

Putting the Customer First Survey

The result of this recent survey has been published and a leaflet summarising our performance is available at the counter.

In my opinion the result is excellent: Pat, Margaret and myself are delighted and most appreciative of an obviously good response from our customers and for their generous attitude towards the questionnaire.

I should advise that the timing of this survey and an announcement that Hexham Post Office is to be both relocated and ose its "Crown Office" status was purely coincidental. ever, I think that the public outrage this announcement caused probably served to assist our survey. Nevertheless, it is a reminder that the Post Office continues to be under scrutiny and threat of privatisation and is being forced to make unpopular changes to its operation.

The Post Office has invested a lot of money in the "Customer First" survey. Some twenty thousand offices nationwide will be included in surveys identical to ours and it is planned to be an on-going feature - probably annually. But the system could be flawed when customers get tired of responding to the questionnaires. Some feel the money could be better spent.

It should be explained that it is an ambition of Post Office Counters Ltd (POCL) to modify and modernise public image. It aspires to obtain uniformity of facilities. standards etc. in a network of diverse offices. but with apparent scant consideration to an office's size, location or volume of business. Much of this ambition is achievable, but not cheaply, and at whose expense? However, I maintain that the future of this office and others similar to it will not wholly depend upon the rating in the "Customer First" chart but, as in the past, upon its profitability to POCL. "Use it or lose it" is an appropriate slogan.

I would like to end by informing those customers who made suggestions for improvements that I am obliged to discuss these with POCL officials in mid-April. I shall notify you in due course of the outcome of these talks.

I repeat my thanks for your custom and support and hope it will continue.

IMPROVING OUR VISUAL IMPACT

Work on these projects continues to be hampered by the soggy ground, to say nothing of detours to do a bit of litter picking!

The trench round the East end raised bed is to allow the grass to be "strimmed" more easily. It will be gravel-filled to deter weeds. As soon as is reasonable, some large pieces of stone and a few prostrate conifers will be set out in this bed and peat will be forked into the remaining surface in preparation for heather planting. It is likely that existing funds will cover the cost of only half the heathers needed. Contributions, in cash or kind, to complete the planting would be much appreciated in due course.

On the West end shrub border, a 12 inch deep plastic barrier is to be inserted in an attempt to control the ingress of wicken from the grassed area. Volunteers to help with digging the trench for this - again when ground conditions permit - would be welcomed with open arms!

NEW DOG FOULING BYELAWS

These require dog owners or dog walkers to remove dog faeces from the following areas:

- * pavements beside roads.
- * footpaths, if they are "maintainable at public expense", i.e. tarmac or paving. All public footpaths of this type are covered, except those in Council Housing estates. Tynedale hope to introduce special Byelaws to cover such footpaths.
- * grass verges beside public roads or beside the footway of the road. The verge must be "maintained in good order" by the local authority - verges which are strimmed to improve visibility only are not included.
- * road "gutters", where the speed limit is 40mph or less. The gutter is the 1m. wide strip running along the bottom of the kerb.

The Byelaws also make it an offence for a dog to foul a roadway.

For safety reasons you do not have to clear your dog's faeces from the roadway, but you can be prosecuted if it does foul the road.

Notes

The maximum fine is £500.

Tynedale must provide an adequate amount of signs to raise awareness of the Byelaws.

It is **not** a defence to claim:

- that you didn't have a poopscoop, or
- that your dog escaped, or
- that you didn't see your dog fouling, or
- that you aren't the owner if you normally look after the dog, or are walking it for a friend you are responsible.

The Byelaws do not apply to registered blind people.

A fault in the electricity supply has been responsible for the lights being out on the Old Bridge for over a month. NEEB have been informed. County Cllr Purdue stated that the lighting of Alexandra Terrace should be in place within the next 6 months. Similar works for Lands End Road and Strother Close are further down the list.

The old best kept village competition has been given a new format as the "Village of the Year" Competition. We deplore the circumstance that there are those who make up these malignant lies almost as much as we grieve that there appear to be those fools who believe them!


20 YEARS AGO Haydon Herald May 1974

The second issue of the new magazine appears under a cloud - the death of Robert Harding has robbed us of one of our main supports, and the Village itself of one of its leading figures.

Robert Harding worked for many years to establish a home for the Village football teams. As Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer he kept football very much alive in Haydon Bridge: changing from one field to another according to the seasons when friendly farmers were able to accommodate him.

....Robert had set his heart on providing a settled home for his teams. It is common knowledge that land was purchased at Low Hall and levelled at high cost. His many friends are pleased that Robert did see a start on the erection of a Football Pavilion.

By coincidence, in the series "It Happened Long Ago in your Village", S G Brown, stated that Haydon Bridge formed its First Football Team in 1881. The newly formed Club held its first practice in a field loaned by the Landlord of the Anchor Inn. As the reporter stated in the evening, "there being a full moon and the sky cloudless the ball was sent rolling and a good number took part in the game". The next day the Club received their first challenge for an inter-village match from Allenheads but on accepting and checking on their opponents discovered their rivals only played Rugby.

PENTECOST

Of the three main festivals of the Christian Year, Pentecost or Whitsun, is the least celebrated today. Christmas celebrated the Incarnation - God coming to us in the birth of Jesus. We all enjoyed a public holiday, gave presents, sent cards and generally tried to enjoy ourselves. Easter celebrated the Resurrection of Jesus Christ and most families gave Easter eggs to the children, and a public holiday was kept. Pentecost celebrates the coming of the Holy Spirit but there is no public holiday (apart from May Bank Holiday a week later) and few people mark the festival in any way at all.

Perhaps one of the reasons Pentecost is the least well celebrated festival is that most people today find it ifficult to relate to the Coming of the Holy Spirit. We can relate to the Birth of a baby even if we do not believe he was the Son of God. We can relate to the message of death and resurrection because whatever we believe about Jesus Christ, death and resurrection is a theme echoed in nature. The Coming of the Holy Spirit however, means nothing unless we can relate it to our own experience.

For the practising Christian, Pentecost is not only a past event, but part of our living experience of God. The Holy Spirit is given to us in baptism and when we try to live a life of faith we become aware of the Holy Spirit's presence with us. Through worship and through our attempts to follow the Way of Christ and through our participation as a member of the Church we soon become aware of a conflict within ourselves. It is a conflict between what we know we ought to do as Christians and what our lower instincts prompt us to do. The desire to live as God wants us to live is the prompting of the Holy Spirit within us. The Holy Spirit will not allow us to be satisfied with a life which is centred on material things, worldly success, or the appetites of our human nature.

The Holy Spirit prompts us to "seek the things that are above". This does not make life more comfortable, indeed it is bound to cause a conflict within us because we are by nature rooted to this world and this life. It is, evertheless, a cause for celebration. To have our vision of what human life means, lifted from the material and purely physical, is to add value and meaning to life and is to inject a "sure and certain hope" into the trials and tribulations of life.

HEALTH CENTRE NEWS

APOLOGIES

Due to overwork and the general stress of life, my computer at home put a terse and mildly offensive message on its screen before leaving the field of play on a stretcher on the way to an early bath. Hence this rather less elegant News section - our apologies.

MARY'S LITTLE SURPRISE

Mary(that is to say Dr Mary - La Douthwaite insists that there should be no mistake!) is expecting her first child in August and consequently will be on Maternity leave from July to September inclusive and possibly a little longer. During this time Dr Ambrose will working at the Health Centre. She will be working for five mornings each week.

HAYFEVER

Now that spring has arrived many people will be dreading the start of the hayfever season. Hopefully this year should not be as bad as the last (so the weather men sayl). For those of you who suffer there are several things you can do. Firstly on really bad days and the weather men are fairly accurate at day to day pollen levels try to stay in doors and keep the windows and doors shut. If this is not possible the main treatment is antihistamines taken orally. These can be brought from a chemist but need to be taken regularly regardless of the pollen levels to improve their effectiveness they can also cause drowsiness so you need to be careful driving or operating machinery. If you are taking antihistamines and need a prescription for other medicine you must let us know as some of the antihistamines can interact with other medicines.

Never take a higher dose of the antihistamines than the recommended dose as this can be dangerous and it will not improve its effectiveness. If antihistamines do not work well enough there are a number of nasal sprays and eyedrops available on prescription most of these need to be use in conjunction with the antihistamines and again work best if used on a regular basis. Try to start using antihistamines before you expect to start suffering with your hayfever.

DRIVING

When your driving licence is issued you are then under statutory obligation to notify the licensing centre if you develop any health condition which could affect safe driving either at the time or in the future.

Simple disabilities not expected the last more than three months are exempt from this. If you fail to do so and have an accident it may affect your insurance. Therefore it may be relevant to discuss conditions that may affect your ability to drive safely. Some of these do not stop you driving but you still have to inform the licensing centre. These apply to private cars but for holders of other licenses the criteria are generally stricter and if in any doubt come and ask.

HEART PROBLEMS. Patients with the following conditions should notify the licensing centre:

 a) when they have had a heart attack or if they have had one in the last two months. They are advised not to drive for two months.

b)when angina is easily provoked by driving or

by emotion.

c) when medication for any cardiac condition, including anti hypertensive drugs, has caused vertigo, transient faintness, loss of consciousness, lack of alertness or easily induced fatigue.

d) when there have been one or more unex-

plained episode of fainting.

e) if you have heart block. If you have a pacemaker you are permitted to drive 1 month after

its successful fitting.

DIABETES. All diabetic patients must notify the licensing centre. They will require additional information as to whether you require insulin or not and will probably request information from your doctor as to whether the control is good.

FITS. Anybody suffering a fit should stop driving until it has been investigated. After a single fit you may need to notify the licensing centre this is best discussed with the doctor. If you have epilepsy you must notify the licensing centre. There are some conditions you have to fulfil before you can drive again:

a) free from attacks over the last two years.

b) if you have attacks whilst asleep you must have only had attacks whilst asleep for the last three years. You may be on or off treatment.

HEAD INJURY. After severe head injury or brain surgery many advise that patients should not drive for 12 months because of the risk of developing epilepsy. This does not apply to all

head injuries so if in doubt ask.

STROKES. After a stroke the patient must inform the licensing centre. Depending on the residual disability they can often resume driving after three months but need a medical exam. Similarly, transient attacks should be reported

and patients may be barred from driving for 3 months after 1 episode or 6 months after more. NEUROLOGICAL CONDITIONS. Ongoing ones must be notified, even if initially the patient is still fit to drive. Long standing, unchanging condi-

tions depend on the type and the disability but may need adaptations to drive safely.

VISION. If you lose the sight in one eye you must notify the licensing centre, this does not mean that you are unable to drive but you may need to have a test before a license is issued.

Double vision and defects of dark adaptation

should also be reported.

LIMB DISABILITIES. These should be reported to the licensing centre and patients may have to undergo a driving test and may only be allowed

to drive specifically adapted vehicles.

The above are only guidelines and do not cover everything. If you are in doubt please ask and also remember that a number of conditions may preclude you from driving safely for a few weeks. You are not required to tell the licensing centre but must use common sense especially after operations.
