#### **EDITORIAL**

Did you read the article in the Hexham Courant on 12th April ? This reported that:

'A bid by Liberal Democrats to give members of the public the right to speak at meetings of Tynedale District Council has failed.

At the moment, members of the public can attend all council committee meetings to watch, but they are not allowed to take part.

The Chief Executive Mr Alan Batey said that he ' felt it would be of no advantage to introduce public question time at Tynedale, as there were systems already in place which allowed the council to be fair and democratic to all inhabitants.'

The subject was thoroughly discussed and 'When it came to a vote, the Liberal Democrats were comprehensively outvoted by the combined Conservative, Labour and Independent councillors.'

I feel it appropriate to repeat the reported views of our own Tynedale District elected representative, Bill Howard, who is also a Haydon Bridge Parish Councillor.

' However, Coun. Bill Howard, of Haydon Bridge, felt that the public aiready had free access to officers, staff and councillors to put their views across.

He said: "If my telephone calls and knocks on the door are any indication, the public already has more than adequate channels of communication open.

"If these channels are not being used, the fault lies with councillors in their own wards.

"I cannot think that a public question time would enhance proceedings - and I can think of instances where the opposite would be the case."

It is here that I must take issue with Bill, his words frighten me, let us read them again -

"I cannot think that a public question time would enhance proceedings - and I can think of instances where the opposite would be the case."

Erstwhile former Chairman of Haydon Bridge Parish Council, Thomas Bates introduced a 'public question time' for the monthly Parish Council meetings.

Parish Council meetings always start with a public participation session where any individual can make a statement or ask a question. As Editor of the Haydon News I have used these occasions to bring matters concerning us all direct to the Parish Council. In all cases I have been heard with patience and courtesy by the Council.

On the major issues of The Tynedale Plan and Stublick Opencast Coal Mining the result has been that wide ranging discussions and further meetings have resulted allowing other views to be taken directly into account.

Other people have also taken the opportunity to raise points during public participation sessions.

Whilst accepting Bill's statement about his own experience with visitors and telephone calls to his home I am not so sure that he can take a balanced position on all of our opinions. It is quite easy to support the views of individuals who have a specific problem but with more general matters elected representatives are often obliged to follow their political stance. Decisions may also be biassed towards ones own personal viewpoint - which can often be at odds with the views of the majority.

It is disappointing that Bill has expressed such strong and, it is considered, out of date views against the proposal to let the public speak at Tynedale Council meetings. Doubt is also expressed that the views he has expressed really do represent those of us who elected him to office.

Meetings should not, of course, be open to frequent interventions by the public otherwise anarchy would be the result, however it is considered that if public participation were allowed at Tynedale District Council meetings in the structured but informal manner to the way that it is permitted at Parish Council meetings nothing but good would come out of it.

Should not elected representatives be supporting the interests of the community rather than, it would seem, the administrative convenience of Tynedale District Council?

I do hope that Bill will not press for a suppression of the practice of public participation at future Parish Council meetings as a result of the Tynedale Council vote. The Editor invites a written open response from Bill on this subject. If an answer is received it will be printed in full in the next issue of the Haydon News.

You may have also read in the Hexham Courant (4th April) that work on the A69 Haltwhistle bypass has started. The tree planting ceremony commemorating the start of the work was attended by Coun. Ian McMinn, Mr Watts (Road Minister), Mr Michael Martin (Chairman of the Contractor - Road Link), Mr Peter Atkinson MP and the appropriately named Laurie Haynes (Chief Executive of the Highways Agency).

Mr Watts had bleak news for Haydon Bridge when he said that there was no scheme in the bypass programme for Haydon Bridge in the foreseeable future. "I can't at this stage agree to promote any new scheme for a bypass" were his reported words.

MP Peter Atkinson, who was present at the spade holding ceremony said he would continue to plug away at the Roads Minister. "We will not give up on this because it is the only place in the area that does not have a bypass, and in my view it needs one."

Strong words indeed Mr Atkinson just about as strong as the words my garden gnome uses on me when I accidentally knock him over whilst weeding the borders.

Has all the spunk gone from our Members of Parliament? Methinks that once elected they join the 'system' and adopt the political adage: 'To get along you must go along' which basically means' Don't rock the boat or we'll through you overboard.'

However if you're a strong and competent swimmer you need have little fear of being thrown overboard.

We will be seeing and hearing a lot from prospective MP's of all political persuasions during the coming year the promises will be there but once elected it's a case of YES MINISTER.

Hughie Green had a 'Clapometer' and Robert Mackenzie a 'Swingometer' So I think I'll invent a 'Spunkometer' to help me decide who to vote for.

#### PARISH COUNCIL PICKINGS

#### 26th April 1996

All councillors were present.

Like the council meeting itself, this report will be mainly concerned with discussion of the role of the High School in the Parish community, both now and in the future.

Headmaster, came to the meeting to explain the School's ambitions for future development. Direct Government or Local Authority funding for activities outside the National curriculum hardly exists. If money is to be found for broadening the range of school facilities, this can only be done in a 'community' context, in the hope of qualifying for European Union or ment. National Lottery grants.

Mr Thompson's vision is of the School as a Community resource whose improved facilities and equipment will be accessible all the year round for the benefit of local residents. The precise nature of those facilities, and the arrangements for their management would be influenced by the results of the Village Appraisal, with the School and the Parish working together to Facilities for members of the general construct a proposal to provide for the needs of the community as a whole.

The Parish Council very much welcomed Mr Thompson's ideas and it was decided that the High School should be formally involved in discussions arising out of the Village Appraisal.

## AN ANGRY LETTER FROM EILEEN CHARLTON

Each year on national spring cleaning week a team of volunteers has turned out to clean up the river banks - adverts were put up, a piece in the Haydon News and a mention in the 'Courant' this in the past has ensured a reasonable turn out of helpers.

I have just got home from this year's 'Clean Up' and put pen to paper while my ardour is running high - a total of four including myself turned out.

David Westall took some black bags from me and said he would go to the south bank. David [husband] and myself proceeded to gather rubbish starting at the new bridge. A mass of glass - beer bottles and take-away cartons were the first challenge, obviously thrown over the bridge. As we moved along the river-bank we were joined by Bill Howard and made good progress until we came to the sandbank at the picnic area.

Who could have made the mess that waited there for us? The site of the Scout's bonfire had been used for burning doors and windows with the glass in. We filled 20 bags with sand full of glass - this is the very place favoured by the children in the summer. How could anyone do this?

Eventually we were satisfied there was no glass left and decided to call it a day. We placed our bags in the skip and went across the bridge to pick up David Westall's. On arriving at the rear of Basil Young's Joiners Shop we found the bags filled by David, but no sign of him, we then realised what a disheartening effort his must have been.

Has Frankham Tip been moved to Haydon Bridge? We were disgusted by what we saw, builders rubble was accompanied by glass, rough metal and household waste, tins, bottles and even sinks. Looking all along the river bank from 'The Anchor' to the football field were sites where rubbish has been dumped. Those responsible should be ashamed of themselves.

I know the old excuse for dumping garden waste and rubble is that this stops erosion, but this tipping is being followed by the indiscriminate tipping of anything!

I had a form for 'BT Environment Week ' in my possession - we intended entering the west end flower bed, but what is the point of having flower beds at the ends of the village and a tip in the middle?

So I'm setting a new challenge to those of you who purport to care about the place you live. I've sent the form off designating the cleaning up of this section of the river-bank as the Target.

'British Telecom Environment Week' runs from 17th - 27th May, now it's your turn to prove you care. We will get a skip in and provide gloves (money prizes are awarded to winners).

On reflection I must say that some areas are quietly kept looking perfect by those who care. Up river of the old bridge the river-bank hardly has a piece of grass out of place and projects like the cemetery, flower beds and Station Cottages roadway show what can be done.

If we can bottom this black-spot - Haydon Bridge will benefit by the improvement and once cleaned will be able to be kept right. So mark your calendar and don't leave it to the die-hards.

## April Garden

Some of Haydon Bridge's loveliest gardens will be open to the public for the first time on the 18th of this month. Your garden might not be on the Garden Trail but you can still help the village make a colourful impact by hanging a basket at your door. This is a good way to use a few plants extravagantly to give a lavish show. You can buy all the plants at the village Co-op or a garden centre and I don't think it matters whether you go for a rich mixture of purple and gold or a blazing clash of orange and pink; the important thing is to pack as many plants possible so that the basket overflows with foliage and flowers.

We'd all like to have baskets that look like those the Railway Hotel hang up every year. Josie adds a slow release fertiliser and water gel (which helps the compost retain the water) to the compost. He uses Miracle-Gro in the water and waters the baskets daily. On the other side of the bridge, Steven Brown in John Martin Street also has fantastic baskets which look good all season. Like Josie, he uses Miracle-Gro and he waters his baskets twice a day even if it's raining. Steven uses a spray for watering because he says it is important to spray the leaves of the plants as well as wetting the soil.

This Month - Weeds are already growing strongly so deal with them quickly and ruthlessly. Apply chemical weedkillers containing glyphosate which works best on weeds in active growth. Use the hoe on bare soil to prevent seedlings establishing.

Continue to treat moss and weeds on the lawn. Grass is growing quickly so start regular weekly mowing and give a spring feed. You can sow a new lawn in early May. The seed soon germinates and thrives in the warmer damp weather.

Squash or spray greenfly on shrubs and roses. Use slug pellets around hostas and delphiniums.

Cut back old flowering wood from spring flowering shrubs immediately after flowering. The new growth produced after pruning will carry next year's flowers.

Cut the fading flower heads from spring flowering rock plants like saxifrage and aubretia and cut back plants which are threatening their neighbours with extinction. Prune winter flowering heathers.

Never cut back the foliage of spring flowering bulbs or tie their leaves together for neatness. The leaves are feeding nutrients to the bulbs to ensure a good display next year.



## **BSE UPDATE**

Who are the experts?

The Spongiform Encephalopathy Advisory Committee (SEAC) consists of leading independent experts in this area of brain disease in human and animal health.

What do the experts say?

The latest SEAC analysis of all available research suggests a possibility that a small number of CJE cases might be associated with access to the BSE agent came before the specified offal ban was introduced in 1989.

It says there is no direct evidence of a link between BSE and CJD.

What are Specified Bovine Offals? Specified Bovine Offals\*, principally the brain and spinal cord, are the only tissues which have ever been found to naturally contain the BSE agent.

What does the law say?
Since 1988, cattle feed containing any ingredients originating from cattle or sheep has been banned.

Since 1989, Specified Bovine Offals are required to be removed from all cattle and destroyed regardless of whether they show signs of BSE or not.

These measures have led to a sharp decline in the number of cattle with BSE.

\* The Specified Bovine Offals are the head including the brain and eyes, spinal cord, tonsils, thymus, spleen and intestines. What are these controls?

BSE is a notifiable disease and all cases must be reported by law. On top of this, detailed checks by the Official Veterinary Surgeon are carried out at the meat plant. All animals diagnosed as having BSE are destroyed and no part can be used for either human or animal food.

How can we be sure?

All meat plants are supervised by independent meat inspectors under the supervision of Official Veterinary Surgeons. The inspectors are required to check every carcase to ensure that the Specified Bovine Offals have been removed. Only approved meat receives a health stamp without which it is not lawful to sell the product for human consumption.

What happens next?

Measures are continually reviewed and, if there is any doubt at all, stregthened to ensure that public safety is maintained.

We recognise that the industry must play its part in reassuring the public and will strive to ensure that all the regulations are vigorously policed and enforced.

1st June - 26th August 1996 The Laing Art Gallery, Newcastle upon Tyne.




Northumbria's early Christian heritage is explored in all its glory in this once in a life time exhibition. We are delighted to announce that the Lindisfarne Gospels will form the centrepiece of the exhibition, together with an array of priceless artworks. Treasures from the Lost kingdom of Northumbria is a unique and thrilling testament to the influence of the Church in Anglo-Saxon Northumbria.

It was in 635 that St Aidan, at the bidding of King Oswald, brought the Christian message from Iona and established a monastic seat at Lindisfarne. In the two centuries that followed, Northumbria became the centre of a remarkable flowering of Latin learning and artistic brilliance which radiated over early Christian Europe. The kingdom grew into a strong unit from a federation of small warrior tribes and covered a huge area from the Mersey and Humber in the south to the Rivers Tay and Clyde in the north. During this time the inspirational St Cuthbert became Bishop of Lindisfarne and The Lindisfarne Gospels was written in honour of God and his memory.

The Lindisfarne Gospels, one of the greatest masterpieces of Anglo-Saxon book painting, will cross the River Tyne for the first time in 1000 years. In addition, illuminated manuscripts, ornate sculpture in metalwork and stone and precious jewellery from collections throughout the country will be displayed, with highlights including St Cuthbert's pectoral cross, the Franks Casket, the York Helmet, the Ormside Bowl, and the Jedburgh shrine. Your imagination will be fired forever by the spectacular artworks and the Northumbrians who inspired them, over a millennium ago.

## A 25 YEAR COURTSHIP!

A quarter of a century ago it was first mooted that the Haydon Bridge and Allendale practices should amalgamate. At the time, Allendale had had a rapid series of changes of doctor, a situation which Bob High thought undesirable. In the event, Dr Jim Miles was appointed to the Allendale practice and the situation has been stable ever since. As many will now know, either from local gossip or the Courant, Jim Miles is retiring soon and the post has been advertised in the British Medical Journal

For the last couple of decades there has been the well known cross cover arrangements for Out-of-Hours work between the two practices and in the last four years we have also been associated for Fund holding. Both of these arrangements have been to the advantage of the

practices and patients and it has seemed to me, ever since I arrived here in 1989, that the amalgamation of the practices was the most logical next step.

How could amalgamating the practices help anyone? There is now a general assumption that small practices are disadvantaged politically, financially and in terms of the range of services which they can offer - there are only so many skills that one doctor can possess. And yet there is good published evidence that many people prefer the atmosphere of small practices - the personal aspect of care is most often mentioned. By amalgamating Haydon Bridge and Allendale we would gain the stability, economies and security of a larger organisation and yet retain the two small premises with their friendly staffs - the best of both worlds we think.

Following the advertising of the Allendale practice, Mary and I decided to approach Dr Mary Jo l'Anson, who has worked in Allendale as an associate for almost four years (a sort of hired hand - some of you will have met her when she has been on night or weekend duty), to see whether she was interested in applying with us to make the linked practices into a three doctor organisation. She agreed enthusiastically. We spent many hours composing our application which eventually ran to twelve separate multi-page documents - we even sent an index to help the examiners! We then had to sit back and wait to see if we would be called for interview. There were a total of four applications, including ours. Two were from single handed doctors and one from a married couple, we understand. All were very strong contenders.

We were called for interview on 19 4 96 and spent many hours in preparation of our presentation. We created eight page bound books of our reasons for applying and the opportunities and challenges for the new partnership for the interviewing committee. At the interview we took it in turns to speak on different pages of our presentation. We then spent a further hour taking questions from all of the committee members, many of which were searching in the extreme. Thank Heavens for modern deodorants!

A few hours later we had our answer - we had succeeded! Haydon Bridge and Allendale are now a single practice with three doctors.

The patients of both practices are now assured of the long term stable provision of the full range of medical services in both locations.

## IIS A WOMAN'S WORLD!

This development means that the practice, meaning doctors and staff, is essentially an ALL WOMAN organisation, with me being a "lonely little onion in a petunia bed". There are few all or mainly woman practices in the UK and such a phenomenon in a rural area is even rarer.

All of the partners will be full time for the foreseeable future. It is intended that we shall all put in sessions at both premises, though Mary Will take responsibility for Haydon Bridge and Mary Jo will take lead responsibility for Allendale. To provide for those patients particularly want to see a male doctor I shall divide

my time more equally between premises. If, as we hope, the practice grows and prospers, it may be possible in the future to have a greater male representation - unless, of course, you tell us differently - your views count.

## WHO IS MARY JO L'ANSON?

No shrinking violet shel The last time Israel invaded The Lebanon she was right there in the thick of it. She was Beirut caring for the wounded, dying and dispossessed at the time of the Sabra and Chatila camp massacres. She has also worked in other remote corners of the world and is presently married to the president of a major computer manufacturer. She has four children and will shortly be moving into the practice area from Stocksfield.

She has very wide medical experience both in hospital and community work. I am confident that she will be a popular figure and a major asset to the community and practice.

## WHATS IN IT FOR HAYDON BRIDGE?

First and foremost, this amalgamation is our best chance of securing stable future provision of local medical services, given the present environment of retreat and "rationalisation". Unless the UK's funding of its health services starts to approach that of its European neighbours - only Greece spends a lower proportion of GDP on health - then the smaller practices will be under increasing pressure.

There will be an increased choice of doctors at both premises. Allendale has its own physiotherapy sessions to which HB patients can soon be referred - with much less of a wait. There will be cross cover, for holidays, sickness and study leave, for nursing and reception staff.

We intend that patients shall be able to choose which premises they wish to regard as their normal place of attendance. Those who feel more comfortable receiving their medical care out of the village can do so and those who have something particularly sensitive to sort out can attend Allendaie if they wish - and vice versa for Allendale residents of course.
