PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS 22 June 1995

The first day of summer, and with it glorious sunshine and high temperatures made most people present wish they were outdoors. Certainly the Chairman, Mr Loyd, hastened the meeting along in a well structured and friendly manner as he certainly wanted to enjoy the first evening of summer. Already relishing it was the Haydon News reporter who failed to turn up leaving Mitch to take notes.

The meeting was attended by 8 Councillors in total, the Hexham Courant reporter was present. A shorter than normal meeting had little of real substance. Some points were:

- A reply had been received from GONE on behalf of the Minister of Transport in response to the Parish Council letter concerning the line of the By-Pass. Basically the six page response said that there seemed to be some misinformation circulating about the position of the Government Office for the North East and they had not suggested that the line be removed, just the opposite they said and the supporting documentation GONE had sent showed this. Mr Loyd summarised by saying that it looked as if the Parish Council had been sold a Red Herring [by Tynedale Council it would appear Ed.], everyone agreed and no discus-

sion took place on the subject.

The Police had visited and wrote, to the residents at the top of North Bank, concerning dangerous parking and it is understood that the Police suggestions have been accepted by the

residents.

Two local Planning Applications

were studied and agreed.

Complaints have been received that some individuals are walking their dog's on the Shaftoe School football field and letting them foul the area. Dog owners are requested to consider that the children use this area and to take their animals elsewhere.

BY-PASS UPDATE

Judging by the reaction we have received from the letter writing campaign most residents of the Village must have posted their letter - Thank you IT WORKED. The replies you received claimed we were misinformed - this was not true, we brought to your attention the doubt that existed of our By-Pass route being included in the Tynedale District Local Plan, which governs plans for the district for the next ten years.

The doubt was created by the fact that DoT. failed to comment on the Draft Plan therefore inclusion of our By-Pass route was deferred. We did speculate that if our route was not included in the District Plan would it still exist in ten years, we felt with things as they were this was fair comment.

The DoT. has now agreed our route should be included in the draft plan, though they still maintain that the construction of our By-Pass will not take place in the life span of this plan.

To make any headway we must get our route included in the Road Building Programme - this means lobbying Ministers until they take notice, so we intend to distribute another letter for you to post - please keep supporting us, we need to cause as much mayhem at London as we did to the Newcastle Office.

In answer to comments in the Haydon News last time. Mitch seemed to think that the major repairs in process at the moment were just routine maintenance - as he says to repair a worn out road, but surely that section of road would not be worn out with the traffic diverted around the village, the bridge at Low Hall would not have to meet Euro standards if it was no longer part of the Euro Route.

These repairs have taken place every summer since 1991 and will continue as long as [? Ed.] in excess of 13,000 vehicles a day pass along our road, this figure being our own count, we dispute the figure recently quoted and question the Highways Office how this figure has decreased from 4 years ago.

A PUZZLE

Do the Oligarchs of Haydon Bridge treat the Common People like Ragtag and Bobtail? As Editor I am both legally and morally obliged to ensure that the information in this newsletter is both factual and correct. One previous Editor was threatened with legal action because they unwittingly included an erroneous article, I have no wish to cause a repetition. When in doubt I usually refer to the source of information be it an Individual, Document, Company, Council, or Government Department. In my role, and especially in this viewpoint column I will also try to produce some balance by taking into account other readers views and opinions. My own personal views may be somewhat different. Bearing all of this in mind I must comment on the By-Pass letter to the left.

The letter sent did contain erroneous information which has received adverse comment from both The Minister and our Member of Parliament. The facts are:-

The By-Pass always was and still is in the Tynedale Draft Plan. In the December issue of the Haydon News I provided a page containing all items concerning the Parish this information was extracted from the Plan which I had personally purchased in order to let you know you what was in it, the By-Pass is clearly shown. At my behest a Public Meeting was held on December 8th 1994, present was Mrs Helen Winter (Assistant Director Forward Planning, Tynedale) who has the responsibility for developing the draft document into a final document which will eventually become a statutory instrument. She confirmed the By-Pass information as shown in the Plan.

Following Public Comment on the Plan (September - December 1994) a Local Plan Working Group was set up by Tynedale Council to consider the 3,500 public comments and see what changes need to be made before the document is eventually finalised towards the end of 1995. A comprehensive and detailed response was made by the Director Environment and Transport to Tynedale on 15th December 1994 which

confirmed that the By-Pass line was still protected.

On the 10th April the Tynedale Working Group produced a report of their comments to the Draft Plan and insofar as Housing Development on the line of the four Tynedale By-passes were concerned stated "Approve existing policy as relates to Haltwhistle by-pass and defer any other new schemes for further discussion with the Highway Authority and the Department of Transport." The Tynedale Planning Committee met on 24 April and Cllr Marion Howard asked Mrs Winter why inclusion of the Haydon Bridge By Pass in the Deposit Draft Plan was deferred for further discussion. Mrs Winter explained 'that although she had received no response from DoT she understood that it was now unlikely that this by-pass would be built before 2006 and that she was therefore unsure as to whether the line could continue to be protected in the Plan and that discussions with DoT were necessary....... before Policy could be finalised' Marion explained the situation to the Parish Council Meeting on 27th April. Both she and Mrs Winter made press statements in the Courant on 5th May. Mrs Winter saying "I was told there was no chance at all of the bypass being built during the plan period .[1996-2006]"

I personally doubt if anyone in a Government Department would ever make such a categoric comment, at the 27th April Parish Council Meeting County Councillor Purdue expressed these same doubts. In fact the Highways Agency made a statement in writing on 10th May '..... it is equally unlikely that the Bypass will be built by then [2001].' To me this makes practical sense as even if the Haydon Bridge Bypass were included in the Roads Programme tomorrow I cannot foresee that it could be completed before at least 7 years had elapsed, there are many procedures to go through including: land purchase; detailed surveys; objections; tendering and evaluation; building it with construction of a new bridge also being necessary. Elaine of course is quite correct in saying that to make headway we must get the By-Pass included into the Roads Programme - but let us make sure that facts we use are correct. Regarding Elaine's comment on my response to Dr High's Courant letter - I do of course agree that the road would not be worn out if we had a By-Pass but the fact of the matter is that we haven't, nor will we have one in the immediate future. The A69 through the Parish is worn out and must be repaired and upgraded to meet European standards, the last thing we need is a clapped out road, indeed by maintaining the road as a Euroroute we stand a better chance of a By-Pass.

Mutterings in the Village concerning the presence of a large number of young people during School time have no foundation, says Enid Garrow. It is 'Exam Time' and they are free to leave School premises. Where else can they go? They must come to School, on the School transport, or pay the cost of a service bus or train. As far as Enid is concerned she is pleased to see them around the War Memorial (as long as they don't leave their litter there). What they need is our support and prayers. Both cost nothing but mean a lot.

Yet more mutterings - this time from a respected Haydonian of very long standing who has asked me to mention if it would be possible to get the small border easterly adjacent to Cowan's Butchers tidied up. The reader feels that this mars the attractive appearance of John Martin Street where all residents keep the grass verges in front of their homes beautifully manicured.

Have a nice holiday and summer - hope to see you in September.

BY-PASS CORRESPONDENCE

By mid June some 130 people had sent in their letter to John Davison at Wellbar House. The blanket reply sent by the Government Office of the North East (GONE) was:

TYNEDALE DISTRICT LOCAL PLAN

I am afraid that whoever produced the letter was misinformed about the Department's attitude to the Haydon Bridge Bypass.

The Government Office for the North East approved the Tynedale District Council policy to protect the line of this Bypass and, more recently, the Department of Transport Highways Agency confirmed that this proposal should be protected.

As I explained last month I telephoned John and he has also sent me a separate reply as follows:

TYNEDALE DISTRICT LOCAL PLAN

Thank you for your telephone call of 22 May concerning the letter of complaint which is currently being circulated in Haydon Bridge. Enclosed is a copy of the response which is being issued by this office.

For your further information the Government Office for the North East which, in this case, represents the interest of both the DOE and the DOT, approved the protection of the Haydon Bridge Bypass on 15 December 1994, and the new DOT Highways Agency which is now responsible for all Trunk Roads and Motorways endorsed that approval on 10 May by stating that the alignment was protected from proposed developments under Article 15(1) (b) of the GDO 1988.

1st HAYDON BRIDGE SCOUTS

The holiday motorist approaching Haydon Bridge on Saturday 27th May would have been pleased to see that the traffic lights had been safely stowed away for the Holiday weekend, but surprised to find that in their place was a line of Scouts, Cubs and parents busily brandishing hats, buckets and paddling pools in search of small change. To the seasoned villager, however, the answer was simple - the Scouts are after another minibus, and collecting a Mile of Pennies to raise funds.

We decided a year ago at our Annual General Meeting that a new minibus was needed. Recent events had drawn attention to the question of safety in minibuses, and the fitting of seat belts had become a priority. Rather than fit belts into our existing ten year old minibus, it was decided to purchase a newer, larger bus to enable us to carry the same number of fully belted-up children as we could squeeze into the old bus without belts.

This has proved more difficult than it might at first have seemed, and we have had to raise our estimates of the cost of such a bus since we started fund-raising. By this year's AGM we found ourselves a year down the road and apparently not much nearer our goal. Fortunately a flurry of recent activity has helped us to get much closer in the last couple of weeks. The two most recent fund-raising events have been the Mile of Pennies and on the preceding Saturday a joint Charity Auction with the PTA at the First School. The auction raised about £1300 to split between the two organisations, and the Mile itself raised about £200 (I think we're still counting the last few pennies!). Because of the wet weather on the day we didn't try to lay the coins out, but our resident mathematician informs me that assuming all the coins were pennies, the distance reached was approximately 1.43 miles, give or take a few quid.

The result of the last two weeks is that we are now much nearer getting a bus than I had thought. We estimate that a suitable vehicle will cost us about £12,000; we now have approaching £9,000, so the light is beginning to show at the end of the tunnel. May I therefore take this opportunity to thank the numerous individuals and organisation who have helped us with contributions great and small. We hope to be able to show off the fruits of your generosity quite soon. Once again, many thanks, and keep up the good work.

VOTING STATISTICS - HAYDON

In the May District Council Elections a total of 1622 were eligible to vote at the Haydon Bridge and Langley Polling stations. From the count the following can be shown:-

M. Howard 488 Labour W. Howard 446 Labour T. Stephenson 306 Conservative

Votes cast = 488 + 446 + 306 = 1240

Approximately 750 (46%) of the electorate voted and as each were entitled to two votes the maximum number votes that could have been cast was:-

$2 \times 750 = 1500$

We can work out how many people voted for one person by:-

$$1500 - 1240 = 260$$

It is, of course, impossible to work out who voted for who however if you assume that some people voted on party lines and that all people who cast one vote actually voted for for Thomas Stephenson we can do the following sum with his votes:-

$$306 - 260 = 46$$

This can be used to show that 46 people who voted for Thomas also voted for someone else. Coincidentally Marion received 42 votes more than Bill. This shows that you can prove anything or nothing with postulation

The following table shows turnout from areas with more than 30 Electors and where 46% or more turned out. The Langley turnout is also shown

SUNSHINE - FRIEND OR FOE?

Recent research has *East doubt on the value of sun screens with greater than "factor 15" values. Nonetheless, it is unquestionably desirable for the white races to shield their skins from sunlight because of the risk of skin cancer. In our home territory we are close to or under the ozone hole and on holiday further south the solar radiation is more intense.

There is a link between exposure to sunlight and adverse changes in the bodies immune system too. People with certain kinds of malignant disease of the

lymphatic system also have more skin cancers.

On the other hand - there is good evidence that people deprived of sunlight are more prone to depression -

Seasonal Affective Disorder or SAD for short. Strict adherence to Islamic dress codes in the form of the hejab (the all enveloping black garment) predisposes to the development of rickets - vitamin D deficiency

)nes skin makes vitamin D when exposed to sunlight), so what is the public to do? Carefully graded lengths of exposure to sunlight is less harmful than sudden and intense burning. On holiday, do not throw your haddock white body onto the sand and roast for hours from the first day. Always use a factor 15 sunscreen and reapply on coming out of the sea. Sensible garments and hats will help.

TURKEY TROTS. MONTEZUMA'S REVENGE, DELHI BELLY

We get frequent requests for tablets to bung up the bowels of holiday makers who have been laid low by some hideous foreign gut rot.

There are a number of tablets which can be bought from the chemist for this purpose. The preferred way of dealing with the problem is to spend some time resting in a cool place, starve (nothing solid by mouth until the diarrhoea stops - if there is nothing in there it is impossible to have diarrhoeal), drink very large quantities of fluids - preferably bottled or boiled water (Cola, 7 Up, etc. will do at a pinch). Small children may need salt replacement and this can also be bought or of on prescription.

OUT OF HOURS CALLS

83% of GPs have voted to reject the government's offer on out of hours work and sanctions have been called for. Sounds ominous at first reading but do not be deceived, there is much more to this than reaches the newspaper headlines. There are no circumstances in which the ill will suffer. It is salutary to recall that there is a westernised country in the Mediterranean where the doctors did truly withdraw their labour - the action backfired because the death rate plummeted during the strike and rose again when the doctors went back to work!

You may have heard of new fangled arrangements for night calls in big cities in which large numbers of doctors share the burden, being on duty for a whole city every fifteen nights or more. An experiment has been conducted locally to see if something similar could be worked out in and around Tynedale. We have fewer doctors in the area (about 30 amongst 60+thousand people) than most big cities and the distances are much greater. A city GP who came to talk about his experience can drive across his patch in fifteen minutes.

At the request of the local GPs, I have collected information on all the out of hours calls for a menth and studied the total picture of demand.

On one Sunday in May there were 44 calls requiring a home visit. If a single GP had been doing them he or she would have had to travel two thousand six hundred and forty miles in the day - allowing for ten minutes at each call this gives an AVERAGE speed on the road of 158mph! I wonder what the local constabulary would have to say - is there a speed great enough to give a picture too blurred to read on

the roadside cameras?

Overall, I don't think this is going to work. Even if we divide the area in two and Allendale, ourselves, Humshauah & Wark and

Bellingham were to cooperate, the maximum return journey to two patients would be 134 miles and take 3hours 42 minutes - in good weather.

FRUIT AND VEG

Saying simply "Eat more fruit and vegetables" doesn't really help much. People need to know in simple number terms what will be most beneficial for them.

A total of at least 400grams (or about one pound in

A total of at least 400grams (or about one pound in English weight) every day is the current recommendation for adults. This should be made up of a variety of things - a pound of carrots every day would not be wisel Anyone appearing in surgery with prominent front teeth saying "What's up Doc?" in a corny American accent will be definitely suspect. If you divide the 400grams into five portions of 80 grams each and aim to have about 80 grams of five different things you will be right on target.

Drinking fruit or vegetable juices does not count though pureed material is OK. Dried or frozen items are fine though they may contain different levels of nutriments to the raw materials. Nuts and preserves do not count. Fruit and veg in "ready prepared foods" are to be counted. Baked beans and other pulses are good nutritional fare - the natural consequences of digesting them will limit the quantity eaten.

LET THERE BE LIGHT!

We have a new operating light in our treatment room, suspended from the ceiling as is best. There are certain subtle advantages to being able to see what is going on!
