

(Meantime we must be grateful for the public spirited individuals, young and old, who now make a habit of coiling up the string each time they pass.)
- the grass around the topiary near the east end, Carlislebound, bus stop became so high that it looked as though the bird was broody and had made itself a nest! Members of the Parish Council, individually and collectively, are trying to get something done about this. There is a volunteer willing to keep the area tidy, given the removal of a bit of fence to allow access for machinery, but officialdom is playing hard-to-get. Meantime a local resident has, in desperation, taken to hands and knees and hand shears. must feel like trying to paint the Tyne Bridge with a box of water colours.
- a roadworks sign which, at time of going to press, has just appeared at the eastern approach to the village states "delays possible till ec. 92". It is easy enough to interpolate the month as Dec., but dec. 1992 has gone by, surely they can't mean dec. 2092? Or can they?

- it is reported that visitors are highly amused to see a certain notice near Shaftoe First School is at ground level, "looking for all the world as though it is there for the dogs to read it themselves". It was however explained to the visitors that the dogs of Haydon Bridge are for the most part of a highly intelligent breed and we are hoping some of them will educate their less gifted owners.

Councillor Mrs Howard undertook to discuss this question with Tynedale Council and report back to the next meeting.

The Parish Council thinks it would if people dissuaded from emphasising the bottle-neck, but does not want to run the risk of having some unacceptable régime forced upon it by outside authority. It was decided to make a low-key approach to the County Highway Engineer.

The planning questions to the Caravan relating to have been site seem resolved. Maximum numbers of static and towing vans have been set, and the site must close each February.

More discussion will be held with Tynedale Council about the provision of street lighting for Alexandra Terrace following an accident there.

IMPROVING OUR VISUAL IMPACT Progress Report

The proceeds of the 1992 Village Fete are being applied to "improving the visual impact at the entrances to the Village, as approached from East or West on the A69". Almost fortuitously, improving the approach from South West has become part of the same project.

Working parties have been in operation over each week end since Saturday 6 March and now that the light nights are here, on some evenings as well. There is no imminent danger of running out of work to be done on the existing project - to say nothing of the suggestions which continue to flow in, regarding other spots which might benefit from our attention!

At the Cemetery entrance:

No significant progress has been made here since the last report.

The intention is to tidy up the end of the remaining drystone retaining wall. Then the present bare soil will be levelled out and sown with grass seed. After which there will be one or two trees planted.

We have "come by" a quantity of bulbs to plant in the grass near the gates and the present area of rough woodland will eventually be interplanted with a few robust flowering shrubs and underplanted with bluebells - but it will remain a good honest wild area.

At the west end:

The timing and standard of grass cutting on the area between the shrub border and the road is under serious discussion between the Parish Council and those providing the service.

The fine crop of "wicken" in the shrub border does not mean that the bark is not doing its job - that only protects against wind blown seeds. The worst of the invasion has been sprayed with weedkiller but there is still rather a lot of hand weeding to be done in this border.

At the east end:

It has been like trying to fill a bottomless pit, tipping top soil into the raised bed at the east end. Nor was the job helped by the weather conditions and both collecting and delivering the soil involved a fair amount of sticking and slithering of men and machines.

In spite of the problems the day eventually came when it was decided that enough was enough and the gap in the wall was closed off. Then the digging team moved in and turned the mixture into a level area of well tilled soil.


Finally, over the weekend of 19/20 June, after the surrounding prairie grass had been reduced to negotiable height, 1,500 or more bedding plants were delivered to the site by various donors and set out in a pre-determined pattern. For the record these included:


african marigold, ageratum*, antirrhinum, aster, cineraria, french marigold*, lobelia*, nasturtium, nemesia, pansy, petunia, phlox drumondi, rudbekia, schizanthus, statice and wait-and-see *in more than one variety

In addition some rockery plants have been placed round the edges to help to consolidate the soil there.

My thanks again go to everyone who is helping in any way with this project. It is a pleasure to be working with so much good will in evidence from all sections of the community. I am sure that the east end flower bed will give almost immediate pleasure to villagers, visitors and passers by alike.
