



EDITORIAL

This month's extracts from Parish Magazine and Haydon Herald illustrate the extremes of a pendulum swing in our attitude towards our civic fathers.

Not quite two years old, towards the end of 1964 the Parish Magazine had obviously been swiping unmercifully at the Parish Council. And though the circulation of the publication was small the ramifications of its attack were widespread, making juicy reading in the Courant, by all accounts.

Ten years later, in November 1974, the Haydon Herald was trying to stir up interest in the future of the Station Yard. Sadly for the Village, there must have been no effective response from the populace. There could have been many reasons for this: the circulation of that publication was also small, the arrogance of the writer in assuming that there was no need to sign the article was unhelpful and there was no specific invitation to join him or her in the Community Centre that night. It is not unlikely that whoever it was remained incognito and thus assumed they were free to desecrate the site at their leisure!



And leisure it was. Of course, as many will recall, all hell broke loose when, in 1978, the enormity of that desecration became apparent - starting with the felling of trees both at the High School and in Church Street, but it was all too late - four years too late.

It was through that mêlée that the need for mutual respect and continuous exchange of information between Parish Councillors and the electorate was finally acknowledged. Thus the Haydon News was born in January 1979, published by the Friends of Haydon Bridge and distributed to every address in the Parish of Haydon, free of charge.

It was a prodigious undertaking but the time was right. The publication soon proved its value and gained the regular support of local businesses, though the distinctive covers of grids of advertisements did not appear till mid 1980. We are most happy to report that ten of those businesses (albeit some under new management) are still with us, both as traders and advertisers!

The pendulum swings of local "attitudes" happily, have, been reduced to a more reasonable amplitude through the efforts of the contributors and the production and distribution teams, plus the attention of the readership, the Haydon News has become a forum for the exchange of ideas and information on all aspects of life in the Parish of Haydon.

BY-PASS UPDATE

Most of you will be aware of proposed changes in the management of the A69 but as there have been many conflicting rumours most of you will have been as confused as we were as to the likely outcome. So, seeking to get a few answers, Bill and Marion Howard and I made an appointment to speak to our local MP Peter Atkinson.

It appears that the A69 will still be owned by the Ministry of Transport but its manage ment will be undertaken by whoever wins the contract to do so - and it is up to each consortium to propose how they will do it if they gain the contract, so nothing is certain yet. The winning contractor will receive 10 million pounds from Government to build the Haltwhistle By-pass and they will also be paid for every vehicle using the A69 as a whole, as they will be responsible for all maintenance and running costs of the total length of carriageway from Newcastle to Carlisle.

The construction of a Haydon Bridge By-pass is not included in this contract because it has not been included in the Ministry of Transport's road building programme. It is doubtful whether the new contractors will advance our fight for a By-pass unless they think it will increase the traffic flow sufficiently to make the road more profitable to them.

We asked why our By-pass was not included in the road building programme as our situation is the same as Halt-whistle's. All factors are equal.

Pollution, safety, noise and vibration damage to buildings are the same - 14,000 vehicles pass through both places each day!

The explanation was not very convincing. We were told that Haltwhistle By-pass was included in the road building programme 4 years ago when the criteria were different: their By-pass will be a single carriageway. Under the present criteria Haydon Bridge is "entitled" to a *Dualled By-pass*. This is a mixed blessing as with greatly increased costs the benefits are unlikely to justify the expense.

Mr Atkinson stressed the need to step up our fight if we wanted a By-pass and we assured him that was our intention. We need to bombard the people who matter constantly and we have some plans in progress. We have an appointment to see Mr Atkinson's advisor, Mr Neville Johnson on 1 November. He has offered to advise us on new approaches.

Have **you** signed our petition yet? If not please do so.

Still fighting.



PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS

Meeting 27 October 6 Councillors present.

At the previous meeting a question of underage drinking was discussed and referred to the Police. Since then the Police have visited all the local pubs and no evidence has been discovered. Further checks will be made.

The Council has received a letter from on high about the new system for precautionary salting and gritting of roads this winter. They to save about £400,000 this year. Apparently precautionary gritting will rake place on specified roads and on bus routes having 10 or more buses before 8am if frost is forecast. On the other hand if freezing actually takes place then gritting will be carried out throughout the District.

* The editor has seen a copy of this leaflet and has quoted from its introductory passage on the following page. It contains good sound advice. The County Surveyor has replied to a letter from the Parish Council about cracks in the Old Bridge. The cracks have been surveyed and are declared not dangerous nor in need of repair at present. The Parish Council is not happy and expressed a wish to be represented at the next inspection.

The Saga of the By-pass continues. The District Council minutes show that Councillor Bill Howard has asked for the Haydon Bridge By-pass to be funded within the privatisation scheme for the A69 as the Haltwhistle By-pass will be. The Government and Mr Atkinson, the local MP, will be pressed further.

Planning applications were received and the plans for Langley Castle were dis-cussed at length. The proposal is to change the use of some buildings - believed to be the old stables - and to build new structures to provide additional accommodation, probably self-catering. The siting of the new buildings and the question of drainage were discussed and the Council decided to inform the Planning Officer "In the view of the that: Council, the plans for new development at Langley Castle are inappropriate".

After further discussion of the need for additional youth activities in Haydon Bridge, the meeting closed.

30 YEARS AGO Parish Magazine Vol.2 No.11 Nov.1964

It appears from press reports that an article in our last issue (A Brighter Haydon Bridge?) appears to have given occasion for the expression of a measure of resentment at the last meeting of the Haydon Parish Council. Is it indeed ridiculous to suggest ways and means of making Haydon Bridge a more attractive and prosperous village? maybe is it ridiculous to expect the civic fathers to do anything about it?

Now, we readily admit that there may have been a measure of indirect criticism in our article - but why all this fuss? We are aware, and we hope readers are aware, that the powers of Parish Councils are limited, and their function is more representative than executive - in other words, while they cannot always take any direct action themselves, vet it is up to them to represent the needs of their parishes to the Rural and County Councils - and to keep after these bodies until action is taken.

In Haydon Bridge we have much to be proud of, much to develop and much for which a sense of real responsibility ought to be felt by all its citizens in general and by its Parish Council in particular. This parish has a rich heritage - but what is being done about it? That is the crux of the matter.

20 YEARS AGO Haydon Herald November 1974

Station Yard: last month I reported that Tynedale District Council is far from convinced of the necessity to build accommodation for old people and for newly married couples or single persons in the Haydon Bridge Station Yard. I requested that anyone likely to be concerned by the end of the present decade should contact Rev. A C Beniams or me as soon as possible. If vou are not concerned yourself please report others known to you.

I can now report that Tynedale District Housing Committee is to discuss the matter on Tues. 12 November.

Other suggestions concerning the Station Yard are:

- a) sell the land to a private developer who would build houses for sale
- b) sell the land in plots for building purposes
- c) make it into a Play Area for the children of the district
- d) make it into a Village Park
- e) Industrial Development

I shall be in attendance at the Community Centre on Wednesday 6 November between 7 and 8pm.

Christmas 1994 Shoebox Appeal

You and your family can bring a little happiness to a child in the former Yugoslavia this Christmas by contributing towards the Operation Christmas Child target of 250,000 shoebox Christmas gifts, by packing your own shoebox. Boxes are needed for boys and girls of all ages, including babies; last year there was a shortage of boxes for teenage girls. This is what to do:-

- # For children pack your box with such items as small toys, sweets and chocolates (securely wrapped), pencils, crayons, colouring books, picture (not reading) books, toiletries, hair brushes, tooth brushes, toothpaste. (No toy soldiers, uns or water pistols please, or easily breakable items, or cigarettes, alcohol or razor blades).
- # For teenage girls, pack small gifts (soft toys etc), soap and deodorant, tights, socks, hair brushes and combs, sanitary towels.
- # Feel free to include letters and photographs, and to cover your shoebox with Christmas wrapping paper but please do not seal the lid.
- # Tape a £1 coin to the top of your shoebox (to help to pay for transport) and label it clearly with the age and sex of the child to whom your present is being sent.
- # Deliver your box to Appletree House, Appletree Lane, Corbridge any evening after 4 pm between 14th and 30th November; or to the Wentworth Leisure Centre, Hexham which is open all day.

GEESE ARE NOT SO SILLY!

By flying in V formation each bird flies in the slip-stream of the bird in front and the whole flock can increase its flying range by 71% over a bird flying alone. People who share a common direction and a sense of community can get where they are going quicker and more easily because they are travelling with trust in each other.

When the lead goose gets tired, it rotates back into the formation and another goose takes up the lead position.

It pays to take turns doing hard tasks, and sharing leadership with each other. Whenever a goose falls out of the formation, it quickly gets back into live in order to take advantage of the 'lifting power' of the bird immediately in front.

If we have as much sense as a goose, we will step in formation with those who are headed where we want to go.

The geese in formation honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

We need to make sure our honking from behind is encouragingnot something less helpful,

When a goose gets sick or wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow to help and protect. They stay until the goose is either able to fly again or dies.

If we have as much sense as the geese, we'll stand by each other and give our love and support to those in need.

HEACTH CENTRE NEWS

YOU CAN DO IT - IF YOU REALLY WANT!

In the last few weeks the Health Centre Team have been trying to put what they preach into action. It shouldn't always be a case of "do as I say, not as I do!" There is a Tynedale Corporate fitness challenge going on in which businesses put in teams to achieve certain fitness gains over an eight week period - we understand that there is a prize too.

Marion Wilson (the practice manager), Mary Douthwaite (the practice nurse) and myself (SF) are the team from the Health Centre. we have all had our initial assessments done and been given our targets to reach on weight loss and exercise etc. We'll let you

know how we get on.

Encouragement has come in the form of some of the residents in the village who have made spectacular improvements: One lady has lost over six stone in a few months and another has both given up smoking AND lost several pounds in weight at the same time. In the past year or so there has been a definite trend towards giving up tobacco in Haydon Bridge - we will make every effort to help and encourage those who wish to still Not only are there tablets and patches containing nicotine but there is now a nose spray too.

INGROWING TOENAILS

A young person was brought into the surgery the other week with a very sore toe. When the toe was looked at, it was obvious that the nail was "ingrowing". This is a very common condition - the difference on this occasion was that the injury had been done by toe nail biting!

Every month I see two or three people with ingrowing toe nails. Usually the nail has been cut back much too severely so that the outer sides of the nail burrow down into the flesh of the toe as the nail grows. This causes infection and much pain.

Toe nails should be cut straight across, leaving the two outer corners showing at the toe tip. Cutting the nail back at the edges will lead to painful consequences!

HEAD INJURY

Getting a knock on the head is a particularly unpleasant sort of injury, usually painful, sometimes by the triangle of the property of the pro

Worrying features - other than unconsciousness - include drowsiness, the spilling of blood from a wound, the nose or the ears, nausea and vomiting, pain and difficulty with seeing (such as double vision).

IF IN DOUBT - ASK!

DUODENAL ULCER

Pain in the upper part of the stomach or to the right side and sometimes into the back, worse when hungry or at night and relieved by something to eat or a (non alcoholic) drink may well be due to a duodenal ulcer. A duodenal ulcer is a patch of worn away lining tissue on the tube leading from the stomach to the rest of the intestines. It is particularly common in smokers.

A bacterium called *Helicobacter pylori* has been found to be a contributory factor too and it, and the ulcer, can be eliminated in some people by a specially intense course of antibiotics and stomach acid reducing drugs. It is unusual these days to need an operation for duodenal ulcer.

PLAGUE

The panic in India about bubonic or pneumonic plague (different versions of an infection with the same bacterium) seems to be fading away.

It is interesting to reflect that the antibiotic of choice to treat this disease is the same one that we use to treat

acne and ordinary bronchitis.

Even if a traveller from India had escaped detection at their port of entry the control measures that exist in this country would eliminate the problem within hours or, failing that, every man, woman and child in the UK could be treated for a few pence only.

MEASLES AND RUBELLA VACCINE

If anyone has any worries about having their child vaccinated in the current round we shall be delighted to talk with them. We can also put you in touch with the Community Paediatrics Consultant who is in charge of the project for Northumberland. He will be delighted to respond to any question you care to put. At present we have a 100% immunisation of children in the practice and we are most grateful to parents for their co-operation in achieving this. We know that some people are nervous about immunisations and we would never pressurise a parent but we would certainly wish to make available to them all the information they might desire to help them decide.

FOGGY MOTORING

You see them thundering down the roads every day-drivers who have turned off the flow of fresh air into the car. They have the steering wheel in one hand, if you're lucky, and a rag in the other with which they repeatedly wipe condensation from the screen.

Fresh air from the screen or fascia vents keeps the screen and the driver's head clear - improving the chances of keeping the car out of the hedges.

Exhaust furnes contain all sorts of nasty gases, including carbon monoxide (and hydrogen sulphide from catalyst equipped cars) and these can seep into the car from the engine compartment leading to drowsiness, headache and lack of concentration - or even unconsciousness. In a well sealed car the occupants may consume the available oxygen quite quickly with similar results.

If in doubt about how to set your car's ventilation controls consult the owner's manual or the garage which services the car.

GONE MISSING

We are still trying to trace the whereabouts of some equipment on loan from the surgery.

If you have ANY equipment on loan from us could you please let Mary Douthwaite, the practice nurse, know. We are particularly keen to find the missing TeNS (Transcutaneous Nerve Stimulator) and a nebuliser (a spray for the treatment of asthma).
