours and then complain when it has not retained it's freshness! Each of us, especially

e who buy and prepare food for our tamilies, shares responsibility for keeping up high standards. Frequent thorough hand washing and disinfection of areas where food is prepared is important. Do not use the same implements and chopping boards for raw and cooked items. Be careful how, where and for how long food is stored. Is your refrigerator working properly, is it set low enough and defrosted regularly? How can you tell if it is working properly? - use a fridge thermometer! Raw meat and cheese should not be stored where they can drip on or touch other food. Keep all foods for the shortest possible time before eating, pay attention to the "Best before -" and "Eat by - " dates, never eat raw meat or eggs, never reheat food twice and make sure that on the first reheat the food becomes "piping hot" all the way through. If microwaving, follow instructions carefully every time.

LISTERIOSIS

The Chief Medical Officer has asked us to continue to be aware of the risks of Listeria infection for pregnant women. The listeria organisms are found in a wide variety of foods and though the food industry has done much to reduce the problem, care is still required. Pregnant women and those trying for pregnancy should avoid soft ripened cheeses (Brie, Camembert and others with coloured veins in), all types of pate, cookchilled meals and ready to eat poultry unless they have been reheated all the way through until they are "piping hot" - too hot to eat straight away! Silage also contains listeria so contact should be avoided.

LAMBING

It's that time of year again! Women who are pregnant or who are trying to be pregnant should avoid all contact with sheep and lambs as they can carry listeria, toxoplasma and chlamydia - all things best avoided.

FOLIC ACID

Recently President Bush recalled how as a boy he hated broccoli. Now, being president nobody could make him eat it -so there! Folic acid - one of the essential ingredients in our diet which we get from green leafy vegetables mostly - is particularly important for women who are or are trying to be pregnant. Taking extra folic acid - as a tablet - and making sure that green leafy vegetables are increased in the diet is now recommended. For more information please ask the doctor or midwife.

THANK YOU

We are very grateful for the most generous donations given to the Health Centre Equipment fund by the friends and relatives of the late Mrs Viola Barron and Mr George Thompson. The fund is used to purchase items of equipment for the treatment of patients and is a registered charity now - which means we don't have to pay VAT, which means the money is made to go even further. Thank you!

REPEAT PRESCRIPTIONS

We try to use medicines and tablets as little as possible but some people need to take things every day. Usually we provide a prescription for a months treatment at a time, unless the person pays treatment tax in

which case we make the prescription for two months. The amount of paperwork has to be seen to be believed! Following a regular six month check up we plan to give enough prescriptions to last until your next check up. You would know that if you were running out of prescriptions it was time to make an appointment. Would anyone like to make a comment about this idea?

FUNDHOLDING

Haydon Bridge, Allendale Bellingham practices become Fundholders together from April 1994. This is in order to allow us to continue to provide the best possible care in the years ahead. Fundholding is very complicated. I shall try to explain over the coming months. Already a surgeon has offered vasectomies at the Health Centre for less than half the price a hospital would charge and straight away as opposed to in a years time! If there is going to be a two tier NHS then our three communities must not be disadvantaged. We do not approve of the development of a two tier system and will seek to share the benefits which we create with others. I feel that it is important for this issue to be debated and understood and will be pleased to answer any questions.

SUPERGLUE

Whilst walking round Kew Gardens the sole of my shoe came off. A short trip to a local shop, a quick squirt of glue, a five minute sit down to let it set and even now - 8 months later - the shoe is as strong as ever. Clever stuff! There is a variety of Superglue sticking people together, Histoacryl. We have some for holding the edges of cuts together - as it avoids stitching the result is neater. Superglue can cause problems. People have mistaken Supergiue for nose or eye drops with horrid results. Always look carefully at the label - don't rely on the size, shape or colour of the container! If you find yourself stuck -DON'T PANIC! The problem can be sorted out, don't pull furiously or cut at the affected part. There has been a report about a man who stuck the cheeks of his bottom together with Superglue....???...Don't ask me!!!! I am sure HM The Queen was thinking of something else entirely when she spoke of an Annus Horribilis!
